

# Pirates Edge Reds in Ninth

PITTSBURGH (AP)—Rookie Bob Bailey's double to center in the ninth inning scored the tying and winning runs for the Pittsburgh Pirates Thursday night as they beat Cincinnati 4-3 and spoiled Bob Purkey's bid for his 23rd victory.

Purkey had a 3-1 lead going into the ninth but was lifted after leadoff hitter Dick Groat singled for the sixth Pirate hit and Bob Skinner drew the first walk off Purkey.

Bill Henry, trying to save it for Purkey, fanned two batters, but Donn Clendenon's grounder got past third baseman Eddie Kasko for an unearned run that made it 3-2 and Bailey followed with the double that knocked in two more unearned runs and clinched the victory.

The Pirates' starter, rookie southpaw Bob Veale, struck out nine batters in the early innings but lost his effectiveness in the sixth when the Reds snapped a 1-1 tie with a pair of runs.

Bob Priddy, another rookie and the third Pirate pitcher, received credit for the victory.

## Preliminary Plans Noted

PORTLAND (AP)—Preliminary plans to support Portland's bid for the 1968 Olympic Games were unveiled Thursday. They call for:

- A 90,000-seat stadium.
- A 60,000-seat natatorium.
- Parking for 40,000 automobiles.
- A 10,000-seat arena for wrestling, weight-lifting and fencing.

There also will be other features, including an Olympic Village and a soccer field.

Most of this would be in the Delta Park area, north of Portland and on the flats just south of the Columbia River.

Spokesmen for Future Unlimited, a group seeking a major sports development at Delta Park, said representatives will carry the plans to Chicago Oct. 15 to present Portland's bid for the games.

Only Ohio State, picked the No. 1 team in the pre-season Associated Press poll, and fourth-rated Michigan State are idle among the elite, with two of them, Purdue (No. 7) and Washington (No. 10) settling things right away in Seattle.

Second-ranked Texas opposes Oregon while third-rated Alabama, last year's national champion, takes on dogged Georgia.

Louisiana State (No. 5), with new coach Charlie McClendon, plays a night game at home against Texas A&M. Mississippi (No. 6) has what is considered the only breather, when it takes on Memphis State, also at night.

The day's television game (CBS, 12:30 p.m. PST) pits Southern California against defending Atlantic Coast Conference champ Duke in Los Angeles, while Penn State and Navy go about pretty well settling who's going to be the east's top team when they meet at University Park, Pa.
