



Debate Sought

3 Associates Of Estes Get Prison Terms

EL PASO, Tex. (AP)—Three associates of West Texas promoter Billie Sol Estes were sentenced to from 6 to 35 years in prison Thursday on pleas of guilty to mail fraud and conspiracy.

Those sentenced were Harold E. Orr, 31, and Ruel W. Alexander, 36, of Amarillo and Coleman McSpadden, 45, of Lubbock, all officials of the Superior Manufacturing Co. of Amarillo.

McSpadden and Orr drew maximum sentences of 35 years. Alexander drew a top sentence of 6 years.

Federal Judge R. E. Thomason, however, set the sentences on five counts to run concurrently, which means McSpadden and Orr would serve a maximum time of 10 years and Alexander 6 years.

No fines were assessed against the officials but Superior Manufacturing Co. drew \$1,000 fines on five counts for a total of \$5,000.

Judge Thomason postponed start of sentences until next Jan. 7 on condition that the three defendants will appear in civil and criminal cases now pending against Estes.

The indictment, also naming Estes, charged the four men induced farmers to sign mortgages on fertilizer tanks which never existed and sold the mortgages to various finance companies. Estes has pleaded innocent.

Orr, Alexander and McSpadden were principal stockholders in Superior Manufacturing Co., an Amarillo tank-building firm.

Goal Reached By Canoeist

ASTORIA (AP)—Heavily bearded Alex Laird, 23, paddled his canoe into the East End Mooring Basin here Thursday, ending a 1,268-mile journey down the Columbia River.

Laird was met by Mayor and Mrs. Harry Steinbock and Norris Johnson, manager of the Astoria chamber of commerce.

The Tustin, Calif., man started from Canal Flats, B. C., July 4 with three companions and two canoes. The other three men dropped out 150 miles and two shipwrecks later.

Laird continued despite some damage to his canoe when it overturned in the Kinbasket Rapids of British Columbia.

He took movies of the trip and hopes to sell them to a television travel program.

OLYMPIA (AP)—The average Washington farmer earned a gross income of \$11,488 last year, but after paying his bills, his net profit was \$3,463, the State Agriculture Department reports.

\$6.1 Million Plan Senate Passes Bill For Baker Project

WASHINGTON (AP)—A bill authorizing federal construction of a \$6,168,000 reclamation project near Baker, Ore., was approved by the Senate in a voice vote Tuesday.

It now goes to President Kennedy. The measure authorizes building of Mason Dam, with a 100,000-acre-foot reservoir, on the Powder River, and two pumping plants.

Irrigators would pay for rehabilitation and extend existing diversion and distribution works and repay \$1,127,500 of the federal cost over 50 years. Revenues from the Bonneville Power Administration would repay the remaining \$3,227,100 earmarked for irrigation.

Estimates Disputed
But the estimates, by the Senate Interior Committee, were disputed by one of its members, Sen. Gordon Allott, R-Colo. His was the only audible "no" when the vote was cast.

Allott said there is serious doubt whether many farmers taking part could make a living because of the limited acreage they could irrigate.

Morse Replies
Allott told the Senate the project "in all likelihood will prove to be a failure" and present.

dicted Congress will be asked to bail it out in the near future.
Sen. Wayne Morse, D-Ore., replied to Allott's objections. He said his case for the bill is supported by recommendations of the Senate and House Interior committee advocating the project. Reclamation Bureau reports recommending it and, among other things, the economic need for the project in "one of the depressed areas of Oregon."

Morse said the evidence is "overwhelming in support of the project," which would irrigate about 18,000 acres in the Baker Valley and provide Powder River flood control.
Of the federal contribution \$1,056,400 would go for flood control, \$632,000 for fish and wildlife improvements and \$125,000 for recreation.

Agate Dam Passes

WASHINGTON (AP)—The House passed and sent to the President Thursday a bill authorizing construction of Agate Dam and reservoir in the Rogue River Basin Reclamation project in Oregon.

The House also voted to extend the act authorizing the Crooked River Reclamation project in Oregon to provide for additional irrigation.

Under terms of the resolution, President Kennedy would call for the world conference. Participation by governments and industrial fishery experts also would be urged.

Sen. Warren G. Magnuson, D-Wash., said the resolution accompanied an amendment to the 1962 Trade Expansion Bill.
