

Kennedy Hits Hard In Tour

President Cites Democratic Record In Farm Talks

EN ROUTE WITH PRESIDENT KENNEDY — President Kennedy carried a hard-punching campaign tour clear across Michigan on Saturday, hooting at Republicans who ignore the name and proclaiming over and over that votes for Democrats are votes for progress.

"Register and vote," Kennedy urged, "register and vote. Vote Democratic."

Kennedy hopped by helicopter across a Michigan countryside already glowing with lavish touches of autumn reds and yellows, from Detroit, to Flint, to Muskegon.

'Bean Feed' Rally

Then it was on to Minneapolis and St. Paul, Minn., and a "bean feed" rally Saturday night.

An estimated 5,000 to 6,000 persons greeted the President as he stepped off his plane at the Minneapolis-St. Paul airport.

Kennedy had the usual plaudits and plugs for Democratic politics and political hopefuls in a speech prepared for the traditional bean feed rally.

He also swung over to the farm issue, with word that the Democratic party has been true to the farmer and true to its word to help him.

"We have," he said, "helped put money into the farmer's pocket, into his family budget and into the cash registers on main street in the small towns of this and other states."

A Farm Mess

Then in a kind of reversal of a presidential campaign 10 years ago, when the Republicans were claiming there was a mess in Washington and they had to clean it up, Kennedy contended his administration inherited a farm mess. And, he said, his secretary of agriculture from Minnesota, Orville L. Freeman, "has been cleaning up that mess."

Crowds shouted and waved Kennedy along the way on motorcade routes through parts of Detroit and Flint and at an airport rally in Muskegon.

In a way, this was 1950 all over again—the crowds, the color, the "let's-get-the-country-moving" theme.

He will be back again in 1964. He wants a Democratic Congress that will make a record in the meantime.

Sutton Creek Bridge Under Construction

A bridge being built over Sutton Creek will allow the enlargement of the present Sutton Lake recreation area by about 20 family units, the Siuslaw National Forest announced this week.

The bridge, 42-feet long, will be finished by the middle of October. When the new campground area is completed, the area will be enlarged to provide for 55 families. There will be four restrooms, a boat launching ramp and dock and other facilities.

Sutton Lake is a few miles north of Florence off Highway 101.

Threats Cited In Shooting

VAN NUYS, Calif. — A 24-year-old actress killed her actor boy friend Saturday with a shotgun blast through the heart. She said he had threatened her life.

After the shooting, police reported Sandra Edwards stumbled from her home crying:

"Oh my God! Oh, my God! I hope this is a nightmare. It's got to be a nightmare. I love him so. I love him so."

Sandra, a striking brunette who has played minor roles in several television series, told police she shot Tom Gilson, 28, after he broke through a rear door and threatened to kill her and four children present. She was booked on suspicion of murder.

Police said Gilson, a television actor, had a 9-month-old son by Miss Edwards.

Sandra said she and Gilson broke up several months ago and he had frequently bothered her since. She said he telephoned Friday night and threatened her life.

Miss Edwards has been living with Mr. and Mrs. Richard Davis, her sister and brother-in-law. The actress told police that Davis gave her a 12-gauge shotgun after Gilson called. She said Davis instructed her: "If he comes over, you can use this to frighten him."

Unander Scores Morse As 'Shoddy and Ineffective'

Sen. Wayne L. Morse's record shows him to be "shoddy and ineffective" and the public is becoming tired of the "doubletalk" coming from Morse and the Kennedy administration, Sig Unander said in Eugene Saturday morning.

Speaking to the meeting of the State Republican Central Committee, Unander said that the present situation in Cuba was "predictable because the intellectual appeasers (around President Kennedy) misjudged the situation."

"Now Cuba is the testing ground... whether or not communism will be allowed to thrive in this hemisphere," he continued.

Later in a brief interview, Unander said that the incident of the Senate and House conference voting down funds for construction on Blue River dam and Yaquina Bay is but "another example of Morse's inability to work for the people in his state."

Phil Roth, state chairman from Portland, reported that the party has 80 per cent of the state's precincts organized. The job to be done, he said, is to keep working until Election Day and then see that "at least 90 percent of all Republicans vote that day."

Carl Fisher, Eugene Republican candidate for Congress,

"It only proves what I've been saying all along that we shouldn't add another six years to the 18 years Morse has almost completely wasted," he continued.

(Washington, D.C. reports said that Morse lost the two appropriations because of bad feeling toward him by one of the conferees.)

In other sessions of the morning-long central committee meeting, Republican leaders from 15 counties voiced what might be called cautious optimism as they exhorted each other to work harder toward "Republican victory" on Nov. 6.

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Downpours in East Blamed For at Least Seven Deaths

Torrential rains in the East caused at least seven deaths Saturday as a rash of bad weather spotted the country.

Slushy snow and hail fell on southeastern Wyoming and northwestern Colorado and early morning fog in the Midwest was blamed for at least three Illinois traffic deaths.

A stalled rain mass kept rain drumming into already soggy New York and New England, flooding streets and snarling transportation.

One of the dead was a Rutland, Vt., lawyer nominated for lieutenant governor of the state, Frederic J. Delany, 41. He was a passenger in a car which collided with another during a storm.

A wide swath of rain extended from the mountain snow area across the Great Plains and Midwest into Illinois and Kentucky. There were spotty showers in the Pacific Northwest.

But the Southland got a day of dry, sunny mildness.

The central Rockies storm closed U.S. 34 between Estes

Park and Granby, Colo., with four inches of snow, and caused Wyoming troopers to halt traffic on U.S. 30 at 8,816-foot Summit Pass between Cheyenne and Laramie, where slush accumulated 6 to 9 inches deep.

Some of the Boulder, Colo., telephone and traffic light system was knocked out by heavy hail, some as large as golf balls, which formed a pebbly three-inch coating.

An earth tremor shook the Jackson, Wyo., and Yellowstone National Park areas briefly early Saturday, but no damage was reported.

The shock was described as strong by some Jackson residents.

A Moderate Advance

New York Market Stems Two-Week Downhill Slide

NEW YORK — After a couple of weeks of sharp losses, a groping stock market found some support last week and advanced moderately in light trading.

General market sentiment, however, was so pessimistic that some analysts began to predict an upturn purely on the "theory of contrary opinion"—meaning that the majority is usually wrong, and since most people expect a further collapse, the market is likely to advance.

Amid the gloom atmosphere were reports that the amount of short selling is increasing. This is the sale of borrowed stock with the intent of making a profit by repaying the loan with shares bought at lower prices.

A Bullish Side

The short interest in the market is a two-edged sword. While it reflects bearish opinion, it also means that, if prices should turn upward, many "shorts" would run to "cover" their contracts—buy stock—thus adding force to a rise. So there is a bullish side to short selling, and brokers attributed some of last week's advance to it.

Amid the usual mixed bag of economic news, the outstanding fact about the week's stock market was that prices rebounded from the same level which began a 45-point advance in the Dow Jones industrial average last summer. The rally last week was on very low volume, and therefore unconvincing—but it was there, and it did come from an anticipated support level.

Sharp Loss Begins Week

That level was represented by 571.24 in the Dow industrials, their closing figure last July 18. Starting from there, the Dow industrials climbed to 616.00 by Aug. 23, then backtracked.

Stocks began the week with a sharp loss Monday, which brought the Dow industrials close to the July 18 low. Buying support materialized there and the list scored a sharp recovery Tuesday. Wednesday, however, there seemed no incentive to carry the rally any further and stocks did virtually nothing.

Thursday and Friday the averages moved higher on feeble volume and with short covering credited for much of the improvement.

The Dow Jones industrial average last week rose 7.61 to 586.59.

Staying Away in Doves

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks advanced 2.8 to 217.7.

Volume shrank to 13,956,680 shares from 18,564,370 the week before and was the lightest

since the week ended July 28, when 13,914,661 shares changed hands.

California Demo Charge Rapped

WASHINGTON — Several House Republicans denounced on Saturday as a desperate political maneuver a charge by Rep. John Shelley, D-Calif., that Richard M. Nixon helped a Roman who was a leading Nazi enter the United States.

Shelley's House speech Friday night was a "frenzied personal attack" on the former vice president, said Rep. Steven B. Derounian, R-N.Y.

"This is obviously a desperate attempt by the Brown forces of California to bail out the reelection candidacy of Gov. Brown, which is sinking so rapidly that his adherents have thrown caution to the winds," Derounian said.

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
