

Board Waits Notification From Court

No Deadline Set For Return of Books

SALEM (AP)—It was not certain Monday how soon state-owned textbooks would be withdrawn from use in parochial schools, after a U.S. Supreme Court refusal to review an Oregon Supreme Court decision in the case.

The U.S. court's refusal to hear the case means the state court's decision will stand. The state court ruled that the use of the textbooks in parochial schools was unconstitutional.

After the Oregon court made its decision, however, it suspended enforcement pending a review by the U.S. Supreme Court.

The Supreme Court clerk said Monday the court would have to wait official notice from the national office of the refusal to review. The state court would then have to notify the Oregon City School District, which was the one specifically involved.

Notify Boards

Leon P. Minear, state superintendent of public instruction, said that upon this official notice, his department would notify local school boards throughout the state.

It would then be up to the local boards to comply with the law "as expeditiously as possible," Minear said.

He said he didn't know if the State Board of Education would want to set any official time limit on the withdrawal of the textbooks from parochial schools.

The time of withdrawal would vary in various districts, Minear said. "The problem will be to remove the books without any undue hardships on the students," he said.

State Constitution

The Oregon Supreme Court decision was based on a section in the State's Constitution which says, "no money may be drawn from the treasury for the benefit of any religion."

The state court's decision did not consider any U.S. constitutional questions. The decision came on an appeal from a ruling from Clackamas County Circuit Court Judge Ralph Holman.

Holman said the use of the textbooks was constitutional, but said he ruled that way because of many previous decisions, including some by the U.S. court. He disagreed with his own legal opinion by saying that he didn't think that was right, but he had no other choice.

The state court, however, considered only the state Constitution in its decision.

The practice of supplying state-owned textbooks to parochial schools is about 20 years old in Oregon.

The state court handed down its original opinion last Nov. 1, with Justice George Rossman dissenting. A petition for rehearing was denied last March. Rossman dissented on that, too.

Four to Attend Legion Sessions

Four residents of the Eugene-Springfield area will be delegates next week at the 44th annual national convention of the American Legion in Las Vegas, Nev.

Attending from this area will be Mrs. Frank Yok, commander of District No. 3; Karl Wagner, Eugene Post No. 3 and a national executive committee member; Myrl Garnett, Eugene Post 3 and vice commander of District No. 3; and Jack Larson, Springfield Post No. 40.

Mrs. Yok will serve on the legislative and rules committee, and will be a delegate for the 20-4, Echelon 5, an honorary women's veterans organization. Larson will serve on the constitution and amendments committee.

Army Engineers Seek Clearing Bids

Bids have been invited by the Portland U.S. Army Engineer District for clearing about 200 acres in the Fall Creek Reservoir area two miles northeast of Lowell.

The work is expected to cost about \$50,000. The bids will be opened Nov. 1 and work must be completed in 180 calendar days.

Fall Creek Dam is a \$27,800,000 flood control project now under construction on Fall Creek, a tributary of the Willamette River.

Lawyer Asks Elaboration

PORTLAND (AP)—Leo Smith said Monday the United States Supreme Court's refusal to review the Oregon Supreme Court's textbook decision means the state decision is final—but a further interpretation will be asked.

Smith, attorney for those seeking to overthrow the state decision that banned free textbooks for parochial schools, said, "We will ask the Supreme Court of the State of Oregon to make the mandate more clear so we know exactly what it means; how far reaching it is."

Of immediate concern, he said, is assurance that children in parochial schools be able to continue to use the texts they now have until the end of the school year. He said this had already been arranged by Portland's public school district in an action approved by Circuit Court.

"We will have to arrange with other districts to do the same. Education of the children can not be interrupted," he said.

Capsule Films Rated Superior

ROCHESTER, N. Y. (AP)—The film taken of Walter M. Schirra Jr. from inside his space capsule during his six-orbit flight is far superior in quality to those taken of the other American astronauts in space.

That is the conclusion of George Valdyke, director of in-capsule photographic instrumentation for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, after studying prints processed by the Eastman Kodak Co.

The film is a 330-foot strip shot from a 16-millimeter automatic pilot observer camera trained on Schirra throughout his flight last Wednesday.

Germany Gets Shipping Control

BONN, Germany (AP)—The government Saturday promulgated a regulation giving it control over cargo in West German ships sailing for Cuban ports.

The regulation, put through at the urging by the United States, requires all West German shippers to get governmental permission before entering into charter contracts with organizations and individuals in Cuba.

U. N. Chief Named

UNITED NATIONS (AP)—Bernard T. Twigg, Dutch economist, has been appointed chief administrative officer of the U.N. Congo operation, succeeding Habib Ahmed of Pakistan.

Civil Rights Speaker Sets Two Eugene Appearances

A public address on "The Civil Rights Revolution in America" will be given in Eugene tonight by James Farmer, national director of the Congress of Racial Equality (CORE).

Farmer will speak at 8 p.m. in Harris Hall at the Court House. His visit to Eugene is being co-sponsored by the Eugene Friends Meeting and the Lane County Fellowship for Civic Unity.

On Tuesday Farmer will address an assembly of students and faculty in Erb Memorial Union on the University of Oregon campus at 1 p.m.

Farmer has been connected with the integration efforts in the South in a variety of ways. He was one of the founders of CORE in 1942 and served as its first national chairman. He also served four years as race relations secretary of the Fellowship of Reconciliation.

In 1946-48 Farmer was in the Southern organizing drive of the Upholsters' International Union and more recently was international representative of the State, County and Municipal Employees organization.

Farmer was a leader in the Freedom Riders to Jackson, Miss., in 1961. He spent 40 days in various Mississippi jails as a result of his activities in that connection.

Dale Allore, chairman of the Jaycee project, said that some 500 seat belts were installed Saturday, and an additional 400 Sunday.

Logging show events will include spar tree climbing, tree topping, log sawing and chopping, log rolling and birling, and an exhibition of springboard topping.

Former Eugenean Named Secretary

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP)—Vern Hill, director of the Oregon Department of Motor Vehicles, was elected secretary of the American Assn. of Motor Vehicles last week.

Hill is a former police chief of Eugene.

The group held its annual convention here.

Lawrence F. Hashey, registrar of motor vehicles for Canada's New Brunswick province, was elected president.

Substitution Announced

Dame Judith Anderson, considered one of the world's leading actresses, will appear in Eugene in selections from "Medea" and "MacBeth" as one of the Broadway Theatre League presentations this season.

The BTL announced Monday that the presentation by Miss Anderson and a company of seven supporting players will replace "Gideon" in the BTL's four-show schedule. Her appearance is tentatively scheduled for April 26.

Miss Anderson (the Dame is a British title corresponding to knight) has played a wide range of roles on stage, in films and television. She won an "Emmy" award last year for her role as Lady MacBeth in the TV version of the Shakespearean play. She also played Mamma in the film version of "Cat on a Hot Tin Roof."

The Eugene presentation, part of a nationwide tour by Miss Anderson and company, will be of "highlight" scenes from the Greek and Shakespearean tragedies, according to the BTL. It will be done in costume and with sets.

'Flight Could Have Gone For 18 Orbits'—Schirra

HOUSTON, Texas—Astronaut Walter M. Schirra, acclaimed as a new space hero for his "textbook" perfect flight of six orbits around earth, actually could have stayed up for 18 orbits—an entire day.

Only a decision that was never made stopped him.

The 39-year-old Navy commander unfolded to the world Sunday the story of how he flew farther, faster and higher than any other American, of viewing brilliant "moonsets" and mysterious "space fireflies" and the grandeur of an eerie brownish-gray haze around earth.

Most Nearly Perfect

From his blast-off aboard an Atlas rocket at Cape Canaveral ("That railroad train you are sitting on really does move") to his Pacific Ocean landing Wednesday ("My space honeymoon was over") Schirra flew the most nearly perfect U. S. manned space flight.

The bushy-haired, quick-smiling spaceman summed it up himself: "The overall flight, I thought, was a textbook flight."

But through Schirra's mixture of weighty subjects and quips ran a common theme—the 18-orbit, day-long flight through space by an American. The astronaut made no bones about his own feelings on the subject: "I felt like I could have gone for a full day."

Then, almost casually, he stated flatly to nearly 400 newsmen and photographers at Rice University that the flight "could have gone for 18 orbits."

Evidence Supports Him

The technical evidence supported him. The orbit, carrying him to a U. S. record 176 miles into space, was high enough. His oxygen supply—28 hours—would have made it with several hours to spare.

The food and water could have been stretched to do the job. Recovery forces were stationed in the Atlantic, where he would have come down after a day.

But Schirra said "we had to cut short" at the planned six-orbit, nine-hour flight, because of "problems" involving deployment of the recovery forces and supplies aboard the spacecraft.

Despite the fact that he might have gotten by for a day with the oxygen, food and drink aboard the Sigma 7, he said such life-sustaining supplies will be increased on a one-day mission in space.

On the one-day mission, Schirra said, the astronaut

should be able to sleep for a period.

As for nausea, or "space sickness," experienced by Soviet cosmonaut Ghermann Titov, "I'm here to say there was no problem at all... no uneasiness, no queasiness," Schirra said.

Fuel No Problem

Schirra himself cleared up a final critical point: the supply of fuel that controlled the position of his Sigma 7 capsule in orbit.

"My intention was to use so little fuel that no one could argue that we had enough fuel... for 18 orbits, if we wanted it."

"I think I proved that point."

But someone had to give the "go" for 18 orbits. No one did. Apparently there were two reasons. First, there is the Mercury man-in-space program's adherence to a conservative, step-by-step approach that does not include taking chances.

Secondly, Mercury officials were not prepared for the stunning success that Schirra gave them. It caught them off balance.

There were some surprises, Schirra said and the biggest was the "brownish-gray haze that surrounds earth."

"By peering way down below I could still see stars below this layer and it surprised me. I thought I was seeing lighted areas in cities," he said.

Clark Appeal To Continue On Tuesday

A Eugene Civil Service Commission hearing into the firing of former police captain Donald Clark will resume at 9 a.m. Tuesday in the council chambers at the city hall.

Clark is appealing his suspension and subsequent discharge by City Manager Hugh McKinley. He seeks reinstatement and back pay for the period he has been off duty.

The first day of the hearing was held last Wednesday. Because one of the commission members, Ed Allen, Eugene attorney, had other commitments for last week, the hearing was then continued until this Tuesday.

City Atty. Herman Hendershott said last week he still has several witnesses to testify Tuesday morning. After that, Clark's attorney, Kenneth Morrow, will call witnesses to present Clark's side of the issue.

Eugenean Jailed On Assault Count

A 31-year-old Eugene man was arrested early Saturday on a charge of assault with a dangerous weapon following a disturbance in a downtown restaurant.

Jailed was William Malcolm Smithman, 674 Washington St. He was taken into custody at 3 a.m. by Eugene police outside of Denny's Restaurant, 150 W. Broadway.

Police said Smithman is accused of pulling a pocket knife during a disagreement with some students who were sitting at a table in the restaurant.
