

Trade Plan Wins Okay

LLANDUDNO, Wales (P)—Prime Minister Macmillan's government won overwhelming support from his Conservative party conference Thursday for taking Britain into the European Common Market.

Passionate pro-European speeches by Deputy Prime Minister Richard A. Butler and Deputy Foreign Minister Edward Heath called on Britain to accept her destiny and help lead Europe and the world to lasting peace and prosperity.

By a show of hands, the 4,500 delegates gave massive support to a motion calling on the government to continue the Brussels negotiations to link Britain with the six Common Market nations.

An amendment hostile to the Common Market was defeated, also on a show of hands.

The voting came after Heath received an ovation for a speech in which he declared:

"Europe is incomplete without Britain. And we in Britain are incomplete without Europe."

And he promised that this ancient island kingdom would not be swamped in the Common Market with her identity gone or her queen and Parliament downgraded.

Butler denied that the government faced a choice between the Commonwealth and the Common Market. He said Commonwealth countries would benefit from Britain's move into Europe. Their secondary industries would gain an expanding market, he declared, and Britain, with her prosperity increased, would be able to provide more development capital to meet Commonwealth needs.

Oregonian Joins Advisory Group

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Kennedy Wednesday named three replacements to the advisory commission on intergovernmental relations, including one from Oregon.

Barbara Archibald Cox, a Republican commissioner of Washington County, Ore., was selected to represent county officials. The commission studies and makes recommendations about the relations between local, state and federal governments.

U.S. Plans New Curbs On Shipping

To Discourage Trade With Cuba

WASHINGTON—The United States now plans to impose early next week a drastic schedule of penalties to discourage all Free World shipping from carrying Soviet bloc cargoes to Cuba.

The policy now being worked out in the form of detailed orders and presidential decrees would also ban U.S. shipping in the Cuban trade and have the effect of closing American ports to Soviet vessels.

While thus putting a further economic squeeze on the regime of Premier Fidel Castro, the United States is also emphasizing its sympathy with and concern for the Cuban people.

The best-informed officials do not see any serious prospect of a successful popular uprising against Soviet-backed Castro under present circumstances.

But Secretary of State Dean Rusk implied in a speech Tuesday that if the Cubans did eventually get their freedom they could look for help from the United States.

Rusk, speaking at the opening of the new Inter-American Defense College here, said the task of the American nations is to aid the deprived masses of the Western Hemisphere to improve their living conditions and secure "freedom from despotic rule."

"I would like to make it clear," he said, "that this pledge is extended to the oppressed people of Cuba as well."

U.S. officials said that there have been no really serious objections from Allied governments against the planned crackdown on shipping since they were informed of it—and it became public—a week or more ago.

National Lottery Favored By Harry to Pay Off Debt

LAS VEGAS (UPI)—Former President Harry S. Truman was to address the closing session of the American Legion's 44th annual convention Thursday.

Truman arrived Wednesday by plane and took up temporary residence in the Sands Hotel on the flashy Las Vegas Strip.

Gearing his news conference to this desert gambling city, Truman said he advocated a national lottery controlled by the federal government to pay off the national debt.

"When the federal government gets behind it and everybody knows it is absolutely fair, it isn't gambling," the former chief executive said.

"Take a look at the national lottery in Mexico," he said. "It almost pays for running the government—it's not the same as a crapshooting game."

Truman said his speech today would not be a political commentary but rather a minor "state of the union" message on the condition of the country. Following Truman's appearance the delegation winds up its meeting with election of new national officers. James Power, Macon, Ga., and Joseph Matthews, Ft. Worth, Tex., are leading contenders to succeed National Commander Charles L. Bacon, Kansas City, Mo., in the legion's top post.

K Ponders Trip to U.S.

MOSCOW (UPI)—Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev, just back from a three-week tour of troubled farm areas, was reported thinking hard Thursday about a possible November trip to the United Nations and summit talks with President Kennedy.

Khrushchev returned Wednesday night from a swing through the Soviet Union's central Asian areas to see for himself why farming continues to be a soft spot in the Soviet economy.

It was assumed he now would have more opportunity to concentrate on such international problems as Berlin and Cuba and Moscow was filled with rumors that he would go to the United States.

There was no official confirmation that such a trip is planned but senior foreign diplomats and highly placed Soviet sources said Khrushchev appeared to be giving it active consideration.

Test Ban Refrains Repeated at U.N.

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y.—Pressure by smaller nations apparently had failed Thursday to bring the Soviet Union and the West any closer to agreement on a nuclear test ban.

U. S. Ambassador Adlai E. Stevenson made it clear Wednesday that the United States and Britain will have nothing to do with another uncontrolled moratorium on nuclear testing as demanded by Moscow and some neutrals.

"Where national security is concerned, an open society cannot undertake with a closed society an arrangement which cannot be verified," Stevenson told the General Assembly's Main Political Committee.

Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Valerian A. Zorin repeated the Moscow refrain that the United States just wants international inspections for "espionage" purposes.

The United States, Russia and India opened the annual debate on nuclear tests, and were to be followed Thursday afternoon by Italy, Brazil, Ireland, Yugoslavia, Austria and possibly a few others.

The general policy debate continued Thursday morning in the General Assembly with speeches by the Dominican Republic, Saudi Arabia, Madagascar, Somalia, Central African Republic, Tanganyika and Iraq.

Stevenson repeated the U.S. offer to sign a treaty banning all nuclear tests and providing for international inspection only on suspected underground explosions; or to outlaw all, except underground blasts without international inspection.

But he said a voluntary unverified moratorium does not reduce tensions, or build mutual confidence, or stop the perils of fallout, or brake the arms race. Stevenson noted that Russia has had two test series within the last year and the United States is completing a series begun last spring.

"If the USSR is satisfied with the progress in its present testing program, a rare period of equilibrium may have been reached in this sector of the arms race," he said. "This is a time, therefore, when firm insistence by the General Assembly can forestall another cycle of nuclear tests. Let us make the most of this decisive moment before it passes from us."

President Receives Protection Measure

WASHINGTON (AP)—Congress has sent to President Kennedy a bill providing full-time Secret Service protection for the vice president.

The measure approved this week by the Senate also authorizes protection for vice presidents-elect and for a former president for a reasonable time after he leaves office if he requests it.

Reds Renew Demand For Troika

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP)—The Soviet Union Thursday renewed its demands that the U.N. secretary-general be replaced by a three-man board. The United States promptly assailed the so-called troika plan as a threat to the integrity of the U.N. Secretariat.

The exchange took place in the General Assembly's Budgetary Committee during general review of the organization's financial and administrative problems.

Soviet Delegate P. M. Tchermychev asserted the world's three main political blocs — Communist, Neutralist and Western — should have equal representation in the secretariat from top to bottom.

The U.S. delegate, Sen. Gordon Allott, R-Colo., said attacks on the "international character and on the integrity of the secretariat" were causing just as much concern as the financial plight of the United Nations.

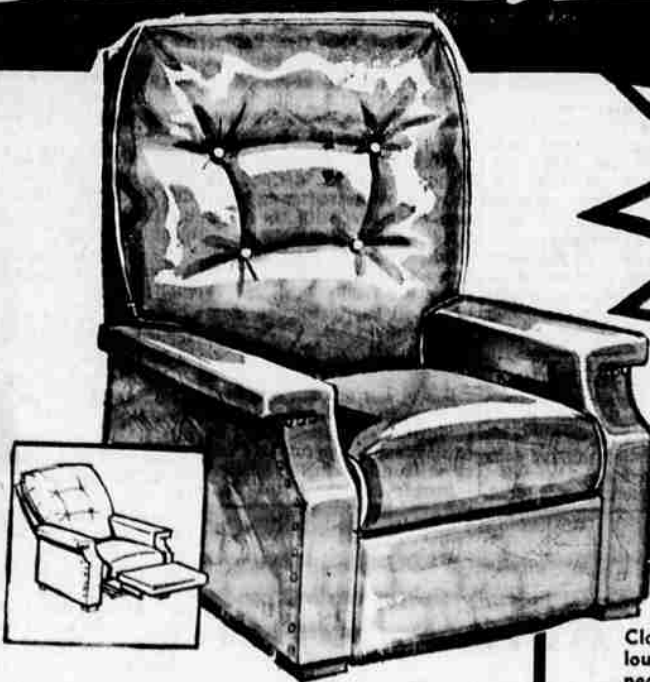

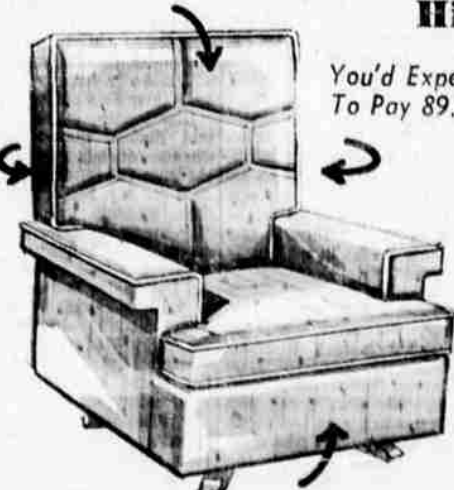
