

Text of Kennedy Letter

WASHINGTON (AP)—The text of a letter sent Saturday night by President Kennedy to Soviet Premier Khrushchev on the Cuban crisis follows:

Dear Mr. Chairman: I have read your letter of Oct. 26 with great care and welcomed the statement of your desire to seek a prompt solution to the problem. The first thing that needs to be done, however, is for work to cease on offensive missile bases in Cuba and for all weapons systems in Cuba capable of offensive use to be rendered inoperable, under effective United Nations arrangements.

Assuming this is done promptly, I have given my

representatives in New York instructions that will permit them to work out this week-end—in cooperation with the acting secretary-general and your representative—an arrangement for a permanent solution to the Cuban problem along the lines suggested in your letter of Oct. 26. As I read your letter, the key elements of your proposal—which seem generally acceptable as I understand them—are as follows:

(1) You would agree to remove these weapons systems from Cuba under appropriate United Nations observation and supervision; and undertake, with suitable safeguards, to halt the further

introduction of such weapons systems into Cuba.

(2) We, on our part, would agree—upon the establishment of adequate arrangements through the United Nations to insure the carrying out and continuation of these commitments—(A) to remove promptly the quarantine measures now in effect and (B) to give assurances against an invasion of Cuba. I am confident that other nations of the Western Hemisphere would be prepared to do likewise.

If you will give your representative similar instructions, there is no reason why we should not be able to complete these arrangements and

announce them to the world within a couple of days. The effect of such a settlement on easing world tensions would enable us to work toward a more general arrangement regarding "other armaments," as proposed in your second letter which you made public. I would like to say again that the United States is very much interested in reducing tensions and halting the arms race; and if your letter signifies that you are prepared to discuss a detente affecting NATO and the Warsaw Pact, we are quite prepared to consider with our allies any useful proposals.

But the first ingredient, let me emphasize, is cessation of work on missile sites in Cuba and measures to render such weapons inoperable, under effective international guarantees. The continuation of this threat, or a prolonging of this discussion concerning Cuba by linking these problems to the broader questions of European and world security, would surely lead to an intensification of the Cuban crisis and a grave risk to the peace of the world. For this reason I hope we can quickly agree along the lines outlined in this letter and in your letter of Oct. 26.

(The letter was dated Oct. 27, and was signed "John F. Kennedy.")

Production Policies Unchanged

Food Stocks Adequate

WASHINGTON (AP)—U. S. food stocks are so large now that Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman feels only a widespread conflict like World War II would require all-out farm production.

Freeman told reporters Saturday there would be no need to change any of the country's present farm production policies in the event the Soviet-Cuban crisis should lead to a limited,

Korean-type engagement.

A re-evaluation would be needed, he said, if nuclear war should come "because no one knows what such a war would do."

The nation now has adequate stocks of food and fiber to meet needs such as were involved in the Korean engagement, he said. Present foodstocks are more than 50 per cent larger than when the Korean war began in 1950.

The population increased from 151 million to 179 million during the interval between 1950 and 1960.

Freeman met for more than three hours Friday with the Agriculture Dept. civil defense board. He told reporters that the department's defense machinery is in an advanced state of readiness.

Freeman said, "We know the location of every commodity and its volume. And we know the

best means of transporting commodities to any area."

If war should come, Freeman said, his department is ready to take control of all food and agricultural supplies. A master plan for this was worked out more than a year ago.

The secretary said his department has detected "no real scare-buying of any kind" since the Cuban crisis developed.

Top Russ Film Showing Today

The outstanding Russian film of 1961, "A Summer to Remember," will be the University Film Society feature today.

The film is the story of a 5-year-old Russian boy getting to know and love his stepfather.

DuBois Rites Set Monday

Funeral services for Mrs. Albia (Lillian B.) DuBois, formerly of Eugene, will be held Monday in Salem.

Mrs. DuBois died at her Salem home last Wednesday. She was 87.

She had been an Oregon resident since 1931, moving here from South Dakota. She moved from Eugene about four years ago.

Her husband and two brothers preceded her in death.

She is survived by two sons, one daughter, three sisters, three brothers, eight grandchildren and two great grandchildren, none of which live in Eugene.

Services will be in the Virgil T. Golden Chapel in Salem at 2 p.m. Monday.

Tobacco-Health Probe Planned

WASHINGTON (AP)—The government took final action Saturday aimed at starting a broad new study by non-biased scientists on the controversy over whether tobacco smoking has adverse health effects such as lung cancer.

The 10-man Advisory Committee on Smoking and Health will meet Nov. 9-10 in Washington.

The committee, selected by Surgeon General Luther Terry, has a two-fold mission:

1. To make a "comprehensive review of all available data on smoking and other factors in the environment that may affect health"—a study expected to last about six months.

2. To make recommendations for action at the completion of the study.

With Johnson was a woman identified as Naomi Elaine Peterson, Eugene. She was not held.

Market Fluctuations Reflect World Crisis

NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market last week mirrored the hopes and fears of the nation, making dramatic moves both to the upside and the downside, and ending with a slight loss on the average.

Stocks fell as "crisis conferences" were called mysteriously Monday in Washington, took the worst loss in four months as President Kennedy ordered the arms quarantine of Cuba, more than wiped out the loss as Wall Street heard that Soviet Premier Khrushchev had messaged British philosopher Bertrand Russell that he would "not be provoked by unwarranted actions of the United States."

Once more they fell as the financial community became aware of the fact Khrushchev's message was not conciliatory, but the stock movement was much smaller than those that

preceded it. As the U.S. Navy put the arms quarantine into effect, the market was irregularly lower at worst, with traders pulling in their horns to await the next major confrontation of the world powers.

The Dow Jones industrial average was off 4.27 to 569.02 on the week.

The weekly change in the Dow industrials was trivial compared with its drop of 10.54 Tuesday and its rebound of 18.62 Wednesday—one of the greatest one-day gains of a hectic year. Prior to 1962 it would have been a record-breaker.

With the ticker tape running as much as 59 minutes behind transactions when trading was at its heaviest, weekly volume soared to 25,062,280 shares from 16,682,390 the week before.

Anti-Aircraft Arms Guard Key West

Military Buildup Still Underway

KEY WEST, Fla. (AP)—Anti-aircraft missiles have sprouted along a Key West beach, climaxing a week-long influx of military elements at this island city 90 miles from Cuba.

Army details hastily arranged mobile radar equipment and cushioned rocket launchers.

A heavily traveled boulevard adjacent to the missile site allowed the public a clear view of the proceedings.

A baseball park was leased to the Army this week by the Key West City Commission, to be used as a motor pool parking area.

Hotel Rented

Units set up at the missile site arrived this week by truck convoy from a Florida rail line where a troop train had unloaded them.

A 185-room hotel and a servants' dormitory were rented to the Army for troop billeting. Hotel owner Sam Hyman declined to say how long the hotel, which he said could accommodate 1,000 men, would be under lease.

Military vessels, including destroyers, tankers and buoy tenders, move in and out of the Key West Naval Station. Some of the vessels disappear into the Florida Straits.

Formations of jets land at Boca Chica Naval Air Station on nearby Stock Island.

Jets Increase

The number of the supersonic Navy F3H Demon jet fighters has increased during the past few days. The planes, presumably armed with 20-mm guns and infrared guidance rockets, patrol the Key West area. Their top speed is about 1,400 miles per hour.

Large transport planes have been arriving and departing from Boca Chica, bringing more and more men for the swiftly expanding Key West garrison.

But a number of motel managers said arrival of weekend tourists was at its usual pace.
