

India to Recall U.N. Forces

NEW DELHI (AP)—India plans to bring home its U.N. forces to battle the Chinese Communist invaders, a Foreign Office spokesman announced Tuesday.

Indian villagers will also be taught to shoot in the government's hard-pressed efforts to stem a Chinese drive that has overrun 2,000 square miles of borderland and thrust one spearhead into undisputed Indian territory.

India has troops with U.N. forces in both the Congo and the Middle East.

The spokesman indicated that withdrawal of India's well-seasoned brigade of 5,700 men from the U.N. Congo force may still be some time in the future, however.

Diefenbaker Evaluates Cuban Crisis

TORONTO (AP)—Prime Minister John Diefenbaker says the Cuban crisis brought the world to "the brink of war" but it gave everyone three clear warnings:

(1) The nuclear arms race must be halted; (2) Nuclear testing must be ended; (3) Consultation between nations must be prerequisite to joint action in any future world crisis.

Speaking to 700 delegates Monday night at a convention of the Zionist Organization of Canada, Diefenbaker said:

"As I look back on the Cuban crisis, I believe that it emphasized more than ever before the necessity of there being full consultation before any action taken or policies executed, between our nations or as respect of our nations, that might lead to war."

The prime minister said there was never any doubt where Canada stood in the Cuban crisis—"We stood where freedom stood in the last two weeks."

He supported President Kennedy's demand for dismantling of Soviet rocket sites in Cuba and a blockade against shipment of offensive arms to the Castro regime, but said consultations among those "joined on the side of freedom" was a prerequisite to joint action.

Diefenbaker said that while the height of the crisis apparently has passed, deeper causes remain. He declared one of the major sources of instability is the "precarious balance of armed force."

Berlin Mayor Approves Plan

BERLIN (AP)—Mayor Willy Brandt said Monday that he is still prepared to accept international control of access routes by land to West Berlin that could include organs of Communist-ruled East Germany.

Brandt told a news conference the inclusion of East Germans in an international control organization would not necessarily mean recognition of the Communist regime.

The East Germans already control all civilian traffic on highway access lanes. Military traffic of the three Western powers occupying West Berlin is controlled by the Soviets.

'Author Dead at 89

AMHERST, Mass. (AP)—Howard R. Garis, 89, internationally known author of children's stories under the name of "Uncle Wiggly," died in a hospital at Northampton, Monday.

His more than 200 books included the "Uncle Wiggly" series, "The Rocket Riders," the "Teddy" series and many others.

Russ Backs Cuban Action

MOSCOW (AP)—Deputy Premier Alexei Kosygin declared Tuesday that withdrawal of Soviet rockets from Cuba was "a concession to common sense."

At the same time he pledged to help Cuba defend its sovereignty.

"We helped and will continue to help the Cuban people defend their sacred right to peace," Kosygin said.

He spoke at a rally in the Kremlin auditorium on the eve of the celebration of the 45th anniversary of the Bolshevik Revolution.

Premier Khrushchev and other leaders of the Soviet government and Communist party were on the platform.

Kosygin also expressed regret over the fighting on the Indian-Chinese border. He urged immediate negotiations.

"The sooner these negotiations start," he said, "the better for the cause of peace."

Magazine Boasts

MOSCOW (AP)—The magazine Nedyelya says there were 121 marriages per 10,000 people in the Soviet Union in 1960 compared with 95 in the United States. Giving credit to Communist society, it said divorces that year were fewer in the Soviet Union — 13 per 10,000 people compared with 22 per 10,000 in the United States.

Official to Testify On Spiegel Affair

BONN, Germany (AP)—Justice Minister Wolfgang Stammberger will appear before the Bundestag (parliament) Wednesday to answer questions on the Der Spiegel affair which is rocking West Germany.

The uproar over the legal action taken against the weekly newsmagazine led to a government crisis. This ended Monday when Chancellor Konrad Adenauer agreed to oust the No. 2 men in the Defense and Justice Ministries.

Stammberger was to make a report Tuesday to the legal committee of the Bundestag. He postponed this in order to prepare for his appearance before the full house Wednesday to answer 18 questions on the Spiegel affair put by the opposition Social Democratic party.

The party wants to know whether illegal measures were used.

Publisher Rudolf Augstein and four staff members of Der Spiegel are under arrest on suspicion of committing treason in publishing an article which allegedly contained military secrets.

Widespread suspicion has been voiced that the magazine was being punished for its frequent attacks on Chancellor Konrad Adenauer's government and Defense Minister Franz Josef Strauss in particular.

The responsible minister, Stammberger, had not been fully informed of the investigation planned against Der Spiegel and found out only the day after a raid was carried out at its offices and papers seized.

The justice minister and his Free Democratic party threatened to pull out of the government because Stammberger was kept in the dark.

Woman Joins State Agency

SALEM (AP)—The deputy clerk of the Oregon Supreme Court, Mrs. Wanda Miller of Salem, has been named an assistant attorney general assigned to the State Agriculture Department, it was announced Monday.

She fills a new position in the Agriculture Department. Mrs. Miller has been deputy clerk of the high court the past 3½ years. She formerly worked with the rules committee of the Oregon House.

Mrs. Mildred Oldenberg, Salem, was named acting deputy clerk until a successor for Mrs. Miller is found.

Red Party Boss of Bulgaria May Take Over Premiership

VIENNA (UPI)—Communist affairs experts said Tuesday that Bulgarian Communist boss Todor Zhivkov may grab the premiership for himself, replacing "Stalinist" Anton Yugov who was purged Monday with apparent Soviet approval.

The experts said Zhivkov appears to be following in the footsteps of Nikita Khrushchev, who fired Premier Nikolai Bulganin and took his job on the pretext that Bulganin was a member of an "anti-party group."

Zhivkov announced at the opening of a Communist convention in Sofia Monday that Yugov and five other officials had lost government jobs and had been dismissed from the Communist Central Committee.

Ex-Premier Vulko Chervenkov, whose resignation in 1956 opened Zhivkov's path to power, was kicked out of the Communist party altogether. He had been dropped from the Central Committee earlier in the year.

Like Bulganin, Yugov was accused of forming a faction to undermine party unity. Chervenkov was said to have been one of his associates.

The other ousted officials were said to have "violated the norms of party life and socialist legality."

They were Deputy Premier Georgi Tsankov, Ambassador to East Germany Roussi Hristozov, Ambassador to Red China Georgi Kumbiliev and Central Committee members Ivan Raikov and Apostol Kolchev.

Observers here said the dismissals were the latest move in the fight against the "Stalinist" wing of the Communist party in Bulgaria, once led by Chervenkov and more recently by Yugov.

It also appeared likely that the purged officials would be saddled with the blame for recent setbacks in farming and industry in Bulgaria.

Traffic Toll Down

TOKYO (AP)—Traffic deaths in Japan totaled 9,028 for the first 10 months of the year, national police report. This is 1,200 fewer than were killed in the same period of 1961.

Soviets Laud Bulgarians

SOFIA, Bulgaria (AP)—Bulgarian Communists won praise Tuesday from the Kremlin's top party theoretician for backing the "peaceful coexistence" foreign policy preached by Soviet Premier Khrushchev.

Mikhail Suslov, the theoretician, also gave Moscow's approval for the purge of Stalinists from Bulgarian party and government posts, including Premier Anton Yugov and a half a dozen others.

Suslov, head of the Soviet delegation to the eighth Bulgarian party congress, told the 1,055 delegates: "Under its capable leadership, the Bulgarian party has kept itself clean by its struggle against dogmatism, revisionism and sectarianism."

A significant factor in the Bulgarian purge was the ouster of Georgi Kumbiliev, ambassador to Red China.

The strained relations between Moscow and Peiping were clearly evident in proceedings here.

Siletz Receives Disaster Funds

SALEM (AP)—Gov. Mark Hatfield said Tuesday that the city of Siletz, in Lincoln County, has been granted financial assistance under the disaster relief funds made available to the state.

Siletz was the first Oregon city to have its application for federal assistance approved.

The Office of Emergency Planning for the region approved an application for \$19,332, to provide assistance as reimbursement for cost of emergency repairs to the city's water system.
