

Smith Adds Prize To Growing Total

Eugene's Jim Smith: best bowler in the state of Oregon. Jim proved it beyond any doubt Sunday, setting or equaling four records in easily winning the Oregon State Men's match game championship in Portland.

Despite averaging 209 — including 21 games over 200 — it wasn't the highest Smith has ever averaged in tournament play.

He had a 216 average late this summer at Maxie Kosof's World Open Classic in La Habra, Calif. But still, Smith rates his performance in Portland as his best ever in a match game tourney.

Next it's a quick stop in Denver, Jan. 9, before going on to Kansas City for the National All-Star tourney in Kansas City a week later.

The Portland victory, Smith figures is worth more than \$500 to him.

By winning, he has his entry fees, travel costs and expenses paid to the Kansas City tournament.

"It's looking a little better as things go along," Jim says of his financial future in bowling, the key to whether he'd stay with it as a profession when he first embarked on the new

career less than a year ago.

★ Some 33 bowlers will have their pocket books fattened by participating in the third annual Register-Guard doubles tournament which begins this weekend at Eugene Recreation.

Top prize in the tourney will be \$50 and trophies. Second through 15th prizes are scaled from \$38 to \$12 and the 16th through 33rd finishers will pocket \$10.

The entry list has 304 names (152 teams) on it, making it necessary to have 13 flights with eight or 12 teams in each. The first bowlers begin play Saturday at 2 p.m. while the last ones get going until Sunday, Nov. 25, sometime late in the evening.

University of Oregon bowlers have had a monopoly on first prize the first two years, and don't be surprised to see one of their teams on top again this year. Seven pairs are entered. Larry Moore and Bob Erickson teamed up to take top honors in 1960 and Jack Anderson and Lou Bellissimo took home first prize last year.

Bellissimo and Anderson will be back to defend their title this year.

Only one other local tournament—the Junior-Adult tourney to be held at Emerald Lanes Dec. 8-9—is scheduled this year, though there are several slated next spring.

★ A survey taken of Portland bowlers revealed some interesting, if not surprising, answers to questions.

Asked how they got their starts in bowling, more than 25 per cent of the men and 35 per cent of the women said they became interested through friends. While more than 11 per cent of the women became interested in the sport because of free bowling lessons, only

12 per cent of the men gave this reason.

Among other reasons listed: through their work, through relatives or family members, out of curiosity, because a doctor recommended it and, naturally, "can't remember."

The one factor that keeps people bowling seems to differ between men and women. The ladies enjoy the recreation while the men most enjoy the competition.

Better than 95 per cent of the persons queried claimed they watch the bowling programs on television.

★ Only two local keggers rolled triplicates this week, but the splits are still being picked up every night.

Ray Emerald, bowling in the Western League at Westgate Lanes, had a 181 triplicate, and Craig Tomlinson had three 150s in a row at Emerald Lanes in the Charter League.

The splits converted, since last report, were by Moe Hilliard and Jean Rathrock (3-7), Leona Guthrie (4-10), Dolores Olsen, Bill Bischoff and Wanda Bonney (5-10), and Ray Murdoch, Larry Max and Fred Cunningham (5-7).

Others were Harry Frank, Ruth Drew and Bernice Blackman (6-7), June Reher (3-10), Ann Reay (7-9) and Ruby Woodland (5-8-10).

Drysdale Honored

ST. LOUIS (AP)—The Sporting News named Los Angeles Dodger right-hander Don Drysdale as major league pitcher of the year Tuesday. Drysdale won 25 games and lost 9 for the second-place Dodgers. He led all hurlers in strikeouts with 232, and in innings pitched with 314.

Carter Gets 772 Series

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Don Carter, all-time bowling great from St. Louis, has come through with another outstanding performance.

Carter, who won the Rochester open, bowled a 771 series on games of 245, 269 and 258. He did it after eight hours of driving and without a single game of practice.

With the aid from Carter, local amateur Jim Daly took the first prize of \$1,500. Daly from West Collingswood, N.J., rolled 567. With a 60-pin handicap added, the winning team score was 1,399. This was 78 points better than the rest of the field.

Pro Tommy Tuttle of King, N.C., and amateur Jim Biggins of Philadelphia took second place. Tuttle bowled 689 while Biggins contributed a 608 with a 24-pin handicap for an overall total of 1,321.

Invitational Calls Top Bowlers

CHICAGO (NEA)—The elite of the lanes will grace bowling's most glittering affair, the sixth annual World's Invitational Match Game tournament in Chicago's elegant McCormick Place Nov. 15-25.

The soiree is so exclusive that not even the standard society complement of 400 of the smart set was invited. Only 128 men and 64 women received bids to the uppercrust soiree. They were culled from keggers' social register of 28 states, D.C., Canada, Australia, Japan and Mexico.

The creme de la creme of the men—some 30—were issued automatic invitations because they had won a major championship, a professional bowlers association tour tournament or were among the top five and 10-year average holders.

The lion of the stag line will be the master Don Carter, defending champion who has won the invitational four times. Carter had the most "automatic" invitations with five. Eddie Lubanski of Detroit, the only man other than Carter to win the Invitational, will be back as

will Dick Weber.

Weber looked like the only man around who could topple Carter from his position of eminence until he injured a finger last season. The diminutive St. Louisian might be recovered enough by now to do it. Weber gained admittance to the Invitational by virtue of winning two PBA tournaments, the Bowling Proprietors Assn. of America National All-Star and being a leader in averages.

Among those present will be Billy Golembiewski of Detroit, winner of the Masters and National Doubles (with Joe Joseph) and the new Philadelphia whiz kid Jack Winters, who knocked off the Classic All-Events.

All the old standbys will be on hand, along with a flock of newcomers to these exalted circles. Among the Johnny-come-latelies will be the PBA national champion Dave Souter of Detroit, Teata Semiz, of Milford, N.J., who won the Eastern Open and Jack Charter, Glen Blakesley and Skip Vigars who gained national prominence on the tournament circuit.

The men will roll 36 qualifying games, with the 15 high scorers joining Carter—who is exempt from qualifying—in round-robin, head-to-head finals where each bowler will meet each other finalist in a four-game match. The winner will receive \$7,500 of the \$48,240 total prize money.

Marge Merrick of Columbus, Ohio, will defend the women's crown. Three other invitational winners are in the field. They are Marion Ladewig of Grand Rapids, Mich., the only double winner with triumphs in 1957 and '60; Charlotte Grubie, Steelton, Pa., who won in 1958 and Olga Gloor, the 1959 champion from Chicago.

Holders of every major American women's pin title will be there, including Dot Wilkinson of Phoenix, Ariz., Women's International Bowling Congress Queens' champion and Flossie Argent of St. Louis, WIBC All-Events winner. Shirley Garms, Chicago's BPAA

National All-Star champion; Betty Kuczynski and Joy Abel, Chicago, national doubles champions and Stevie Balogh of Cleveland, Women's Professional Bowlers' Association titleholder, also will compete.

The winner of the women's division will receive \$4,000.

And, like the man who wins, find a secure place among bowling's bon ton.

Salvino Nabs PBA Crown

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Carman Salvino of Chicago is the new national champion of the Professional Bowlers Association (PBA). He rolled 287 and 238 in the final games.

Salvino finished ninth at the end of Friday's play, then tied for third with Don Ellis of Houston, with two games to go. He defeated Ellis both times, 267-235 and 238-179.

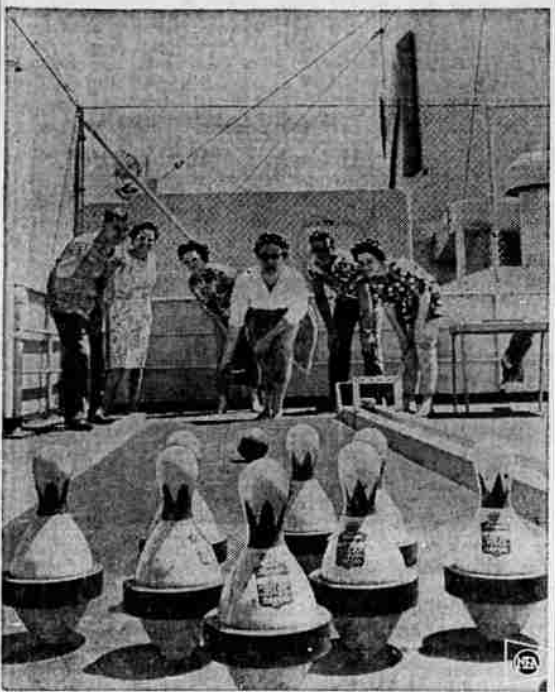
Detroit's Dave Souter, who led until then, was dropped to fifth spot by Don Carter of St. Louis. Carter, who wound up second, beat Souter 253-204 in the first game. They tied 227 in the second round. Souter is the retiring champion.

Salvino had 193.29 points as reckoned by the PBA, one point for each victory and one for each group of 30 pins bowled over. The 29 means he had 29 more points, just one short of another full point.

Salvino took first place money of \$6,500 along with the championship.

Carter, with 193.10 points, earned \$3,500. Third was George Howard of Detroit, 191.15 and \$2,500. Joe Joseph of Lansing, Mich., was fourth with 191.14 and \$2,000.

Over the 24 games Salvino racked up 5,369 pins, Carter 5,305.
