

# India Cites Red Buildup

NEW DELHI (AP)—A government spokesman said Tuesday Chinese Communist armies are massing along "the entire frontier."

Home Minister Lal Bahadur Shastri told the upper house that the "preparations of the Chinese are along the entire frontier with India—the whole of this area is flooded with Chinese armies."

Shastri was winding up debate on motions of national emergency seeking approval of Parliament for the government's military measures in the still undeclared border war with Red China. "We cannot be complacent," the minister warned, "about any

## Simplicity Stressed By Prelates

VATICAN CITY (AP)—Bishops at the Roman Catholic Ecumenical Council were urged Tuesday to avoid "a display of luxury and satisfaction of personal vanity" in their churches and ministry.

A spokesman said several of the 23 prelates who addressed a closed session in St. Peter's said bishops should recognize the elements of simplicity.

The council fathers discussed sacred art and music—altar vestments and objects. These subjects are included in a project that proposes new guidelines and changes in the public worship of Catholicism. Tuesday's was the last session on liturgy, or public worship, before debate starts on sources of divine revelation.

The council spokesman said several speakers noted that the church has always accepted all forms of religious art through the centuries without adopting any particular style of its own.

Some bishops urged creation of "superior schools of sacred art" that would blend both religious inspiration and the best norms of art training.

Other bishops speaking before the 2,200 council fathers at the session, the spokesman said, stressed that sacred art must find its complement in the special traditions of different regions.

Red troops already have occupied thousands of square miles of Indian-claimed territory in Ladakh on the western front and in the northeast frontier. The frontier winds through the Himalayas for about 2,000 miles.

There were no reports of fighting in either Ladakh or the northeast frontier Tuesday. A defense spokesman reported "active patrolling" by Indian troops in both sectors but said "no clashes have occurred."

Officials representing Communist China at the embassy here and the consulates in Bombay and Calcutta have burned all their records and important documents in apparent anticipation of a diplomatic break with India, authoritative sources reported.

Nehru earlier this week warned that New Delhi, Bombay and Calcutta might be the targets of Communist Chinese bombing raids.

India appeared to be united more firmly under Nehru's leadership than ever as he prepared for Wednesday's celebration of his 73rd birthday.

Communist China's human-wave border attacks and staggering early successes which left 2,500 soldiers dead or missing "jolted India's masses like none of the appeals which Nehru has made for Indian unity."

Nehru's opponents regard it as ironic that one of his biggest miscalculations has been more responsible than his successes for India's emergence as a unified nation 440 million strong.

# Cuba Claims Saboteurs' Plot Foiled

HAVANA, Cuba (AP)—Premier Fidel Castro's government claimed Tuesday it captured a Cuban it described as the U.S. Central Intelligence Agency's "principal agent" in Cuba before he could sabotage the country's copper and nickel mining industry.

A communique printed in all of Havana's morning newspapers identified him as Miguel Angel Orozco Crespo, arrested a few days ago in Pinar del Rio Province by state security police.

The communique said another man identified as Pedro Vera Ortiz and a large amount of weapons and explosives were captured with Orozco.

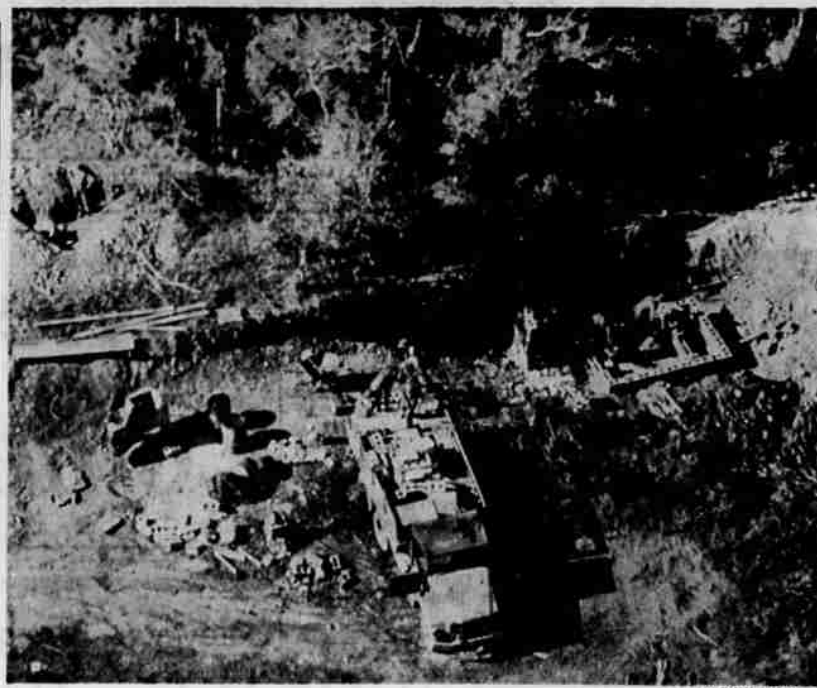
The government said the captures smashed a plot to blow up the Matahambre and Nicaro mines in Pinar del Rio and Oriente provinces.

The communique said Orozco admitted that he and two groups of saboteurs landed clandestinely in Cuba were sent by the CIA to "carry out acts of sabotage and espionage."

The first of these acts, the communique said, was to destroy the system of aerial transport and the high voltage wires at the Matahambre mines. It said that 400 miners would have lost their lives here if workers operating the aerial link cars had not seen the explosives in two of the towers anchoring the cable railway.

The communique said Orozco admitted that, after sabotaging Matahambre, he and his colleagues were going to do the same with the Nicaro mines in order to "cause grave damage to our economy."

According to the newspaper stories printed about him, Cozco was born at Encrujada in Las Villas Province. He was described as having been an army lieutenant during the regime of former President Fulgencio Batista and in charge of sabotage and espionage groups in Pinar del Rio.

# Marines Call Off Exercise

GUANTANAMO BAY, Cuba—The U. S. Marines called off a show of armored force Tuesday along the fence between this naval base and Cuba. It apparently had been intended to impress Cuban militiamen who had been throwing rocks at the leathernecks.

Plans for a parade of tanks were announced Monday night in a notice posted at the base news center.

"There will be an armored run along the fence at 8:30 a.m." it said.

A hurried conference was held in the headquarters of Rear Adm. Edward J. O'Donnell, the base commander, after news of the plan was sent to the United States. The show was canceled.

The notice posted at the news

center did not say how many tanks would take part, nor give an official reason for the display.

In one incident, Capt. Patrick E. O'Toole of San Clemente, Calif., said militiamen began throwing rocks at Marines building a machinegun bunker at one point along the 25-mile fence.

A small American flag, which Cpl. Gordon L. Fine of San Clemente had raised, was flying over the bunker.

Capt. O'Toole said the Marines reacted like "good professionals." They kept on building the bunker.

So far not a shot has been fired along the fence and no one has been hurt by flying rocks.

Adm. O'Donnell said the Marines have shown remarkable training and discipline.

O'Toole said: "The Cubans are starting to make this a personal war and if we ever have to go after them, they are going to wish they had never started throwing rocks."

"We don't get mad," said Cpl. Fine, "but we just wish they would quit messing around or somebody would give us the word to go."

In another incident, Lance Cpl. Douglas Atwood of Louisville, Ky., was stoned by some Cuban sentries Sunday night.

Adm. O'Donnell said the only Marine casualties were two men seriously wounded about Nov. 3 by "an explosion." The Marines were reported to have wandered into a mine field, but the admiral gave no details.

Guantanamo's heavily armed alert will stay in force, he said, "so long as the situation is as it is."

# Nixon Aide Raps 'Equal Time' Offer

NEW YORK (AP)—A former aide of Richard M. Nixon has assailed an offer of equal air time for the ex-vice president to balance a television program on which convicted perjurer Alger Hiss and others discussed Nixon's political career.

Robert H. Finch, who as administrative assistant to Nixon during his vice presidency, said Monday night the American Broadcasting Co. offer of equal time to the man who helped put Hiss in jail was an "atrocious, pathetic gesture."

Protests against the appearance of Hiss on the Sunday night program continued.

## Ike Sought To Balk Hiss Appearance

BUFFALO, N. Y. (AP)—Former President Eisenhower attempted to block the appearance of Hiss on a now-controversial television program dealing with Richard Nixon's political career, it was reported.

Republican National Chairman William E. Miller said Eisenhower tried to persuade James C. Hagerty, his former press secretary and now vice president in charge of news at the American Broadcasting Co., to cancel Hiss' appearance.

Miller said he learned of this when he tried to stop the ABC program after receiving calls from constituents. Miller is the congressman from New York's 40th District.

"I got in touch with one of General Eisenhower's aides," Miller said. "I learned," he added, "that the general had already tried to intervene through Jim Hagerty and Hagerty would not do anything about it."

Miller was interviewed at Buffalo General Hospital, where he is undergoing a physical examination.

"were similar in form. I don't regard it as particularly representative. The more thoughtful people don't complain about an event like this; only those who have been stirred up. So I haven't taken it very seriously."

He said he had not been vindictive toward Nixon on the show, and asserted: "Certainly it is no fun to take a kick at somebody who is slipping."

Nixon was a congressman serving on the House Committee on Un-American Activities when Hiss, then a high-ranking State Department official, appeared before the committee in 1948 and first denied he was part of the Communist espionage ring. The same denial before a grand jury later led to perjury charges.

Democratic Sen. Thomas J. Dodd of Connecticut sent a protest telegram to ABC and the Federal Communications Commission, expressing his "personal disgust" at the network's allowing Hiss "to sit in judgment" of Nixon. He said he asked the FCC to "investigate this entire incident."

Dodd said he has had "many political differences" with Nixon, a Republican, "but what is involved here has nothing to do with politics."

"It seems to me incredible that millions of viewers who turned in to see a Veterans Day program about our armed forces should have been treated to the spectacle of a distinguished American public servant being vilified by a convicted perjurer and a traitor to this country," Dodd said.

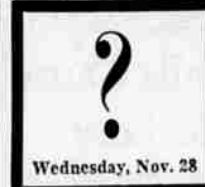
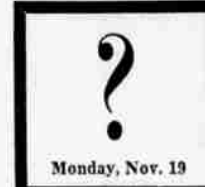
Four Cancellations The program, entitled "The Political Obituary of Richard M. Nixon," was aired in place of a scheduled ABC program about the armed forces. Both taped programs featured Howard K. Smith as commentator.

The Nixon show was recorded after his unsuccessful political comeback try in last Tuesday's California gubernatorial election.

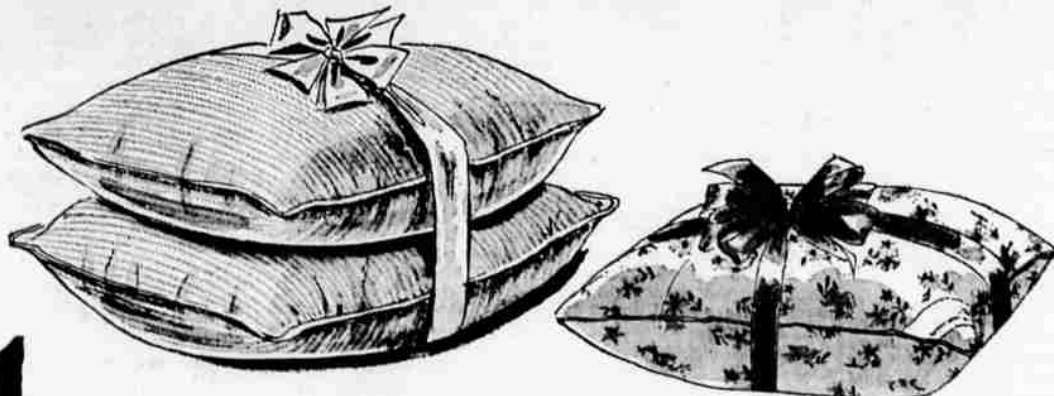
Some 80 ABC affiliate stations carried the program, but at least four canceled its showing.

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
