Judge Blasts JFK, Brother

OXFORD, Miss. (UP)—A state judge angrily told a grand jury Monday to indict President Kennedy and his "little stupid brother, Robert," if it felt they were responsible for the rioting which claimed two lives at the University of Mississippi.

The Lafayette County grand jury was expected to make a report late Tuesday Wednesday regarding its investigation into the bloody rioting touched off by the admission of Negro student James H. Meredith to "Ole Miss" Sept. 30.

Circuit Judge W. M. O'Barr advised the jury that anyone who kills another person or orders him killed or is responsible for creating a situation that causes a killing should be indicted and tried.

Washington House Races Still in Doubt

SEATTLE (AP)—Membership in the State House of Representatives was unofficially equally divided Tuesday between Democrats and Republicans although three seats were still to be decided.

The GOP apparently picked up another seat in King County's 34th District Monday on the basis of a count of absentee ballots which showed challenger Robert D. Eberle ousted the incumbent, Jeanette Testu, a Democrat.

Eberle's apparent victory split the House membership into an even 48-48 with the eventual majority being only a razor-thin margin in the 99-member chamber.

Edward J. Logan, King County superintendent of elections, said a count of "99 per cent" of the district's absentee ballots gave Eberle 8,696 to 8,649 for Mrs. Testu.

Districts still in doubt include the 25th (Pierce County), where Democratic incumbent Leonard Sawyer of Puyallup leads Sumner Republican W. T. Staats.

The other races yet to be decided in the 42nd District (Whatcom County) with Democratic Rep. Dick King ahead of Donald B. Stewart, and in the 49th (Clark County), where Vancouver Democrat William C. Klein, the incumbent leads Republican Henry Schumacher, also of Vancouver.

Climber Joins Expedition

ELLENSBURG, Wash. (AP)—Ellensburg mountain climber Barry Prather has been named assistant glaciologist of a 20-man party which will attempt to scale Mt. Everest early next year.

Prather said Tuesday the team is headed by Norman Deyrenfurth of California.

The team will also attempt ascents on two other peaks in the Himalayan range in addition to Everest—Lhotse and Utpse.

The party is to arrive in Nepal about Feb. 15 and return to the United States in July or August of 1963.

Prather, 24, is a graduate of Central Washington College. He will be the group's youngest member.

For the past four summers he has been studying the ice fields near Juneau, Alaska.

Police Seeking Four Men After Truman Coin Theft

INDEPENDENCE, Mo. (AP)—Police have issued pickup orders for four men in connection with the theft of a valuable coin collection from the Harry S. Truman Library.

A guard said the four men were in the library Sunday and didn't appear to be ordinary visitors. Descriptions of the men were broadcast to area police. The collection, described as

the only one of its kind and irreplaceable, was stolen early Monday by fastworking thieves with a professional touch. It was not insured.

Owned by John W. Snyder, secretary of the treasury in the Truman administration, the coins had been on display in the library since March 23. The library houses the presidential papers and mementos of the former president.

The collection consists of 444 coins minted during the administrations of all 35 U. S. presidents.

Snyder at his home in Toledo, Ohio, said Monday that the coins are worth about \$50,000 if sold individually, but are worth much more as a collection. He started the collection in 1920.

Truman, who was in New York, cut short his visit to return home.

"It was one of the most valuable coin collections of its kind in the country," he said.

Soviets Send Aid

KEY WEST, Fla. — A shipload of farm machinery, potatoes and 3,000 women's watches is en route to Cuba from the Soviet Union, Havana radio said Monday. The machinery includes equipment for planting and harvesting potatoes.

In Robert Kennedy Speech

Albany Vets Told Cuba Still Critical

ALBANY, Ore. (AP)—Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy described Cuba as a continuing problem in a telephone address delivered here Monday night to more than 600 guests at a Veterans Day banquet.

He said the administration intends to see that Russia's agreement for removal of offensive weapons from Cuba is carried out.

"Our efforts to require the withdrawal of offensive weapons from Cuba appear to be succeeding," he said.

Kennedy's telephone speech from Washington, D. C., was broadcast over loudspeakers to the gathering after he was forced at the last minute to cancel his planned trip to Oregon. The banquet marked the end of Albany's three-day Veterans Day celebration, one of the nation's largest.

Kennedy said that although Russia is removing missiles from Cuba, "obviously this does not mean that we can relax our vigilance. We intend to see that the agreement for removal of the weapons is carried out."

"Even so, Cuba will continue to be a problem," the President's brother said.

"The President's success in Cuba, demonstrating a firm readiness to use our strength, illustrates the importance of our military buildup," Kennedy said. "It also shows how initiative, imagination and patience can resolve a difficult situation without actual fighting."

Kennedy said Berlin, Southeast Asia and Cuba will remain trouble spots. "Khrushchev must know without any doubt that we are prepared to defend our vital interests... with all the force at our command," he said.

Kennedy said the United States has learned to live under the threat of nuclear war "with courage, cool nerves and unshakable purpose."

"That purpose is a society committed to freedom, founded on the Declaration of Independence and the Bill of Rights, and dedicated to the rule of law, in which the state is a servant of the individual, and not the individual a servant of the state."
