



Traffic Toll Continues To Increase

Cars continued piling up all over the Emerald Empire Monday. There were a total of six accidents injuring seven persons, none critically.

That brought the total of injury accidents in the period from Saturday night through Monday night to 13, and the total number of injured to 18.

The biggest single accident Monday occurred when six cars piled up on Highway 99 just south of Goshen. It was the second chain-reaction smashup in two days on the Pacific Freeway-Highway 99 in the area.

Head-On Crash

Mr. and Mrs. Hayes were injured about 11:45 a.m. in a head-on collision on Highway 99.

State police said Hayes' car was struck head-on by one driven by George Vernon Bolton, 75, Oregon City. The accident occurred just south of the point where Highway 99 narrows from four lanes to two, police said. They said Bolton's car was on the wrong side of the highway, with Bolton thinking he was still on a four-lane freeway.

Borody was injured Monday night when his car ran off the McKenzie Highway about five miles east of Blue River, plunged end over end down a 20-foot embankment, and landed upside down in the McKenzie River.

Deputy Sheriff Orville Brandt said a passing motorist, identified as C. D. Grittman of McKenzie Bridge, saw the lights of Borody's partially submerged car in the river, plunged in and pulled Borody from the vehicle.

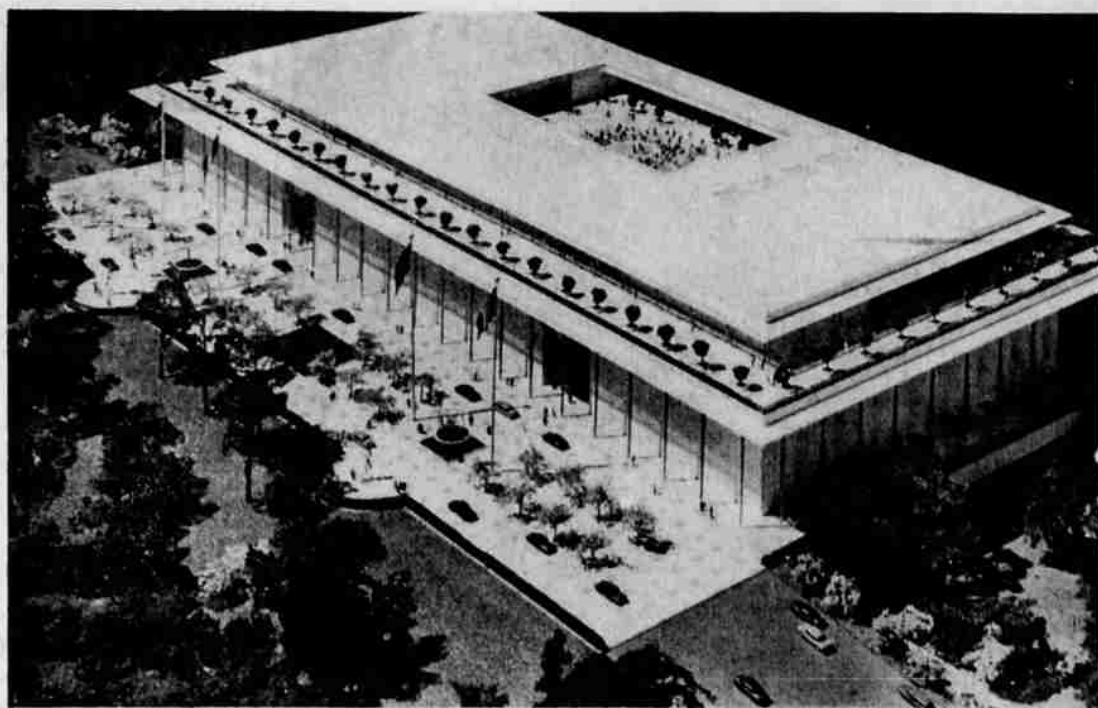
His Stump

Joyce Curtis was injured about 6 p.m. Monday when her car went off the McKenzie Highway a mile east of Leaburg, went into a ditch and struck a tree stump, state police said.

Mrs. O'Neal was injured in a three-car rear-end pileup on Highway 99 just north of the Cottage Grove interchange. State police said her car was the last car in the pileup. Driver of the first car was identified as Myrl A. Christenson, Corvallis, and the driver of the second car as Helen K. Davidson, Lebanon. Neither was injured, police said.

Alice McIntire was a passenger in one of two cars involved in a collision at River Road and Hilliard Street north of Eugene. State police said a car driven by Thelma Pauline Roeser, 40, of 1850 River Rd., was struck as it turned left off River Road by a car driven by Allen Edward McIntire, 63, 1396 Dalton Dr.

Yingling's car struck a deer on Highway 58 three miles west of Oakridge, went out of control and struck a large log, according to Deputy Sheriff Harry Swank. The deputy said the accident occurred about 9:45 p.m. Monday.

Cultural Center Benefit to Be Shown

A two-hour closed-circuit telecast, "An American Pageant of the Arts," will be shown in Eugene and many other cities on Nov. 29 as a nationwide benefit for the National Cultural Center in Washington, D.C.

The telecast will bring together one of the greatest collections of performers ever assembled for one show. Leonard Bernstein, celebrated musician and conductor, will be the host.

Guests will include President and Mrs. John F. Kennedy and former President and Mrs. Dwight D. Eisenhower. Mrs. Kennedy and Mrs. Eisenhower are honorary co-chairmen of the National Cultural Center.

The telecast will be at McArthur Court, starting at 6:30 p.m. Tickets, which will go on sale Nov. 19, will range in price from \$1.50 to \$3.

Performers will include Marian Anderson, Harry Belafonte, Pablo Casals, Van Cliburn, Robert Frost, Benny Goodman, Tammy Grimes, Hal Holbrook, Danny Kaye, Gene Kelly, Dorothy Kirsten, and many others.

Half of the net proceeds will go to help build the National Cultural Center on a site along the banks of the Potomac River. The other half will remain in Eugene, and will be used for an "auditorium research fund" to finance a study of a community-university auditorium for Eugene.

Tickets will be sold at the main desk in the Erb Memorial Union and at the Mattox Pipe Shop in downtown Eugene.

Shades of Oct. 12 Haunt JC

JUNCTION CITY — On the anniversary of the Oct. 12 storm, the first month's anniversary that is, residents here were treated to a flashback of that night.

For an hour and 45 minutes Monday night Junction City and an area to the south were without electric power.

At 8:18 p.m. a chain reaction of sparks started and stopped at Pacific Power and Light Co.'s Prairie Road sub-station. Some 800 PP&L subscribers were cloaked in darkness until 10:30 p.m. or until they lighted lanterns and candles—still close at hand. A month ago power was out for some 40 hours.

Lee Churchill, PP&L manager, told the Register-Guard Tuesday that fuses on a capacitor bank at the sub-station "blew up." As a result two 69,000-volt fuse switches burned out which draped Junction City and environs in an eerie darkness pierced only by bright moonlight.
