U.N. Steps Up Pressure On Katanga President

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP)—Acting Secretary-General U Thant sent his chief military adviser to the Congo Friday to tighten pressure on Katanga President Moise Tshombe and try to end the secession of the province.

Thant ordered Brig. I. J. Rikhye to relay to the U.N. Congo Command his new tough policy against Tshombe and to bolster the U.N.'s military position in the rebellious province.

Rikhye was to consult with U.N. field commanders on deployment of new planes, anti-aircraft units and ground troops that U.N. members have offered to help beef up the U.N.

military force in the Congo. Italy is sending four jet fighter planes to the Congo. Sweden has offered four fighters and two reconnaissance planes.

Rikhye, an Indian, also planned to go to New Delhi to seek retention of some 5,500 Indian troops, the largest contingent in the U.N. force of 18,000 men. India has said they may have to be pulled out to help in the fight against Communist China.

Thant made clear he is embarking on a tougher policy toward Tshombe in a lengthy report to the Security Council. It called for such measures as a U.N. boycott of Katanga's cop-

per and cobalt exports, a transport blockade and suspension of mail and wire communications.

Drastic Measures

Robert K. A. Gardiner, Thant's Congo chief, stressed in the report that new emphasis would be placed on more drastic measures.

Gardiner, who has been consulting here with Thant and other U.N. officials, charged that mercenaries in Tshombe's employ were continuing to carry out warlike actions. He called on Tshombe to show good faith and send his top officers to Leopoldville to swear allegiance to the central government.

Thant's report was issued in the wake of moves by the United States and Belgium to strengthen their hand in dealing with the provincial leader. The two nations affirmed that severe economic pressures will be exerted against Tshombe if he continues to balk at Thant's plan.

Share Revenues

The report also demanded that Tshombe announce steps to comply with Thant's proposal for sharing tax revenues of the huge European-owned Union Miniere with the Leopoldville government. The mining company has refused to let the central treasury siphon off any of its \$40-million-a-year tax payments without Tshombe's approval. The company contends its huge installations in Katanga are at the mercy of Tshombe's forces and U.N. troops can't protect them.

Thant's plan calls for a federal constitution for the Congo with increased autonomy for the provinces, a 50-50 split in mining revenues between Katanga and the central regime, unification of currency and a merging of Katanga's armed forces with those of the central government.

Solons Ponder Mafia Inquiry

ROME (AP)—A Sicilian member of the Italian Parliament reports that Mafia gangs have slain more than 500 people on the island since 1945.

Socialist Deputy Matteo Gaudioso gave the figure Thursday as the Chamber of Deputies debated a proposal for a parliamentary investigation of the secret organization.

Gaudioso said the Mafia murdered 153 people in Corleone, a town of 16,000 south of Palermo. All parties voiced support for the investigation. A vote is expected soon.

Many Italian governments have tried in vain to destroy the Mafia.

Assistant Named

WASHINGTON (AP)—AFL-CIO Research Director Stanley Ruttenberg Thursday was appointed special assistant to Labor Secretary W. Willard Wirtz.

Ruttenberg, 45, will serve as economic adviser to Wirtz and is expected to devote much of his time to the chronic problem of unemployment. He takes office on Jan. 1.

Indian Test Ban Proposal: 'Inspection by Invitation'

GENEVA (AP)—India proposed Friday a nuclear test ban treaty without compulsory inspection provisions.

Indian Delegate Arthur Lall made his government's proposal

to the 17-nation disarmament conference after Canada urged the United States, Britain and the Soviet Union to accept a Swedish proposal for a temporary, uninspected moratorium on underground nuclear tests while scientists seek agreement on an on-site inspection system.

Lall suggested a system of on-site inspections, in effect by invitation.

Each nuclear power would have an annual quota of on-site inspections, but these could take place only by agreement of the suspected country.

If the suspected country refused to allow inspection after a suspicious earth tremor had been reported, the treaty would automatically "fall to the ground," Lall said.

Lall's proposal constituted a substantial departure from the American and British position that a ban on underground tests must be policed by compulsory on-site inspections.

Gen. E. L. M. Burns of Canada told the conference the unpoliced moratorium he proposed should be "of limited duration, perhaps a year or six months."

It would permit the conference to reach quick agreement on ending nuclear tests in all environments by Jan. 1, and "give the world something which will indeed make a happy New Year," he said.

UO Announces Non-Resident Fall Enrollment

Non-resident undergraduate enrollment at the University of Oregon in the 1962 fall term totals 2,363 students, the university has reported. This is 29.3 per cent of the total undergraduate enrollment of 8,032 students.

This compares to 2,100 non-resident undergraduates in the 1961 fall term, or 28.0 per cent of the total undergraduate enrollment of 7,500.

The 1962 total includes 225 undergraduate foreign students, compared to 183 undergraduate foreign students in the 1961 fall term.

Students from Alaska and Hawaii are now being tabulated as non-resident students, although these students do not pay non-resident fees. In 1961 there were 1,883 non-resident undergraduates, including foreign students but not including students from Alaska and Hawaii. The 217 from Alaska and Hawaii that year raised the total to 2,100.

In 1962 there are 204 students from Alaska and Hawaii who are included in the total of 2,363.

The office of the State Board of Higher Education estimates that in the 1963 fall term non-resident undergraduates will total 2,470, including 190 from Hawaii and Alaska, or 28.7 per cent of the estimated total undergraduate enrollment of 8,603.

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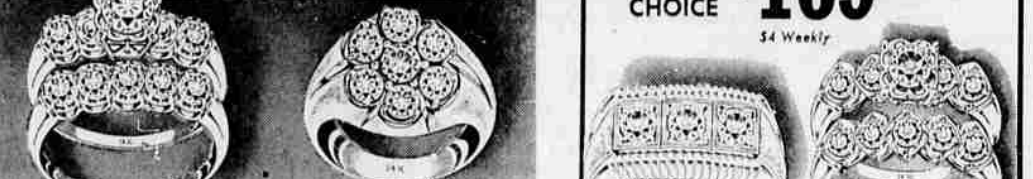
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
