

A-2 Football Crown Won By Central

SEASIDE (AP) — Central Union of Monmouth-Independence scored twice in the first period and downed Seaside 14-0 Friday night for the Oregon A-2 prep football championship.

Fumbles, encouraged by the cold weather and muddy field, played an important part in the Central victory. Seaside fumbled the ball away on its own three-yard line early in the game and Central fullback Gary Winegar scored on a one-yard plunge.

Late in the period, quarterback Greg Hartman directed a 70-yard drive that ended with a 12-yard scoring pass to Frank Peterson.

The rest of the game was a defensive battle, with Hartman and tackle Gary Neal doing outstanding work for the victors. Seaside backs fumbled eight times.

Both teams entered the game undefeated. Seaside was ranked No. 1 on the Associated Press poll. Central, which had played two less games, was No. 2.

Three UO Track Marks Approved

NEW YORK (AP)—Three relay marks set by University of Oregon track teams last spring were formally accepted as American records by the Amateur Athletic Union Friday.

All were considered non-citizen records because of each of the relay teams contained one Canadian citizen. The new records were 40 seconds flat in the 440-yard relay by Jerry Tarr, Harry Jerome, Mel Renfro and Mike Gaechter May 26 at the Modesto, Calif., Relays; 7:20.2 in the two-mile relay by Archie San Romani, Jr., Ted Abram, Sig Olemann and Dyrrol Burleson the same day at Modesto; and 16:09 in the four-mile relay by San Romani, Vic Reeve, Keith Forman and Burleson at the Fresno Relays May 12.

The 440 and four-mile times also are world records.

Hayes' 9.2 Disapproved

DETROIT (AP)—The AAU track and field committee Friday approved 56 American records and disapproved Robert Hayes' world record matching time of 9.2 seconds in the 100-yard dash.

Five of the approved records were made by Jim Beatty, who now holds every American mark from 1,500 to 5,000 meters.

Hayes, of Florida A&M, was refused recognition for his blazing 100-yard dash last Feb. 17 at Miami because the starter used a .22 caliber pistol. The AAU ruled the starter must use a .32 caliber pistol or larger — one from which smoke can be seen — for an event in which a record can be recognized.

Beatty's latest five records were 3:58.9 in the indoor mile, 3:29.4 in the 1,500 meters, 7:54.2 in the 3,000 meters, 3:36.3 in the outdoor mile, and 13:45.0 in the 5,000 meters.

Colts Acquire Five Players in Trades

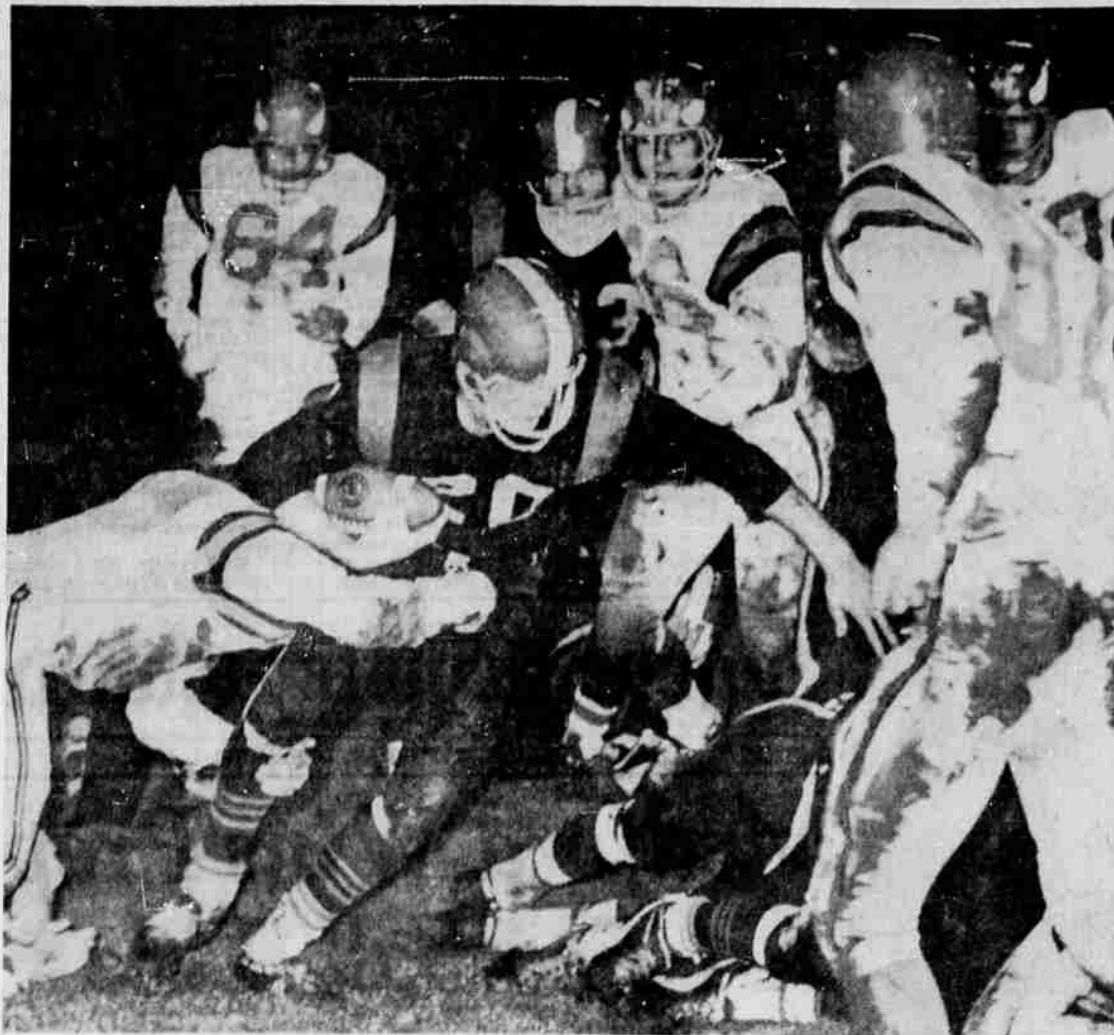
NEW YORK (AP) — The Houston Colts, carrying out their promise to make every effort to improve their club for 1963, acquired five players Friday in trades with San Francisco's defending Giants and the Milwaukee Braves.

The Houston newcomers are Don Nottebart, a right-handed pitcher from Milwaukee; and southpaw Dick Lemay and outfielder Manuel Mota from San Francisco. Two others, pitcher Connie Grob and outfielder Jim Bolger, both from Louisville, were shipped to the Colts' Oklahoma City farm club in the Pacific Coast League.

Lemay and Mota were obtained in a trade that sent second baseman Joe Amalfitano to the Giants. Nottebart, a 26-year-old relief pitcher, was purchased outright from the Braves for a reported \$35,000.

Grob and Bolger, former major league leaguers, came in exchange for Norm Larker, who was expected to be alternate with Tommy Aaron at first base for the Braves.

Larker became expendable when the Colts acquired Pete

5-A-1 Realignment Vetoed by OSAA

PORTLAND (Special) — District 5-A-1 will stay as it is next fall.

Realignment of the 12-year-old district was dealt a crushing blow Friday by the Delegate Assembly of the Oregon School Activities Assn. (OSAA). Not a vote among the 23 present favored a shift of Marshfield, North Bend and Roseburg from District 5-A-1 to 6-A-1 (Southern Oregon Conference). It would have left the Lane A-1 Conference—South Eugene, North Eugene, Willamette, Cottage Grove, Springfield, Thurston and next fall new Sheldon—as sole members of 5-A-1.

The transfer, recommended by the OSAA re-districting committee, died with only one voice being raised in favor—North Eugene principal Ray Hendrickson.

With the transfer looking hopeless, Hendrickson went along with the majority including three members of the re-districting committee which had unanimously recommended it.

The problem was shelved for two years with instructions that re-districting be studied once again.

The action came after a lengthy presentation with the three schools that would have been shifted and Southern Oregon doing the talking.

Hendrickson explained that the Lane A-1 Conference—now a league within a district—favors moving the three schools southward.

The three schools, with Southern Oregon offering the same answer, called it financial suicide because of the travel distance.

Salem area schools, which had been outspokenly in favor of the change because it would help them arrange non-league football games, did not show up.

The Board of Control of the OSAA, the executive body of the athletic organization, was to discuss the matter Saturday.

But, in the face of the overwhelming Delegate Assembly rejection, the board has little choice but to agree.

Four Southern Oregon schools—Medford notably absent although reported in favor of the realignment—joined Marshfield, North Bend and Roseburg in opposition.

L&C, OCE In Finals Of Tourney

Both scored impressive victories in second-round games Friday night.

Lewis and Clark trounced Pacific 88-66 at Portland after holding only a 37-32 lead at halftime. Three men were in double figures for the victors, although usually high scorer Jim Boutin made only 13 points.

The OCE-Linfield game at Salem was even closer at halftime, with OCE holding only a 30-28 advantage. Then the Wolves went wild, pouring in 32 points in the second half and coasting to an 82-61 victory over Southern Oregon.

In consolation action, Oregon Tech downed Portland State 65-64 at Portland to ruin a 30-point effort by PSC's Jim Hollingsworth. At Salem, Willamette regained a slight bit of honor with a 61-53 victory over Southern Oregon.

Walton League Gives Awards

The governor, a teacher, a retired forester and an Air Force sergeant were honored Saturday for contributions to the conservation movement at the annual convention of the Izaak Walton League's Oregon division at the Eugene Hotel.

Gov. Mark Hatfield received a special award at the Walton's annual awards luncheon "for continuing support of policies in advancement of conservation in Oregon." The award has been made only once before, to the late Sen. Richard Neuberger.

The League's Beaver awards went to Tom Thayer, coach at Portland's Benson High School, and Thornton Munger, Portland,

retired director of the Pacific Northwest Forest and Range Experiment Station.

Thayer was cited for his youth programs. He formed league youth chapters at Maupin and Portland and helped to organize a two-day conservation field trip through central Oregon for about 250 high school freshmen, which has become an annual event.

Munger has been active in development of Portland's Hoyt Arboretum and a leader in Save the Myrtlewoods, restoration of Portland's Forestry Building and other programs.

Sgt. Jim Potter, division secretary, won the Waltonian of the Year award.

A posthumous award for outstanding contribution to conservation was awarded to Kenneth Denman, a charter member of the league's Medford chapter, who died recently. He was honored for his efforts to protect the fisheries resource of the Rogue and Klamath rivers and the waterfowl refuge in the Klamath Basin.

Hunting was the topic in three panel discussions Saturday afternoon and delegates were to hear Guido Rahr Jr. talk about "Big Game Hunting Adventures in Europe" at a 7:30 p.m. banquet. The convention will close Sunday morning with adoption of resolutions and election of 1963 officers.

Pilots, Cougars Fall In Opening Games

Portland U. Beaten by San Jose, Washington State by CSU, 77-47

PORTLAND (AP)—The University of Portland faced another meeting with San Jose State tonight, hopeful of better results than it got in Friday's season opener.

The visitors rolled up a 60-43 victory and held every Pilot except big Steve Anstett below 10 points. Anstett got 14, but San Jose's trio of Bill Robertson, Bill Yonge and Bud Simpson between them scored 41 points—just two less than the whole Portland club.

San Jose moved to a 31-22 lead and steadily widened the margin while stopping Portland's offense cold.

The Pilots made only 14 shots from the field—10 less than the tall, rugged Spartans.
