Everest Assault to Be '95% Sheer Hell'

WASHINGTON — The leader of 19 Americans preparing for the first U.S. assault on the "roof of the world" — towering Mt. Everest and two sister peaks — figures the climb will be "95 per cent sheer hell, 5 per cent beauty."

"But in such things, we remember only the 5 per cent of beauty when it's over," remarked Norman G. Dyhrenfurth, the expedition's 44-year-old chief.

He and some of his companions outlined their plans Wednesday at a news conference staged by the National Geographic Society, a sponsor of the \$326,000 venture scheduled for this spring.

Six of the Americans will

climb Mt. Everest, at 29,028 feet the world's highest mountain. Two other teams of two men each will have a go at Everest's sister peaks in the Himalayas—Lhotse, 27,923 feet, and Mt. Nuptse, 25,726 feet.

It will be, they said, the first time a single expedition has attempted to scale the three peaks in a single season, although each has been conquered before by climbers.

Dyhrenfurth, of Santa Monica Canyon, Calif., said if the Americans reach the top of Everest, they will be the third expedition to pull off the trick.

The British, who were first, and the Swiss have done it. The Red Chinese claim they climbed Everest in 1960 and left as proof a bust of Mao Tse-tung.

Their claim has been challenged.

"If the bust of Mao Tse-tung is there, we'll send them a congratulatory telegram," said Dyhrenfurth.

UO Man a Member

Luther G. Jerstad, instructor in speech at the University of Oregon, is a member of the Everest expedition. Jerstad is expected to leave the Oregon campus at the end of the fall term. At that time he will go to Tacoma to spend six to eight weeks in physical conditioning. The expedition plans to leave the United States about the first of February for Katmandu, Nepal, from which the group will leave for the slopes of Everest.

Ex-Oregonian Faces Charge Of Violating Neutrality Act

U.S. Seeks to Ease Situation in Angola

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — The United States worked quietly Thursday on a plan to ease the situation in Angola without angering either Portugal or the nations of Africa.

The Portuguese government was understood to have given at least tacit assent to a U.S. plan to send a single U.N. commissioner into the vast African territory to seek settlement of the dispute between Angolan nationalists and the Lisbon government.

Portuguese Ambassador Vasco V. Garin opened the annual debate on Angola in the General Assembly Wednesday with a statement that Premier Antonio de Oliveira Salazar's government would accept no "outside interference" in its overseas territories.

One Ex-Nazi Held in Chile; 2nd Rumored

SANTIAGO, Chile (AP) — The arrest of a higher ex-Nazi on war crimes charges may follow the detention here of a former Nazi colonel accused of ordering the gassing of 90,000 Jews in World War II.

Patrick Weichman, head of the international police organization Interpol in Chile, said Wednesday night "an even higher Nazi war criminal" was believed to be in this country and his arrest may follow soon.

He made the statement after former Col. Walter Herman Julius Rauff appeared before the Supreme Court and declared his innocence of the war crimes for which West Germany is seeking his extradition.

Weichman refused to name the second man whose arrest is expected.

Last March, Martin Bormann, Adolf Hitler's deputy party chief, was reported located in Chile, but the suspect turned out to be another man. Bormann was reported to have met death in attempting to escape from Berlin in 1945 and was declared legally dead eight years ago by a West German court. But rumors that he is alive keep cropping up.

Rauff was an office colleague of Adolf Eichmann who was executed in Israel last May 31 for complicity in the death of six million Jews. Rauff was arrested in Punta Arenas, Chile's southernmost city, on Tuesday.

2 Men Receive Life Sentences

PORTLAND (AP) — Two men received life prison sentences here this week in separate circuit courts.

Guitar player Lloyd Wesley Allen, 25, was sentenced after pleading guilty to second degree murder in the death of Portland restaurant owner Willard Glover.

Charles Knowles Thompson received his life term after being found guilty of second degree murder in the shooting of his estranged wife, Sandra.

Tape of Statements Shows Ellender Quoted Correctly

SALISBURY, Southern Rhodesia (AP) — A tape-recorded transcript issued Thursday of Sen. Allen J. Ellender's news conference here confirmed he was quoted correctly on statements which led Uganda and Tanganyika to declare him a "prohibited immigrant."

Ellender, currently touring Africa, held the news conference last Saturday before leaving Salisbury. Uganda and Tanganyika banned him from entry and several newspapers denounced him for saying he had not seen any Africans ready for self-government and they were incapable of leadership without white assistance.

The official transcript, issued by the U. S. Information Service, showed the Louisiana Democrat said during the conference:

"My own government of course, supports the United Na-

tions effort to make as many of the countries of Africa independent as desire to be or happen to operate their own governments. Now, personally, I wouldn't have any quarrel with that if those who are to operate the government were competent to do so and had the capability. But I have yet to come to any of them wherein that capability exists and for that reason I stated that the time for this change to independence is a little too early."

"If there is any part of Africa wherein the natives have built up a community on their own, have used bricks and mortar and have manufactured things on their own and made progress on their own, I have yet to see that area."

"What I mean simply is that the average African is incapable of leadership except through the assistance of Europeans."

Portugal holds that Angola has a relationship to Portugal similar to the relationship of any of the individual 50 states to the United States.

There was no indication just how or whether the U.S. plan for a U.N. commissioner to Angola would work.

The 55-nation Afro-Asian group was working on a call for an arms embargo against Portugal, perhaps followed by stronger steps. The United States is expected to oppose such a move.

Portugal has been sharply critical of lack of support from its NATO allies in the past against African and Asian attacks on its policies and has threatened to quit the United Nations over the Angola issue.

Garin's opening statement, while rejecting a suggestion that Portugal begin negotiations to transfer power to Angolan nationalists, nevertheless was considered the most moderate Portuguese pronouncement on the situation here in years.

Furthermore, the Portuguese delegation listened to speeches from other delegations instead of walking out as they have in past years.

Rocket Blast Kills Officer

EL PASO, Tex. (AP) — A Nike Hercules missile blew up Tuesday on the McGregor Missile Range, killing a French lieutenant and injuring four other persons.

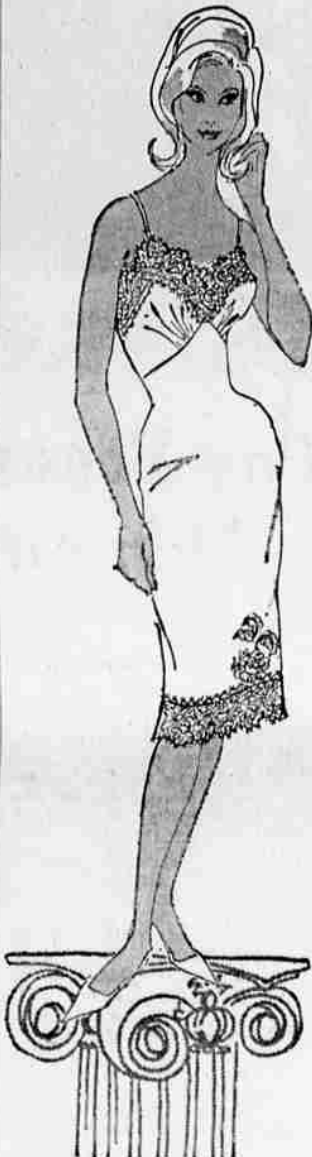
The French lieutenant died Tuesday night at William Beaumont Military Hospital several hours after the explosion. His name was withheld.

Authorities at the base, 20 miles north of El Paso, said a range safety officer blew the missile up at an altitude of 500 feet when it took an erratic course. Authorities clamped a tight security lid on details of the accident.

Two French sergeants, a private and an American sergeant were hospitalized. The French sergeants were in serious condition.

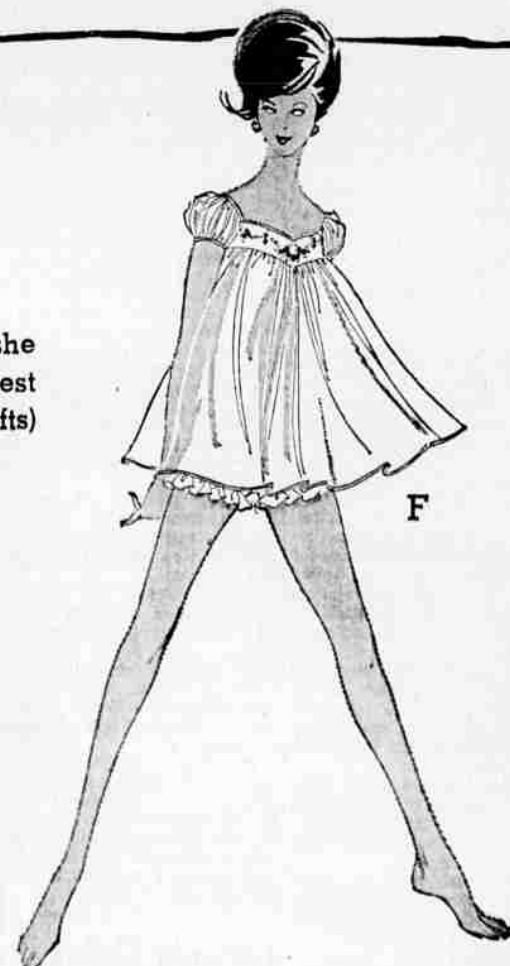
The French soldiers were trainees under the NATO training program.
