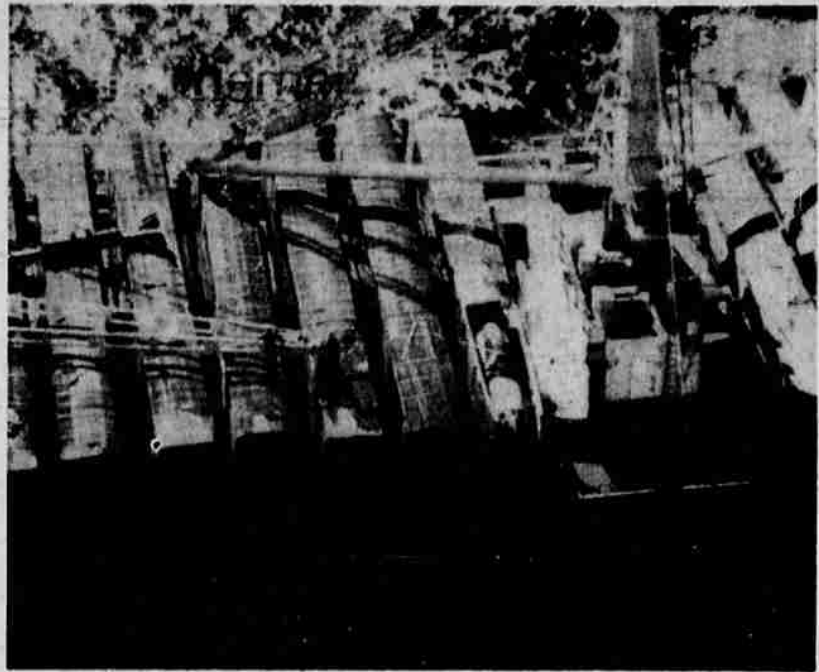




## Bombers Away

## Pope Talks To Council

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Pope John XXIII left his apartment Friday for the first time since he became ill 10 days ago and prayed with the Vatican Ecumenical Council in St. Peter's.

Soon after he returned to his apartment, Vatican officials announced that the pontiff would participate in ceremonies Saturday closing the first phase of the council, and also in canonization rituals on Sunday for three new Roman Catholic saints.

Looking white and tired, the pontiff walked unaided into the basilica and up the several steps to his throne.

### Thanks Prelates

In a speech in Latin he thanked the prelates for their work and their charity toward each other despite differences in their debates and asked them to carry his blessing back to their people. He did not mention his own health.

He waved repeatedly to non-Catholic observers sitting in a special section to one side of his throne.

Vatican sources said the Pope also celebrated Mass this morning in his private chapel and then worked a considerable time with Amleto Cardinal Cicognani, the Vatican secretary of state.

But the Vatican indicated the Pope has not fully recovered after being bed-ridden with serious anemia provoked by stomach disorder.

### Activities Limited

Officials said his participation in the weekend ceremonies would be limited. He plans to attend the closing council session only long enough to make a speech.

And instead of participating in the full three-hour canonization ceremony Sunday, as he has in the past, officials said the Pope would be present for only about 30 minutes, long enough to proclaim the three saints.

The three being elevated to sainthood are the blessed Pierre Julien Eymard, Antonio Maria Pucci and Francesco Maria de Camposso. Eymard was French-born. The others were Italian-born.

## Acheson Speech Stirs British Ire

WASHINGTON (AP) — Dean Acheson was speaking only as a private citizen when he said Britain has "about played out" its special relationship with the United States, the State Department said Thursday.

Acheson, former secretary of state who still advises the State Department "on an item by item basis," stirred the wrath of Europeans with a speech delivered at West Point Wednesday.

In the speech, he criticized the Western policy toward Berlin and made the remark about British-U.S. relations which one London newspaper described as a "verbal kick in the teeth" of the British.

State Department spokesman Lincoln White made it clear Thursday Acheson was not speaking as a representative of the government when he made the remarks.

"Mr. Acheson," White said, "of course has been called on to contribute what he could in a variety of subjects and I would hope he will continue to call on him."

But he ruled that Acheson is not employed by the State Department on a full-time basis and is free to comment as a private citizen on any subject he chooses.

## New Coalition Readied

## Adenauer to Retire Sometime Next Fall

BONN, Germany (AP) — Chancellor Konrad Adenauer will retire from office next fall, the parliamentary floor leader of his Christian Democratic Party announced Friday.

Heinrich von Brentano said the chancellor, who will be 87 in January, made the announcement at a meeting of party executives Thursday night.

Brentano also told a meeting of the party's members in parliament the party executives had with the opposition Socialists. A new coalition with the Conservative Free Democrats, who quit the government over the Spiegel affair several weeks ago, was practically assured.

Adenauer's impending retirement did not particularly surprise West German politicians. He has been under pressure for some time from his own party to relinquish the government reins to a younger man. He has been chancellor for 13 years, since the West German Republic was inaugurated.

Last year, after his party lost its parliamentary majority and had to form a coalition with the Free Democrats, Adenauer said he would retire in sufficient time before the 1965 general election to give his successor a chance to get used to his office. However, Adenauer refused to set a date for his retirement.

Authoritative Christian Democratic sources say his successor probably will be the vice chancellor and economics minister, Ludwig Erhard, known as the father of West Germany's "miracle" postwar recovery.

## 491 Flu Cases Reported in State

PORTLAND (AP) — The State Board of Health said Friday 491 persons in Oregon were reported to have the flu during the week ending last Saturday.

The board said the figure was considerably lower than the number of cases reported for the comparable week last year.

Annual total to date is 24,026 cases which compares with 20,038 a year ago. The health board said, however, the higher figure for this year is inflated by a rash of cases in January which resulted from an outbreak in December of 1961.

## Khrushchev, Tito Holding Final Talks

MOSCOW (AP) — Yugoslav President Tito and Premier Nikita Khrushchev Friday went into their third and final day of "frank and friendly" talks, with Communist China believed to be the major topic.

The talks began Wednesday at a hunting lodge outside Moscow and continued in the Kremlin on Thursday. Details of the discussions have not been disclosed. Tass, the official Soviet news agency, said only that the two leaders covered Soviet-Yugoslav and international problems in a friendly atmosphere.

Western observers believed, however, that the ideological dispute between Communist China on one hand and Russia and Yugoslavia on the other occupied the top spot on the agenda. Peking has stepped up its attacks on Yugoslavia since Tito's arrival here Tuesday, calling him a "brazen traitor" and "enemy of communism." By implication, the attacks included Tito's host, although Khrushchev was not cited by name.

Tito, who is on a "vacation" trip to the Soviet Union, his first visit in six years, will leave Saturday for Volgograd, the former Stalingrad. He is expected to remain in the Soviet Union another 10 days.

## Ban on Twist Lifted by UAR

CAIRO (AP) — The United Arab Republic has lifted its ban on the twist and twist records.

The government announcement Thursday said "freedom of the arts" is replacing "censorship in the arts."

The government more than a year ago imposed an official ban on the American dance on account of its "demoralizing effect on those who dance it."

The government also banned the traditional belly dance last year, but lifted that ban after a month.

## BPA Meetings Slated in Idaho

PORTLAND (AP) — The question of whether to extend its power facilities into Idaho will be discussed by the Bonneville Power Administration at two meetings next week.

They are planned for Dec. 13 at Pocatello and Dec. 14 at the regional office of the Bureau of Reclamation in Boise.

Charles F. Luce, Bonneville administrator, said the staff will outline its investigation and hear comments from members of a technical committee.

## Oregon Farm Prices Increase Slightly

CORVALLIS (AP) — Prices for Oregon farm products increased slightly last month, the Oregon State University Extension Service reports.

The gain came mostly in dairy and poultry products, and most grains, hay and seeds.

The agency said prices nevertheless were about 2 per cent under those of November, 1961.
