## Easy as Pie

If learning how to swim at an early age helps to make a swimming champion, watch for Marji Peterson's name in a few years. Well, maybe ten years.

She's well on her way.

Marji is only three years old (four next month), and last week she passed her Red Cross tests for beginning swimmer.

Marji, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Delbert Peterson, 4475 Cascade Dr., Eugene, is apparently the first child in this area ever to pass the test at so young an age.

Kay Foy, Marji's swimming instructor at River Road Park and Recreation District pool, said she checked with the Red Cross and they didn't have any records to indicate otherwise.

The chunky, dark-haired water babe is a regular visitor to the River Road pool along with her mother.

Until September, Marji couldn't swim a stroke. But then she began taking lessons.

And last week, Marji passed the tests which included swimming a distance of 90 feet. "She's fairly well at home in the water," said Mrs. Foy, adding that Marji also dives off the board, turns somersaults in the water, and now is trying to learn the "butterfly" kick.

Getting Marji to swim across the pool and back took some special doing, however, since she's a little girl with a mind of her own and is apt to pay no heed to suggestions, according to her mother.

"She fell for the red tin button of a Red Cross beginning swimmer," related Mrs. Foy. Marji was told she could have the button if she swam across the pool and back.

"I turned my back for a minute and the next thing I saw her out in the middle of the pool," said Mrs. Foy.

## In Weekend Set

# California Cagers Test Oregon State

California, stronger than many expected even without its 6-foot-10 center Camden Wall, gets what may be its stiffest basketball test of the season this weekend when going against Oregon State in the Beavers' home opener at Corvallis.

Cal, undefeated in three starts, meets OSU both Friday and Saturday at Gill Coliseum in 8 p.m. games.

Substitute center Bob Wueste, a 6-foot-7½ junior who became a starter just last Saturday after Wall was hurt, draws the dubious privilege of trying to stop Beaver center Mel Counts, currently going along at a 31-point, 25-rebound per game pace.

Wueste, apparently not awed by Counts and the Beavers, said in San Francisco earlier this week, "We're planning on going up to Oregon and doing some winning."

He had just been named "player of the week" by Northern California basketball writers after completing his first game as a starter.

Wueste, pronounced "Wees-ty," took over for Wall and scored 24 points in the Bears' 62-57 victory over USF at Berkeley Saturday. Wall was on the sidelines recuperating from a knee injury suffered the previous Wednesday night in a game against St. Mary's.

By the middle of this week, Wall was still limping badly and it was questionable whether he'd even come north with the Bears. "Wall's status is still unchanged," according to Cal coach Rene Herreras, "so we're looking to Bob to help us against Counts and Oregon State. We're assigning Wueste to Counts."

Despite Wueste's scoring outburst against USF, senior guard Dick Smith is the Bears' leading scorer to date. He's averaged

17.3 points a game while making 45.4 per cent of his shots—most of them jump shots from around the key.

Up north, perennial worrier Slat Gill was wondering what to do to take some of the pressure off Counts by installing more balance in OSU's attack. (In the two games OSU has played so far, Counts has scored over half the points.)

He'll probably start four guards with Counts—at least in the Friday contest against the Bears.

Sophomores Jim Jarvis and Frank Peters will open in the back court and two of last year's lettermen guards—6-foot-4 Steve Pauly and 6-foot-3 Gary Rossi—will go at forwards.

That'll make the teams fairly evenly matched, as far as height goes. Counts, of course, at an even seven feet, is taller than anyone the Bears can put on the court.

But one of their forwards, Chris Carpenter, stands 6-foot-8 which even things out a bit. The others all go between 6-1 and 6-4—just as do the Beavers.
