### Court Upholds Spy Conviction

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The U.S. Court of Appeals Monday upheld the conviction of Irving C. Scarbeck for passing U.S. Embassy secrets to Red agents in Poland but recommended that his 30-year sentence be reduced to 10 years in prison.

The court urged the sharp reduction of sentence for the former second secretary of the Embassy in Warsaw because of his "cooperation with the authorities during the investigation."

The government offered evidence at the trial that Scarbeck, 41, was trapped in an affair with a Polish girl, Ursula Discher.
