

Benedictine to Speak at UO

Ecumenical Council, Unity to Be Topic

A Benedictine monk who has been reporting activities of the Second Vatican Ecumenical Council for the National Catholic Welfare Conference News Service, will speak at the University of Oregon Jan. 10.

The Rev. Placid Jordan, O.S.B. will discuss "The Ecumenical Council and Christian Unity" at an 8 p.m. assembly in the ballroom of the Erb Memorial Student Union. His appearance is sponsored by the Newman Catholic Student Center.

A noted foreign correspondent during and following World War II, Father Jordan was credited with being first to report the beginning of the war, and received the National Headliner Award for announcing the end of World War II.

As religion editor and European editor for NBC, he became the first representative of the free world to broadcast a program from within the Soviet Union.

Father Jordan (then Max Jordan) had special interest in the scope of Nazi war against Christian churches and had many contacts in the German underground movement.

Many of his wartime experiences are related in his best-selling book, "Beyond All Fronts" which was published in 1946.

Father Jordan was born of German Lutheran parents, but was ordained a Catholic priest in 1951 at the age of 56. Three years later he was received into the Benedictine Order.

Often called the dean of American foreign correspondents, Father Jordan is the master of six languages. His experiences in many countries, coupled with his wide acquaintance with many people, have convinced him of the importance of church unity, a topic on which he has lectured widely, both here and in Europe.

His Jan. 10 lecture is open to the public.

Color Movie Of Conversion

"The Tony Fontane Story," a feature-length color movie telling the story of the popular singer who turned to Christianity work after a serious accident, in Eugene tonight.

The movie will be shown at 7 p.m. at First Baptist Church, Eugene, at a bi-weekly Eugene Youth for Christ rally. The showing is open to the public. Also on the program will be "The Accents," a singing group from Bible Standard College.

Fontane, who appeared earlier this fall in Eugene, was a popular recording artist several years ago. He first attained popularity with a recording of "Cold, Cold Heart," a million seller. Other hit records followed.

Then the singer was in a serious automobile crash, and his conversion to Christianity followed. Now he records only religious numbers, and appears at churches and religious conventions throughout the United States.

Grim Forecast Puts Jews, Catholics in Greatest Peril

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP)—Who will survive an all-out atomic attack on the United States? Fewer Roman Catholics and Jews than members of other religious groups, Heer said. The group's preliminary study also indicates:

The political complexion probably would be more conservative even though the balance of the major parties kept the status quo—more surviving Democrats would be from southern and rural areas.

Because racial minorities, other than Negroes, are concentrated in coastal areas, they would be decimated. And the loss of many high-rural residents and would hit the East and West Coasts harder than the Midwest and Deep South.

Since Roman Catholics and Jews are concentrated in northern cities, they would be harder hit than other religious groups, Heer said. The group's preliminary study also indicates:

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"This is a pilot project which will be partly quantitative and partly speculative," Heer said.

The hypothetical attack on which the study is based was calculated for hearings before the Joint Congressional Committee on Atomic Energy in 1959. Other sources Heer and his associates are using include census figures, election records and results of private polls.

The Berkeley group, working under a contract with the U.S. Office of Civil Defense, will submit its reports—estimates of proportions of various population segments still alive after a hypothetical attack kills 40 million—next June 1.

Field Officer Due to Speak Here Sunday

Lt. Col. Emil Nelson, the new field secretary of the Western territory (13 Western states) for the Salvation Army, will make his first public appearance in Eugene Sunday.

He will speak Sunday at 11 a.m. at a Salvation Army worship service at the Eugene Salvation Army Corps, 640 W. Seventh Ave.

Nelson was appointed to the post of field secretary last August. He is a native of New Jersey, and after several years in business, was commissioned as a Salvation Army officer in 1926. He later served in public relations posts with the corps in the East, and then became the second officer in command of the New England states' work.

In 1950, he became commander of the metropolitan division of Greater New York and Westchester County. His next appointment, which he held for five years, was as divisional commander, in charge of the eastern New York division. Nelson then became principal of the Salvation Army's Eastern School for Officers' Training in the Bronx, New York.

His present post makes him the administrative officer for all Salvation Army field personnel in the Western territory. Nelson will be accompanied to Eugene by Lt. Col. John Erickson, Oregon and Southern Idaho divisional commander.

The public is welcome at the service.

NATO Plans Troop Move

Group 28th Infantry Regiment, 1st Division, from Ft. Riley, Kan., to Germany by jet transports of the Military Air Transport Service.

With the arrival of the new battle group in West Germany, the 2nd Battle Group of the 12th Infantry Regiment, 1st Division, will be returned to the United States. The latter group was airlifted to Europe in a previous Long Thrust exercise.

Jan. 14 Interfaith Conference To Discuss Racial Injustice

CHICAGO (AP)—Racial injustice will be a much-discussed subject in Chicago Jan. 14 when clergymen of major faiths convene at the Edgewater Beach Hotel for a four-day meeting.

For the first time, the National Conference on Religion and Race will bring together all major churches to form a united attack on the problem of racial injustice.

The conference may have far-reaching—though perhaps not immediately discernible—effect on the social climate of the United States.

The immediate result will be the hammering out of a "declaration of conscience" which will go out as the word from the leaders of most of this country's churches.

A planning committee is producing recommendations for the consideration of the conference as to follow-up action on national and local levels.

Those attending the conference will include officials of the National Council of Churches, the Synagogue Council of America and the National Catholic Welfare Conference.

More than 60 religiously affiliated national organizations have indicated they will be represented by delegates at the conference.

Chairman of the conference will be the Rev. Dr. Benjamin E. Mays, president of Morehouse

College in Atlanta, Ga.

The vice chairman will be the Right Rev. Germanos Psallidakis, bishop of the Synod and head of the Greek Orthodox See in Detroit, Mich.; the Most Rev. Paul J. Hallinan, archbishop of Atlanta; Rabbi Ferdinand M. Iserman of Temple Israel, St. Louis, and Bishop Julian Smith, presiding bishop of the First Episcopal District of Christian Methodist Episcopal Church.

The planners of the conference said it is being convened "to provide an occasion for lay and clerical religious heads to conduct a concrete examination of the role of the churches and synagogues in meeting religious and civic racial problems."

The planners hope that the conference will give a push to projects designed to crumble remaining racial barriers.
