Planners to Hold 20 Zoning Request Hearings Monday

The Springfield Planning Commission Monday evening has scheduled 20 public hearings on variance and zoning requests—the largest number ever to appear on a commission agenda.

Monday night's meeting will start at 7:30 at the Springfield City Hall, Fourth and North A streets.

The numerous hearings have been scheduled because of the commission's policy of meeting only quarterly to conduct public hearings on requests for variance or zoning changes.

These zoning hearings have been scheduled:

- Request by Glenn Jones for zoning property at 4808 E. Main St. from suburban residential (RA) to neighborhood business (C-1).
- Request by S. S. Rounds for rezoning property at 5241 Main St. from suburban residential (RA) to commercial (C-2).

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Oakridge Dump Relocation Postponed for Further Study

OAKRIDGE—A final decision on the relocation of a county garbage dump here will be postponed until after the matter is studied further, county commissioners decided Saturday.

In agreeing that the problem required further study, the commissioners didn't rule out the possibility of using a site southeast of here, which had been proposed for the new dump.

The three Lane County commissioners and Forest Service officials were among some 25 people that attended a public meeting at the new dump site Saturday morning.

The site which is being considered is a borrow area on national forest land southeast of here, where fill for the Hills Creek Dam was excavated. The present dump, located on Pope and Talbot Lumber Co. property, is becoming inadequate because of the limited space for expansion, according to the county.

Saturday, several people voiced objections to relocating the dump to the site that has been suggested. They cited the danger of pollution to nearby Salt Creek and the Middle Fork of the Willamette River. The matter of smoke and offensive odor was mentioned also.

Periodic Tractor Burial

In explaining how the site could be utilized for the sanitary land fill disposal of garbage, Commissioner Hill said the dump would be surrounded by a drainage ditch to prevent run-off into nearby streams.

"All ordinary garbage, such as paper and other things would be buried," Hill said. Lumber and other wood materials would be "stacked and burned because it will never rot down. We wouldn't burn any wet garbage that would create a smudge or

hang around in the air," the commissioner said.

Garbage would be buried periodically by a crawler tractor and signs would be placed at the dump indicating where the different types of materials were to be dumped.

Hill said the dump would be inspected closely by the County Sanitation Department to guard against pollution.

"We have a sanitation that is just as strict on the county as

anyone else, and if we start any stream pollution, he'll stop us," Hill said.

Another Site Suggested
When asked if the matter of relocating the dump to the site had been settled already, the commissioner replied that it hadn't and that was one of the reasons for the meeting.

"However, we would like you to let us give it a try—then if it doesn't work we'll look for another area," Hill said.

A former rock quarry near the Hills Creek Reservoir was suggested as another site for a dump and county and Forest Service officials indicated the site would be studied.

Commissioner Kenneth Nielsen said relocation of the dump would be costly and suggested that a decision be postponed until further investigation is made. And Commissioner Frank Elliott said the present dump could probably be used for some time yet and if it got too full before a new dump is found, some of the refuse could be hauled out.
