Two Bulletins List 'Helps' For Dieters

Just because you've resolved to lose weight doesn't mean you're condemned to a diet of carrot sticks, celery, or cottage cheese.

Because you CAN eat better than a rabbit and still attain the svelte proportions you want so badly, according to Miss Virginia Houtchens, Lane extension agent.

"By choosing wisely what you eat, you can be both slim—and healthy," she said. "True, a wide girth may foretell a short life span. But so does a starved body."

"Food for fitness," she continued, is more than a tired cliché harped on by nutritionists. A daily food guide for everybody includes milk, meat or protein foods, vegetables and fruits, breads or cereal foods.

Closing the gap between what you weigh and what you want to weigh is all a matter of how many calories you consume in relation to your activities, muscular development, and bone structure.

Would-be weight losers will find their best morale builders in two bulletins from Lane Extension Service—"Food and Your Weight," a guide to what you should weigh, how to figure calorie intake, and suggestions for meals and menus; and "Food Values in Common Portions," a compact food composition table that reveals at a glance the nutritive value of foods.

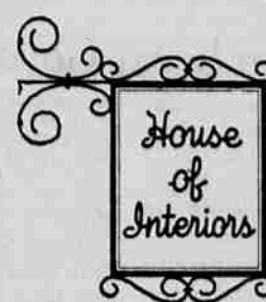

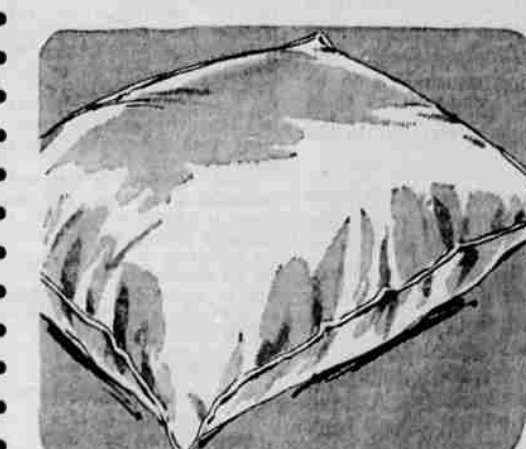
