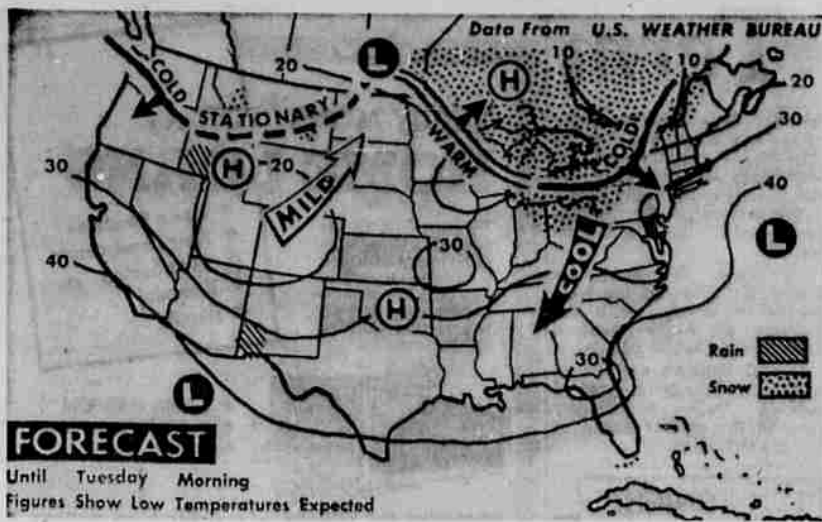




Fog and low clouds moved in Tuesday over the southern interior of western Oregon, where weathermen predict these weather conditions will continue through Tuesday. Parts of northern Oregon, and most of the nation, are expected to be fair or partly cloudy tonight.

The Great Lakes area and northern New England are expected to share in a snowstorm tonight with parts of central Canada. Seasonal temperatures are predicted tonight throughout the nation.

Fog, Clouds Forecast

EUGENE-SPRINGFIELD
Forecast: Fog or low clouds today, tonight and Tuesday, with partial clearing in afternoons. Expected high today, 40 degrees, predicted low Tuesday morning, 30 degrees, predicted high Tuesday, 42 degrees. Western Oregon: Mostly fair, except for fog or low clouds in south interior. Highs of 48-58, except for 35-45 in south interior; lows of 25-35.

Eastern Washington and Eastern Oregon — Temperatures Eastern Washington will range from above normal at the beginning of the period to much below normal by Friday or Saturday with the highs dropping to 20-30 and the lows to 15-25. Temperatures Eastern Oregon will range from near normal at the beginning of the period to below normal by Saturday with highs dropping to 22-32 and the lows to 12-22. Precipitation less than normal.
Western Washington and Western Oregon — Temperatures will range from near or above normal at the beginning of the period, with highs mostly 40-50 and lows 30-40 to much below normal by Friday or Saturday with highs dropping to 32-34 and lows 23-32. Precipitation less than normal, occurring mostly after Wednesday.

Aebi operated L'Abbe Restaurant in Lake Oswego and Chalet L'Abbe and the Oregon Liquor Control Commission cafeteria at Milwaukie. He recently resigned as a member of the Milwaukie City Council because of poor health.

OSU to Hold Science Institute

OREGON STATE UNIVERSITY—Oregon State University this coming summer will again provide special training in science and mathematics for superior high school students from across the U.S.
OSU received two of the 187 grants awarded by the National Science Foundation to leading educational and research institutions located throughout the country. It is the only Oregon school on the select list.

About 6,500 outstanding U.S. high school students will be chosen for the special advanced training in an effort to accelerate their educational development. The training is beyond that available in high school courses.
One of the grants to OSU is for a six-week training institute in earth and atmospheric sciences. Twenty-five top high school boys who have just completed their junior year will be picked for the June 24-to-Aug. 2 program. Prof. John F. Tatom of the atmospheric science branch of the OSU Science Research Institute will be in charge. The NSF grant in support of the training was \$11,715.

The other grant, for \$24,385, will support a seven-week mathematics institute for 55 boys who have finished the 10th and 11th grades. Robert E. Gaskell, professor of mathematics, is program director. A similar summer institute last year drew outstanding youth math "whizzes" from as far away as New York City.
Selection of youths will be based upon scholastic ability, scientific motivation, and high school science-math teacher recommendations. OSU officials said. The NSF grants cover costs of instruction and some room, board and travel funds for the superior students picked for the programs.

Gloomy Skies Cover East

Dismal weather — cloudy, foggy and wet — covered most of the eastern half of the nation and sections of the West Monday.

On the brighter side of the weather pattern, temperatures were fairly mild for this time of year.

Light rain or drizzle sprinkled the Gulf Coast and along the East Coast south of Cape Hatteras, N.C.

Light snow, freezing drizzle and drizzle dampened the Great Lakes region, while light snow fell in the northern half of the Mississippi Valley and the western Great Lakes region.

Fog shrouded broad areas of the northern Ohio Valley and the Great Lakes region. Extensive fog blanketed the Pacific Northwest.

Temperatures generally were above seasonal levels in most of the nation. However, in the southeast, low readings ranged from the 30s in northern sections to the 50s and 60s in southern Florida.
