

# Details Given On Guard Plan

WASHINGTON (AP)—National Guard divisions will get an increase in strength as well as additional equipment under the new reorganization plan announced last weekend, the Army disclosed Tuesday.

A spokesman said the manpower authorizations will be based on an average full strength of about 15,000 men each, as compared to 13,700 for infantry and 14,600 for armored divisions at present.

In high-priority National Guard infantry divisions, which are to be maintained at 75 to 80 per cent of full strength, this will be several hundred additional drill pay berths for civilian soldiers.

The new reorganization plan was announced Saturday as a last-minute concession to the National Governors' Conference before it withdrew its collective resistance to the guard reorganization. Some individual states still may veto the changes.

For the first time, the new plan includes the guard divisions in a system called "ROAD" (Reorganization Objectives for Army Divisions) which is also being applied to regular troops.

All divisions, both regular and guard, are to be given missions for fighting in Europe, Asia or other parts of the world.

If the plan is fully carried out, guard infantry divisions assigned to Europe will be converted into mechanized outfits.

This will mean three tank battalions instead of two, and will substitute seven mechanized battalions for the present infantry units.

The Army said the staff reorganization, but not the deliveries of new equipment, will be completed in time for this summer's training camp sessions in states where the governors grant their approval.

The high-priority divisions have not yet been designated, but they are expected to be in Massachusetts, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, North Carolina, Minnesota, and Tennessee.

## Board Picks Prison Aide

SALEM (AP)—A 30-year-old counselor, who got his college education while working at the penitentiary, was appointed deputy warden of the state prison Tuesday.

George E. Sullivan, 30, was named by the Board of Control to be deputy to Warden C. T. Gladden. Sullivan will be in charge of individual treatment.

Gladden recommended Sullivan as an outstanding employee.

Sullivan was graduated from Hillsboro High School at the age of 16, and was discharged in 1954 from the Navy after serving four years. He was a gunner's mate.

He then went to work at the penitentiary as a counselor.

In 1956, he started at Willamette University as a special student, and was graduated last June. He took his college work for six years while acting as a counselor, Gladden said.

Sullivan succeeds Lewis Barnes, who resigned.

The other deputy warden is Lloyd Francis, who has charge of mass treatment.

## Woman Killed In Auto Mishap

GRANTS PASS (AP)—Edith Beatrice Schramm, 57, Grants Pass, suffered fatal injuries Monday night when she was struck by a car as she crossed Highway 199, a short distance south of Grants Pass.

State police identified the driver of the car as Leroy Warren Slanaker, 23, Grants Pass. He was not cited.

The woman was Oregon's 10th traffic fatality this year in the Associated Press tabulation.

## Claim Rejected

MONTREAL (AP)—A court rejected Mrs. Paul G. Mathieu's claim that, because her husband ran out on his support payments, they should be paid by her mother-in-law. Justice Arthur I. Smith said previous rulings indicate first responsibility in the case lies with Mrs. Mathieu's parents.

## Employment Placements Gain in '62

SALEM (AP)—The Oregon State Employment Service said Tuesday it placed considerably more persons in jobs during the calendar year 1962 than during 1961.

Total placements for the year were up more than 24 per cent, said director Eldon Cone—from 409,253 in 1961 to 507,419 in 1962.

He said placements during December 1962 were up more than 31 per cent, from 4,022 in December 1961 to 5,291 last month.

Non-agricultural placements during December were up more than 30 per cent compared to a year ago and agriculture placements jumped more than 39 per cent, he said.

Claims for unemployment insurance during 1962 dropped nearly 12 per cent from 1961, Cone said. They totaled 195,306 in 1962, compared to 221,812 in 1961.

The amount of benefits paid during the year dropped from \$39.3 million in 1961 to \$28.3 million last year, Cone said, a drop of almost 28 per cent.

TOKYO (AP)—Radio Moscow announced Mongolian Communists opened a special meeting Tuesday in their capital, Ulan Bator, to discuss ideological problems. These problems are dominated now by the Moscow-Peking split.

The Soviet Union sent a delegation.

Mongolia is a Communist-ruled buffer between the Russians and the Chinese. It has mutual aid treaties with both.

## 36 Perish in Gulf

TEHRAN, Iran (AP)—A motor launch foundered in the stormy Persian Gulf near Bushire Monday night and 36 of the 60 persons aboard perished, according to reports reaching this capital Tuesday.

## Pair Elude Police Trap

PORTLAND (AP)—Portland police surprised three men in the act of burglarizing a home near Waverley Country Club Monday night. One was arrested and two escaped in a bullet-punctured flight across the golf course.

Floyd K. Peterson, 47, was arrested and charged with burglary in a dwelling.

Police fired at the other two and said one of them may have been wounded. But he scaled a high fence surrounding the golf course and disappeared. The other suspect made it to the east bank of the Willamette River where he eluded officers.

At the height of the manhunt, city police had seven cars of officers, state police had several units and the Clackamas County Sheriff's Office had deputies and a 30-man sheriff's reserve unit on the scene. The reserve unit had just completed a regular training session when the call for help went out.

Police said they had the trio and the house under surveillance for several days after reports that suspicious-looking individuals had been seen in the area.

## Russians Say 32 Christians Back at Homes in Siberia

MOSCOW (AP)—The 32 Russian Christians who sought refuge in the U. S. Embassy last week from alleged religious persecution have returned to their Siberian homes, Communist party officials said Tuesday.

The officials declined to give further details on the fate of the Christians or reveal whether any of the 14 children among them had been taken from their parents.

A party functionary in Krasnoyarsk territory, where the peasants lived, told western correspondents by telephone the group arrived at Chernogorsk, their home town, Sunday.

The official, who identified herself as the head of the party school section for Krasnoyarsk territory, was asked, "How many children have been taken from their parents?"

"I can't tell you how many have been taken away," she replied.

## HST Blames Ike for Fate Of Battleship

SEATTLE (AP)—Former President Harry S. Truman, who wants the Battleship Missouri moved, says "if Eisenhower wanted to place it in a closet he couldn't have found a better place than the Bremerton Navy Yard."

Truman's latest criticism of former President Dwight D. Eisenhower came in a letter published Tuesday by the Seattle Post-Intelligencer.

At Palm Desert, Calif., where Eisenhower is vacationing, his secretary said he would not comment.

## Pelly Disagrees

Rep. Thomas Pelly, R-Wash., said in Washington:

"I don't believe President Eisenhower had anything to do with placing the Missouri in Bremerton."

The Missouri, christened in 1944 by Truman's daughter Margaret, has been at the Puget Sound Naval Shipyard in Bremerton since 1954. It's in the so-called moth-ball fleet.

There has been talk recently of moving it to San Francisco, New Orleans, St. Louis or Brooklyn. The Navy says it has made no decision.

## Favors Brooklyn

Truman told the P-I the vessel draws too much water to steam up the Mississippi to St. Louis. He said he would rather see it in Brooklyn than San Francisco, because it was christened at the Brooklyn Navy Yard.

As for Bremerton, he said: "It seems to me the Battleship Missouri has been put as far away from the public to see as it could possibly be."

Said Pelly: "The ship shouldn't be transferred because of an antagonism Truman apparently has because he thinks Eisenhower placed it in Bremerton."

"He never did particularly warm up to Ike," Pelly added.

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## Printers Miss Talk; Investigation Asked

NEW YORK (AP)—Striking printers were not represented Tuesday as three jurists met to study the city's newspaper blackout.

The printers' chief negotiator, Bertram A. Powers, president of Local 6, International Typographical Union, AFL-CIO, said he would not attend meetings of the so-called "board of public accountability" unless the union approves.

The question will be presented to the union membership at a meeting Sunday.

The board of jurists invited all parties in the strike to attend the session to discuss procedure and the issue of the dispute.

Those attending the session included representatives of the Publishers' Assn. of New York City, the New York Newspaper Guild, the Deliverers Union and the Photo-Engravers Union.

## Probe Requested

In another development the printers announced they have asked the U.S. attorney general to probe what they call possible antitrust law violations by the publishers.

The board, presided over by Judge Harold R. Medina of the U. S. Court of Appeals, was appointed Sunday by U. S. Secretary of Labor W. Willard Wirtz. Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller and Mayor Robert F. Wagner.

One of the board's main purposes, as spelled out by the ap-

pointing officials, is to study the 32-day newspaper shutdown to determine if the public's interests "are being given due account."

In Cleveland, Ohio, the mayor called for a meeting Tuesday between publishers and two striking unions to try to bring light to a 40-day blackout of the two daily newspapers there.

Negotiations in Cleveland were bogged down. The AFL-CIO Cleveland Newspaper Guild and the Independent Teamsters Union struck the Plain Dealer and the Press & News. Chief issues are the Guild's demands for union security and the Teamsters' insistence on improved wages and working conditions.

Advisory Only  
In New York, the mission of the board of jurists was described as advisory only. The board was not empowered to pass judgment on wages and other strike issues.

The publishers said they would cooperate with the board. Powers said members of Local 6 will meet Sunday to decide whether the printers will go along with the fact-finding study.

He also announced he has asked U. S. Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy to look into an agreement among publishers of the nine closed newspapers that a strike against one was a strike against all.

The printers last Dec. 8 struck the Times, Daily News, Journal-American and World-Telegram & the Sun. The city's five other major dailies—the Post, Herald Tribune, Mirror, Long Island Press and Long Island Star-Journal—then cancelled further publication, except that the Press continues to print non-city editions for suburban Long Island.
