South Wallops Marshfield

COOS BAY—South Eugene, seemingly unable to miss in the first half, obliterated Marshfield 86-59 Saturday night in District 5-A-1 basketball action.

South Eugene, making it two straight district wins, hit .867 from the field in the first quarter and the Axemen were off and running.

They never looked back in doing what has always come hard for South Eugene—win at Marshfield.

South Eugene, beaten twice in pre-season play when hampered by key injuries, hit .714 in the second half and wound up the half with an unbelievable

.688 average.

The Axemen finished with a 54.8 mark. The halftime margin was 53-28 and the Axemen simply coasted in while the shooting average, as it had to do, came down.

Jim Lockard led the scoring onslaught with 27 points while teammate Jack Willis was adding 20.

Junior center John Pinkstaff sent the visitors ahead at the start but Marshfield, getting a field goal from Bud Walsh, tied it at 2-2.

Then gave the Pirates their only

lead of the game.

Willis hit from the corner, Pinkstaff added three points and Lockard a jump shot to give South Eugene a 9-3 lead before the Pirates scored again.

With 2½ minutes to go in the quarter, the Axemen led 22-7 and it was 26-12 at the stop. In the first 3½ minutes of the second quarter, Marshfield couldn't score while the fast-breaking visitors were running up a string of 13 straight points.

That ran the margin to 39-12 and South Eugene ended up the period by allowing the Pirates only two field goals during that eight minutes.

South Eugene maintained a 30-point lead much of the final half.

The Willamette Wolverines, dead for three quarters, came alive in the final eight minutes on the play of forward Steve Skelton for a 48-43 come-from-behind basketball victory over

the Cottage Grove Lions Saturday night at Willamette.

The Wolverines, who ended the game with a frigid .181 mark from the field, trailed by 10 points at 38-28 with five minutes remaining in the game.

Then Skelton, with some clutch help from Terry Stahel and Dave Syverson, went to work.

The Lions, bothered by the tight defense work of the Wolverines, could get off only six shots in those last eight minutes.

Skelton was all over the floor, stealing passes and harassing his opponents.

Two free throws by Phil Petersen and then a driving lay-in by Syverson brought the Wolverines within one at 39-40 with 2:30 to go.

Skelton then followed with an exhibition that won the game for the cold-shooting Wolverines.

Driving between two bewildered Lions, Skelton put the Wolverines ahead for the first time at 41-40.

Moments later he connected from 15 feet out.
