

For 81-58 Triumph

Idaho Waltzes Past Oregon

Idaho took advantage of Oregon's cold shooting and ball handling miscues in the first half, then raced away with a 47-point second half to trounce the Webfoots 81-58 Saturday night at McArthur Court.

It was simply a case of "doing what we are supposed to do," as far as Idaho basketball coach Joe Cipriano was concerned as he compared Friday's narrow 62-61 overtime win to Saturday's cakewalk victory. "We broke a lot better."

The Vandals' 6-foot-6 tower of strength, Gus Johnson, again dominated the game by sweep-

ing rebounds off Oregon's backboard, blocking Webfoot passes and shots and firing the ball down court where as many as three teammates had gone as soon as the Webfoots had taken their shots.

And his behind-the-back passes from the free throw lane set up numerous "backdoor" layin shots for the Vandals.

In marked contrast to Friday's game, Oregon was never really in this one.

The Webfoots made only one floor shot in the first 8½ minutes as Idaho took a 10-5 lead, then had another drought during the last 6½ minutes of the period when they made only one

more shot from the field.

By halftime, Idaho had pulled into a 34-20 lead by outshooting the Ducks, percentage-wise, 405 to 250. Oregon made only seven field goals before intermission.

When Oregon couldn't close the gap in the second half, it had to junk all pre-game strategy and battle to avoid being run out of Mac Court.

"We had planned to play it differently," Belko said in the morgue-like Webfoot dressing room after the game, "but we made so many ball handling errors at first we couldn't. If we had got to within six points we would have."

The Ducks lost the ball on steals, traveling violations, bad passes and offensive fouls 12 times during the first 20 minutes.

Johnson was so effective clearing the boards that the Vandals often sent their second best rebounder, Chuck White down court before the ball had been recovered.

"I've never seen a ball club that can send two good rebounders down . . . because they're so sure he'll (Johnson) come down with it," Belko said.

At one point when the Vandals were racing down the court while the Ducks converged on the basket to fight it out with Johnson for the rebound, one of the 3,549 spectators yelled, "Run with them, Belko."

But Belko later explained, "you can't run with this ball club. They'd run you out of the gym." He said of Johnson: "He makes the fast break go like it was designed to go."

"I've never seen a better one walk in this gym since I've been here."

Big Gus, going at half speed part of the game — he's just starting to get back in shape after the 12 days practice missed during the Far West Classic, Cipriano explained — pulled down 17 rebounds, had 16 points and if records were kept of such things, would have set up at least a dozen layins and short jump shots with his clever passes.

White, however, led the Vandal scoring with 19, while Rich Porter chipped in 17 and Tom Whitfield another 13 points. Oregon improved its shooting to 47 per cent in the second half, but the Vandals improved too — to 49 per cent. And they had 10 more shots at the basket.

Steve Jones, who found the range for only three points during the first half, came on strong after the recess, sinking seven of 11 shots and ended up as Oregon's high scorer with 18 points. Jim Johnson had 17 although he fouled out with over 11 minutes left to play.

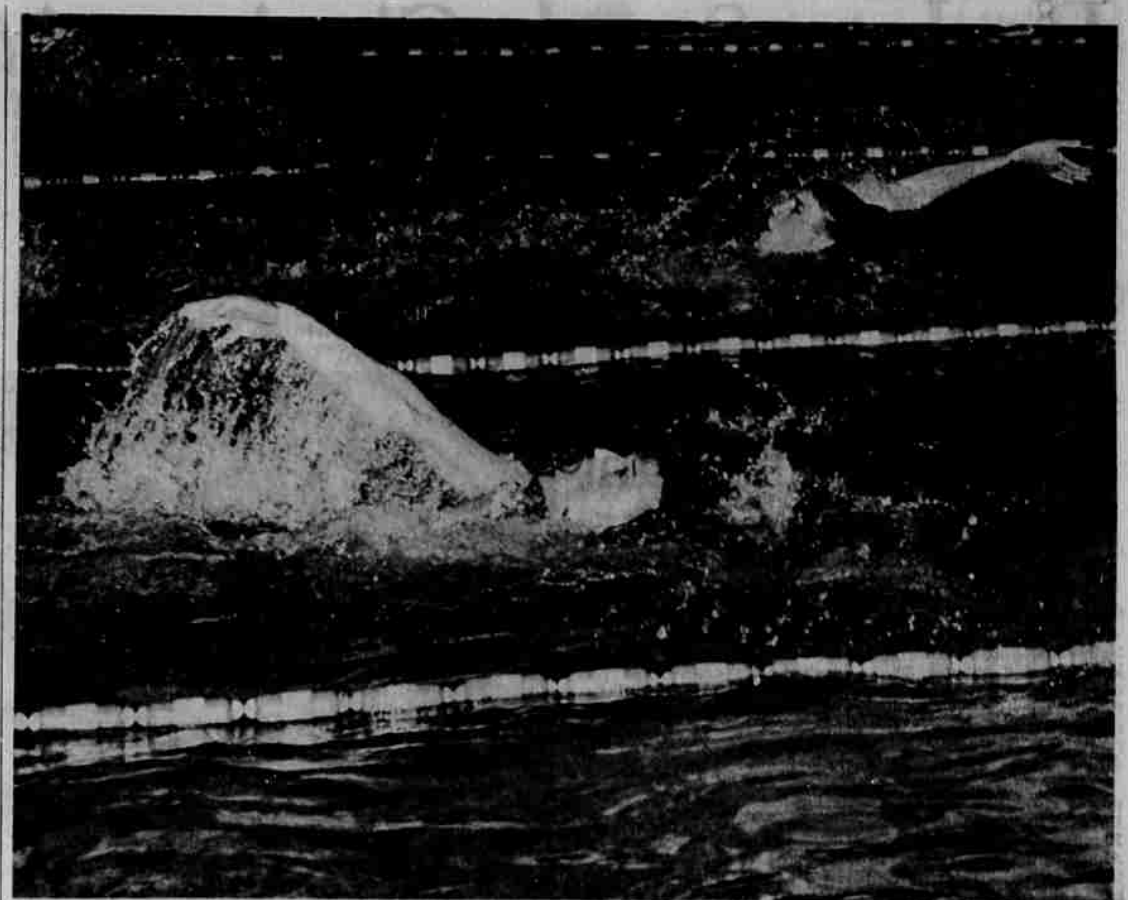
Guard Jim Barnett added 16 points and forward Bill Jennings 14 points to the winning cause.

Beavers Fall, 96-69

STANFORD, Calif. (AP) — Stanford, jumping off to 27-point lead in the first half, coasted to a 96-69 win over Oregon State Saturday night in a non-conference basketball game, avenging its 65-58 defeat by the Beavers Friday night.

Stanford center Tom Dose led

the Indians with 29 points.

Hitting over 50 per cent of the shots, the Indians piled up an early 16-4 lead and built it up to 41-14 with seven minutes left.

Then the Beavers cut away at the margin, mostly on long jump shots by their seven-foot

center Mel Counts, and Stanford led by 14 at the half, 53-39.

The ball-hugging Beavers cut the Stanford margin to 11 in the second half at 65-54, but then Counts fouled out with 11 minutes and 44 seconds left. Stanford breezed from there.

It was the worst defeat ever suffered by Oregon State at the hands of the Indians.

Counts was high for the Beavers with 20 points. OSU star Terry Baker was held to 11 points.

The point total of 96 was the highest ever run up against a team coached by Oregon State's Slat Gill. Gill has been noted for teaching defense.

It also was the highest Stanford total on the Indians' home floor and their highest score since 1951.

The Beavers couldn't seem to work the ball effectively against the tenacious Stanford defense and had to rely on the long shots of Frank Peters and Mel Counts. Peters got 15.

Counts sank eight out of 14 attempts from the floor and had four out of four from the foul line before he fouled out. He drew three foul calls in the first three minutes and Gill substituted Tim Campbell much of the time after that.

Guard Don Clemenson held Baker to five field goals while getting six baskets and hitting seven from seven from the foul line for 19 points. Clemenson had seven assists.

Defensive standout for the Indians was Clayton Raaka who hauled down nine rebounds and added three tips and a layin in making his 10 points.

The Indians forced Oregon State into 17 ball control errors while making 12 of their own.

Oregon Wins Swim Meet

Oregon's swimming team opened the 1963 season by swamping previously undefeated University of Puget Sound 79-16 at Leighton Pool Saturday.

Coach Don Van Rossen's Webfoots won all eleven events in posting the one-sided victory.

Corby Coultis, red-headed sophomore from Chula Vista, Calif., paced the Oregon victory with two first place finishes and a leg on the 400-yard freestyle relay triumph.

Coultis captured the 200-yard freestyle, came back to establish a meet record of 2:15.2 in the 200-yard butterfly and capped his first varsity dual meet performance by anchoring the 400-yard freestyle relay team.

NCAA Returns Free Substitution To College Game

CORONADO, Calif. (AP) — The National Collegiate Athletic Association Saturday brought back free substitution, after a 10-year hiatus, to college football.

There are a few strings attached.

The 15-man NCAA Rules Committee voted for the forthcoming season to allow completely free substitution by either team during all time outs and on all plays of a series except the fourth down and when the ball changes hands.

On the fourth down, each team will be allowed to substitute two men on the current "wild card" basis. When the ball changes hands, two more men may be sent in.

Under the old free substitution rule, last in effect in 1952, a coach could substitute any number of men at any time.

The Rules Committee also voted to reduce the number of time outs from five to four for each half and made T-formation quarterbacks eligible to receive passes.

Thomas Clears Seven Feet in Boycotted Indoor Track Meet

BOSTON (AP) — John Thomas cleared 7 feet, Bill Dotson, one of America's sub-4-minute milers won his specialty in 4 minutes, 9.9 seconds and a slight crack appeared in the NCAA-ordered boycott as the strident indoor track season got under way Saturday night with the Boston Knights of Columbus meet.

Thomas, former world record holder who has used up his eligibility at Boston University, cleared 7 feet on his first try at

that height. It marked an auspicious season's start for Thomas who is expected to tangle again in Moscow this summer with his nemesis, Valery Brumel of Russia, the current holder of the world mark.

Dotson beat out Canada's Jim Irons by two-tenths of a second in the mile, with Olavi Salonen of Finland third.

There was no doubt the boycott hurt the meet. Several club events not on the program were put on, there were only two

heats in the dash and no preliminaries in the hurdles. Still, there was a slight breach in the boycott.

John Belitza of the University of Maryland, the co-NCAA pole vault champion, competed, in addition to two other Maryland athletes — Rod Lambert, a sprinter, and Dick Smith, a middle distance runner. They competed unattached because they are ineligible.

"I am representing the University of Maryland with the

full approval of the coach (Jim Kehoe), the athletic director (Bill Cobey), and all other authorities in the university," said Belitza.

A crowd of 7,233 — about 4,500 under the normal attendance — was on hand for the meet in Boston Garden. Except for the three Maryland athletes, the boycott was fully effective.

The NCAA-backed U.S. track and field federation is demanding co-sanctioning power with the Amateur Athletic Union.

The Boston K of C officials did not seek USTFF sanction, so the boycott was ordered.

The National Indoor Track Meet Directors Assn., meanwhile voted Saturday to continue its regular winter schedule "solely" under the sanction of the AAU.

In a statement, the association said it would continue to welcome the entries of colleges and universities, which currently are barred.

Bill Crothers of the East York Track Club of Toronto, the defending champion, set a meet record in the 1,000-yard run, hustling the distance in 2 minutes, 8.6 seconds. That smashed the mark of 2:09.2 set by Yale's Tom Carroll in 1960.

Lt. Ernie Cunliffe of the Oxford, Calif., Air Force Base, the ex-indoor record holder, was second, followed by Ergas Leps of the Toronto Track Club and Maryland's Smith.

Pin-sized Ira Murchison of the Chicago Track Club won the 50-yard dash in 5.5 seconds with

Maryland's Lambert fourth.

Hayes Jones of Detroit won his 30th straight indoor timber event when he whipped to a 5.5 victory in the 45-yard high hurdles. This equaled the meet record set in 1957 by Lee Calhoun and indicated the veteran Jones is not yet ready to abdicate his throne as the country's No. 1 hurdler.
