

Bonham Sparks Cincinnati to Victory Over Tulsa

TULSA, Okla. (AP)—Cincinnati's Bon Bonham went on a 20-point spree in the second half and led the top-ranked Bearcats to a come-from-behind Missouri Valley Conference basketball victory over Tulsa 67-57 Saturday night.

Tulsa led most of the first half by margins ranging up to seven points, but Cincinnati moved into a 32-32 halftime tie

—the first time this season the Bearcats have not been ahead at the intermission.

The second half was all Bonham who put Cincinnati ahead to stay at 40-38 with 16:17 left to play.

Bonham was the game's high scorer with 30 points.

Ohio State, 68-66
COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP)—Ohio

State's defending champions knocked Michigan out of the Big Ten Conference co-leadership Saturday night with a come-from-behind 68-66 victory.

It was Michigan's first league loss, and left both teams with a 2-1 conference record and 10-2 over-all.

The Bucks, down by 10 points late in the slow first period which ended with the Wolver-

ines on top by 29-25, came on strong in the final period and went ahead at 55-54 with less than seven minutes remaining.

Duke, 78-67
DURHAM, N.C. (AP)—Art Heyman scored 28 points as sixth-ranked Duke rolled to an easy 78-67 Atlantic Coast Conference basketball victory over Clemson Saturday night.

Duke jumped to a quick lead at the outset and continued to build the margin until it was 74-52 with about four minutes to play. Coach Vic Bubas then pulled his Duke regulars and Clemson closed the gap.

Illinois, 106-82
CHAMPAIGN, Ill. (AP)—With six players scoring in double figures, fifth-ranked Illinois ran

up its highest basketball tally of the season Saturday in blasting Purdue 106-82 for a third straight Big Ten victory.

The Illini, boosting their over-all record to 11-1, grabbed a 6-0 lead as Purdue went three minutes without scoring and kept padding it out. At the half it was 44-32 after Purdue, in one span, went 11 minutes without retrieving a rebound.

Notre Dame, 105-60
SOUTH BEND, Ind. (AP)—Two Notre Dame sophomores combined for 46 points Saturday afternoon and the Irish slaughtered the University of Detroit basketball team 105-60.

Ron Reed scored 25 points, including 13 of 16 free throws, and pulled down 19 rebounds. Larry Sheffed added 21, only five on free throws.

Michigan State, 75-68
MADISON, Wis. (AP)—Michigan State upset the favored Wisconsin Badgers Saturday 75-68 for the Spartans' first Big Ten basketball victory of the season.

Pete Gent led the way with 19 points for the winners as the cold-shooting Badgers dropped their first conference game at home. Both teams now are 1-1 in Big Ten play.

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Cathy Nagel Wins Crown In Sun Cup

BEND (Special)—Little Cathy Nagel, the 14-year-old daughter of a Washington state ski instructor, already reigns as U.S. national junior women's downhill champion.

Saturday, the brown-haired skier demonstrated that she is tops among the region's slalom racers, too.

She whizzed an icy course in 58.5 seconds, nearly four seconds faster than any other skier, male or female, to win the annual Sun Cup slalom at Mt. Bachelor.

A total of 186 skiers from Oregon, Washington and Idaho are here for the competition which ends with the downhill events Sunday. It is one of several qualifying races for junior racers trying to win berths on the Pacific Northwest team which will compete in the national championships later this winter.

Mt. Bachelor's slopes are presenting an extra challenge to the racers this weekend. Stiff winds which accompanied the winds Thursday and Friday swept almost every flake of new snow off the hill, leaving vast expanses of glare ice.

Although it wasn't unusually cold Saturday, few persons but the racers tried skiing. Almost everyone walked around on the slopes without skis, using sharply-pointed ski poles to help maintain balance.

At the lodge, lift tickets were sold only to those who absolutely insisted they wanted to ski. The management official advice to prospective ticket-buyers: Save your money until the skiing is better.

With one exception, the racers who chose to tackle the icy course came away with only assorted bruises from frequent falls on the hard surface.

Sole serious casualty was Kent Stokes of McCall, Ida., who suffered an apparent broken leg in a fall after finishing the race.

Miss Nagel, who recently returned from an Olympic Alpine training camp at Vail, Colo., where she underwent two weeks of intensive training with the nations best skiers, led the junior expert women's division.

Second was Karen Skjersaa of Bend, another 1962 national team member, with a time of 1:02.2, and third was Sherry Blann of Bend in 1:04.2.

The young women, skiing the same course as their male counterparts, gave the junior expert men a shelling. Ken Strode of McCall put forth the best male effort, a time of 1:12.2.

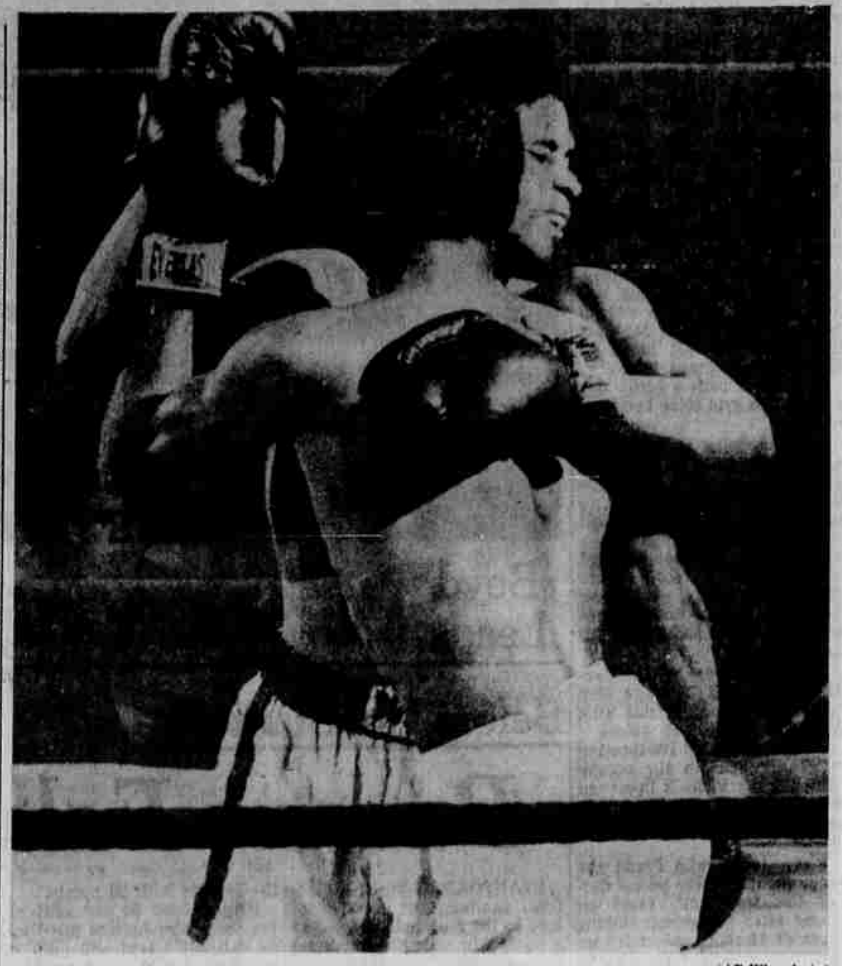

Alongi Down Three Times Daniels Wins Fight With TKO in Fifth

NEW YORK (AP)—Billy Daniels, a rangy New York heavyweight, halted Tony Alongi of Hollywood, Fla., on a technical knockout at 2 minutes, 50 seconds of the fifth round of a nationally televised bout Saturday night at Sunnyside Garden, a farm club of Madison Square Garden.

Daniels, who weighed 188 pounds, dropped Alongi twice in the fifth round of the scheduled 10-rounder. When he shoved Alongi to the canvas for a third time Referee Arthur Mercante halted the bout.

Alongi, a 2-1 underdog, scaled 1954.

The 23-year-old Alongi was far ahead until Daniels uncorked a pair of clubbing rights to drop him in the fifth.

On the first knockdown, Alongi protested to the referee that he had been off balance. But on the second, there was no doubt he had been solidly tagged.

The 24-year-old Daniels then went all out to score a third knockdown. His flurries made Alongi back off but Tony kept out of trouble until Daniels threw him to the deck. Mercante then waved that it was all over, although he said he was not acting on the New York's three-knockdown TKO rule.

The 1,611 fans, a near-capacity crowd at this small club, booed lustily at Mercante's action.

"He was defenseless and glassy-eyed," the referee said later.
