

Dean of Graduate Seminary Notes 'Keen' Competition

Competition is "keen" today for seminary students for all denominations, says J. Daniel Joyce, dean of the graduate seminary at Phillips University, Enid, Okla.

Joyce, visiting Northwest Christian College in Eugene this week to interview students interested in attending his seminary, and to address the Preachers' Parliament at NCC, said in an interview that NCC is "sort of a phenomenon" among Christian colleges today.

Of NCC's 350 students, Joyce said, 250 students intend to enter full-time religious service. Many of the men who plan to enter the ministry will eventually study at Phillips, where there are 17 NCC graduates at this time, he said.

NCC's record in supplying men for the ministry, he said, is "unparalleled" in this respect. And NCC's recent regional accreditation, he said, will "take the pressure" off Phillips and other seminaries which are limited to a certain percentage of students from non-accredited schools.

Other denominations, he said,

are trying to meet the shortage of seminary students by recruiting ministers from the professions and other fields.

But the Christian Church has not been as successful in this as some denominations, he said. Despite the drop in seminary enrollment, Joyce said, the gen-

eral quality of seminary graduates has not risen significantly. The "overall undergraduate preparation" of the students, however, has risen, Joyce feels.

He has been dean of the graduate seminary since July 1, and prior to that, served in the pastoral ministry for many years before becoming a professor at Christian Theological Seminary at Indianapolis, Ind.

Joyce, asked to comment on the current problems in many denominations about "liberal teachings" in seminaries, said that the problem is really one of presenting the findings of Biblical research and study to the laity—who are behind the seminaries in this field.

But there is "an encouraging sign" today, Joyce said. Many seminaries are conducting lay schools of theology, he said, and laymen "are coming in great numbers" to participate. In addition, churches are offering more classes in theology, and more laymen are recognizing that study of theology is necessary to understand their faith.

Joyce will return to Oregon in April for an Oregon Christian Ministers Retreat near Portland.

University Religious Forum Week Appraised

Some Dissatisfaction

Some dissatisfaction was expressed this week by organizers and committee heads of Religious Forum Week, which ended Wednesday night at the University of Oregon.

Generally, the comments at the conclusion from these sources indicated several areas of dissatisfaction:

• There was little or no discussion between the speakers, who represented differ-

ent faiths and several points of view, although discussion between individuals has frequently developed in similar week-long programs in the past.

• The planning committee intended that speakers would participate in the discussion sessions after each lecture, but in a number of cases, only one or two of the visiting

speakers attended the discussion sessions, and these asked few questions.

• Speakers were in and out during the week — not all the speakers were able to participate in the entire program.

"I have not been happy with it (Religious Forum Week) this year," said Lois Greenwood, director of the

campus YWCA and advisor to the student committee organizing the event.

But Miss Greenwood emphasized that any difficulties were not due to the student committee — which she said, "did a fine job." She especially complimented Jim Orrell, the chairman.

Perhaps, Miss Greenwood said, there was a key person

— a speaker — needed on the program to tie things together.

Miss Greenwood also expressed dissatisfaction with the attendance during the week. Several lectures attracted only an estimated 70 or 75 students and townspeople. Best-attended of the week-long program was a lecture Wednesday night by J. Edwin Orr.

Other speakers were Dr. Camilla M. Anderson, Salem, a psychiatrist; David Bassan of Los Angeles, a business executive; Dr. Ralph Byron of Los Angeles, a surgeon, and the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Thomas J. Tobin of Portland, a student of labor-management relations.

'Horses Led to Choice of Psychiatry'

Dr. Camilla Anderson, director of the outpatient department of the Oregon State Hospital at Salem, became a psychiatrist, she says, "because of a load of horses."

This she revealed at the religious forum session this week. She graduated from the University of Oregon in 1925, then went on to the University of Oregon Medical School and graduated from there in 1929.

That was a bad year, she reflected, to be looking for a job. And it was even harder then, she said, for a woman—since

few women had entered the practice of medicine.

Finally Doctor Anderson had two job offers: one to work with tuberculosis victims in Texas and another, a psychiatric post, in New York State.

Personally, she said, she "knew a little" about TB and "nothing" about psychiatry. But her brother, whom she describes as "a cowboy," had sold a load of horses several years before in New York State and recom-

mended it—so she took the New York job.

This story is typical of Doctor Anderson and her humor. In a lecture, such as the one she gave this week at the University of Oregon's Religious Forum Week, she speaks with a "homey" touch — grammar is sometimes sacrificed for humor or to emphasize a particular point.

But her books—"Saints, Sinners and Psychiatry," and "Be-

yond Freud" — are smoothly written.

Doctor Anderson is also a very frank woman. Last Sunday night, she told the audience: "Nothing I am going to say will teach you anything."

Members of the audience, she continued, would have to have some preparation and willingness to listen in order to gain something from the lecture.

Later, she was introduced at a discussion by University of Oregon President Arthur S. Flemming. In his introduction, he referred to one of her books, saying he wanted to read it.

Before the introduction was over, Doctor Anderson had autographed a copy and presented it to Flemming.

Nor is Doctor Anderson shy in taking digs at her own profession.

"Psychiatry," she quipped, "is sometimes thought of as a godless place. We have our gods ... for a time it was Sigmund Freud."

Impact of Vatican Council In Healing Rift Described

Members of Protestant Churches—formerly officially referred to by the Roman Catholic Church as "separated brethren"—are now "fellow Christians."

This development, said the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Thomas J. Tobin, vicar-general of the Archdiocese of Portland in Oregon and a delegate to the Second Vatican Council in Rome, came from the first sessions of the council.

"We're not working any more for return or capitulation," he said at a luncheon during the University of Oregon's Religious Forum Week. "We're not talking about that any more."

Instead, the monsignor said, there is an attitude toward Protestants of "a triple unity"—a "unity" to be considered in three ways: formal unity, truth and love and charity. He said there were two

major opinion groups at the Council—the group "that is afraid that traditional Catholic beliefs will be watered down," and a second group, which believes that much of Protestant and Hebrew Biblical research "is valid."

The latter group, the monsignor said, is prevailing.

He predicted that the Council's "forward-looking" group will control, and that there "was no possibility of a new dogma being discussed that would bring further separation" between Catholics and Protestants.
