\$6 Billion Education Program on Tap

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Kennedy administration will propose a massive five year aid-to-education program of more than \$6 billion, informed sources report.

It is to be spelled out in a special message to Congress late this month or early in February.

The sources said there has been general agreement on what the program will entail.

The bare bones of the plan were sketched in President Kennedy's budget message Wednesday, which recommended \$144 million in such spending for the year beginning July 1.

The budget also requested authorization to enter into spending commitments of up to \$1.215,000,000 during the year.

This request, it was learned Friday, was made to provide the foundation for a program running five times, or more, that amount.

Programs involving construction do not require big outlays at the beginning. Costs rise as the blueprints are drawn and construction starts.

A welfare department spokesman said the \$144 million in spending recommended for next year is part of "a process leading into two, three, four or five years of substantial expenditures."

He said the program will contain provisions for aid to public schools for classroom construction and teachers' salaries. He declined to elaborate.

For 15 years or more, the White House has been recommending federal aid to education, but Congress never has enacted any general aid program. Prospects for this year are not considered bright, partly because of differences over whether aid should be given to church and private schools.

Lane Legislators Named to Committees

Two state representatives from Lane County were named last week to legislative committees at Salem.

Rep. Richard Eymann, D-Marcola, was named to the Legislative Fiscal Committee, and Rep. Richard Kennedy, D-Eugene, was named to the Legislative Counsel Committee.

FALSE STORY — Linda Light, 19, a Washburn University sophomore who was Miss Kansas in last year's Miss Universe contest, admitted Saturday night that her story of having been stabbed in the abdomen by a knife-wielding male intruder was a hoax. Police said the small scratch was self-inflicted and that she had been under strain preparing for final examinations. She had concocted the story Friday in her parent's home in Topeka.

Choice of Leader Causes Anxiety in British Labor

LONDON (AP) — Britain's Labor party moved Saturday night toward choice of a new leader with anxiety in the ranks that a fight could hurt the chances of the Socialists taking over the government.

Three political veterans — none very well known outside Britain — were in the race for the job that could make the winner prime minister in the event the Laborites win the next election.

The death of leader Hugh Gaitskell, 56, Friday night created the possibility of a struggle between right — and left-wing factions — feuds that have split the party in the past.

Gaitskell himself had trouble gaining the allegiance of both factions. But he succeeded and raised high Labor's hopes for challenging Prime Minister Harold Macmillan's Conservatives in the elections, which must take place before October 1964.

The Socialist "shadow" cabinet — leaders in Parliament who would form the new government if Labor wins — will meet Monday to consider Gaitskell's successor.

Deputy leader George Brown called the meeting Saturday evening before the date has been fixed for Gaitskell's funeral.

Brown, 48, a specialist on defense, is in the party's right-wing camp and has often come under fire from left-wingers for his blunt attacks on communism. He once got into a free-wheeling word fight with Soviet Premier Khrushchev when the Soviet leader met with Labor leaders during a visit to Britain.

Two others in the race with Brown for leader are:

• Harold Wilson, 46, an economist and the party's spokesman on foreign affairs. He is a former ally of the late Aneurin Bevan and a favorite of the left.

• James Callaghan, 50, an expert on financial policy who looms as a possible compromise choice between Wilson and Brown.

W. Parrish Rites Tuesday

Private funeral services have tentatively been set for Tuesday for Wilbur "Bill" Parrish, 52, former manager of the Eugene office of the American Automobile Assn.

Parrish, who has lived in Portland during the past few years, died Friday. He suffered a cerebral hemorrhage a few weeks ago and was at the Good Samaritan Hospital in Portland.

Parrish had lived in Eugene most of his life. He is survived by his wife Oleta, of Portland; his mother Hettie of Eugene; a brother Stanley and a sister Wilda, both of Eugene.

Simon-Lounsbury Mortuary is in charge of Eugene funeral arrangements.

Battleground in Congress

Army-AF Dispute Simmers

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congress may become the decisive battleground in a dispute between the Army and the Air Force over the Army's ambitions for a much stronger air arm of its own.

The dispute so far has been waged away from public view, at high levels in the Pentagon.

The Army won the first major round, as was shown last week when President Kennedy recommended money to buy 1,600 more planes and helicopters for the Army.

But the Air Force has many friends in Congress. These friends are certain to give Air

Force spokesmen a chance to state their opposition before the Armed Services and Appropriations committees.

Congress backed the Air Force last session in voting funds to push development of the 2,000-mile-an-hour RS70 bomber on a big scale. But Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara had the last word when he refused to spend the great bulk of the additional \$191 million Congress appropriated for the project.

In the case of the airpower dispute, the situation is different. Congress could delay or

block the Army's plans by denying or cutting the money needed to carry them out.

Of course, the Army could win the battle with persuasive arguments and the indicated strong backing of McNamara, who set up the Army board which recommended far-reaching improvements in the Army's air mobility.

The Army feels it necessary to use its own planes to move its troops and gear within a combat zone, to conduct short-range reconnaissance, and to provide close fire support for its combat units.

Nurse to Discuss Service in Navy

A Navy nurse, Lt. Cmdr. Maxine Condor of Seattle, Wn., will be in Eugene Monday and Thursday to talk with student and registered professional nurses about the Navy's nurse corps.

Commander Condor, a Navy nurse since 1951, is assigned to the Navy Recruiting Station in Seattle.

She will discuss with interested persons opportunities for appointment as nurse corps officers.

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Barnett Raps Justice Suit

JACKSON, Miss. (AP) — Gov. Ross Barnett said Saturday he would cooperate to the fullest extent with Biloxi and Gulfport school officials to defeat a Justice Department suit seeking desegregation of public schools located on military bases.

Barnett said the action by the Justice Department was "additional evidence of a determination to make a 'Congo jungle' of every school and schoolroom in the nation."

The Justice Department filed suit Friday seeking desegregation in schools located near so-called federally impacted areas.

The suit seeks action in Madison and Mobile counties in Alabama, Bossier Parish (county) in Louisiana and in Harrison County in Mississippi.

The main allegations of the Justice Department suits were that the schools, now alleged to be discriminatory, were constructed, either wholly or partly, by federal funds.

"I deplore the effort in this suit to further disrupt the education of our children," Barnett said. "We will resist this happening to the schools and school children of Mississippi, both white and colored, with every resource at our command."

Beaverton Man Dies When Car Overturns

BEAVERTON (AP) — Rodney Lynn Morrison, 22, Beaverton, was killed early Saturday when his foreign sports car overturned in the Beaverton suburbs.

Police said the car apparently went into a ditch and then overturned on the road at least once. Police found Morrison pinned in the wreckage.

He was Oregon's 20th traffic fatality this year in the Associated Press tabulation.
