Purposes are: to unite all persons employed in work of a legal nature, to the end that ideas may be exchanged and, through this exchange, knowledge may be increased; to encourage the growth of legal secretaries associations and to augment the education of its members; to cooperate with the various Bar Associations, judges and attorneys in promoting a high order of professional standards and ethics in the legal profession; to study public affairs and particularly lend support to activities relating to the welfare of the community; to provide a medium through which any member or association may at any time present suggestions or inquiries in the interest of the mutual benefit of legal secretaries.

Active members shall consist of those persons licensed to practice law or engaged as secretary, stenographer, typist or clerk in any law office; any person employed by the courts; the trust department of banks or trust companies; or in any public or private institution directly engaged in work of a legal nature, including all public offices, and who shall have so been working for a period of at least six months.

Hard Sauce Tops Cake, Puddings
