

Going 16-1/2 in Boston Game

Belitza Sixth to Vault 16 Feet

BOSTON (AP)—John Belitza of the University of Maryland Saturday night became the sixth man in track history to soar over 16 feet in the pole vault.

He cleared 16 feet, 1/2 inch at the Boston A.A. Games.

The bar was raised to 16-3/4, higher than anyone has vaulted either indoors or out, but the sturdy, 21-year-old collegian failed three times.

Rolando Cruz of Villanova, who had chased Belitza all the way up, failed at 16-1/2 after clearing 15-6.

David Tork of West Virginia

who soared to 16-2 1/4 at Toronto to Friday night, dropped out at 15-6.

Others who have broken the 16 foot barrier are John Uelses of the La Salle College A.A., who also went out at 15-6 here, Don Myers, Ron Morris, and Pentti Nikula of Finland.

Hayes Jones of Detroit won his 34th consecutive indoor hurdle race, capturing the Hillman 45-yard event in 5.5 seconds and beating Aggrey Awori of Harvard by a full yard.

Less than 3 minutes after the hurdle race, Awori, a sophomore

who comes from Uganda in Africa, came back to take second in the 50-yard dash which was won by Gerald Ashworth of Dartmouth in 5.5. Awori, off to a slow start, was pressing Ashworth at the tape.

Wendell Motley of Yale took the Jack Ryder 440-yard run in 48.3, only one-tenth of a second slower than the fastest time ever made indoors on boards. This was 48.2 by Roy Cochran in 1942.

Li Jack Yerman won the Hollis 600 for the second year in a row after letting Jay Luck, for-

mer Yale star, set the pace until the final lap. Yerman won by 10 yards in 1:09.8 from Luck with Earl Young of Abilene, Tex., a distant third.

With a strong field entered now that the NCAA-AAU are under an enforced truce, the games drew 12,059, close to capacity.

The Hunter Mile went to Vic Zwolak of Villanova who burst from the pack at the three quarters mark and won by 20 yards as Hike van de Wal of Kearney, Neb., a Canadian, nosed out Rodney Soderberg of the University of Tennessee for second. The time was 4:09.8.

Brian Craig of England beat out Pete McCordie of New York at the tape in the Billings Two Mile with a brilliant last lap sprint that closed a 10-yard gap. The winning time was 8:56.0.

John Thomas of Boston, Bobby Avant of Duarte, Calif., and Gene Johnson of the University of California all cleared 6-9 in the high jump and all failed at seven feet although all have gone that high or higher in the past. Thomas was awarded first on the basis of fewer misses on the way up, Avant second and Johnson third.

Bill Crothers, the Toronto strong man, repeated as the winner the Lapham 1,000 finishing 10 yards ahead of Ernie Cunliffe of Stanford, the 1961 winner, who set the pace until the final lap when Crothers surged ahead. Richard Smith of College Park, Md., was third another 10 yards back. The winning time was 2:08.1.

Olympian Al Hall uncorked the third longest toss on record in the 35-pound weight throw—a 68 foot effort—in the afternoon opening events.

Strongman Garry Gubner of New York University bettered his own meet mark with a shot put of 60-1 1/2 on his last attempt.

Mike Herman of the Grand Streets Boys Club, New York, appeared to have the victory clinched in the broad jump at a 23-4 until Charles May of Maryland State also made a great last ditch try and won at 24-1.

Oregon Tops SOC by 24-6 In Wrestling

The University of Oregon wrestling team spotted Southern Oregon a victory in the opening match and then came back to post a 24-6 triumph at McArthur Court Saturday.

The win was Oregon's fourth in six matches. Southern Oregon's record now also stands at 4-2.

Terry O'Sullivan of Oregon pulled an upset in his heavyweight match by taking a 5-2 decision from previously undefeated Jim Grush of SOC.

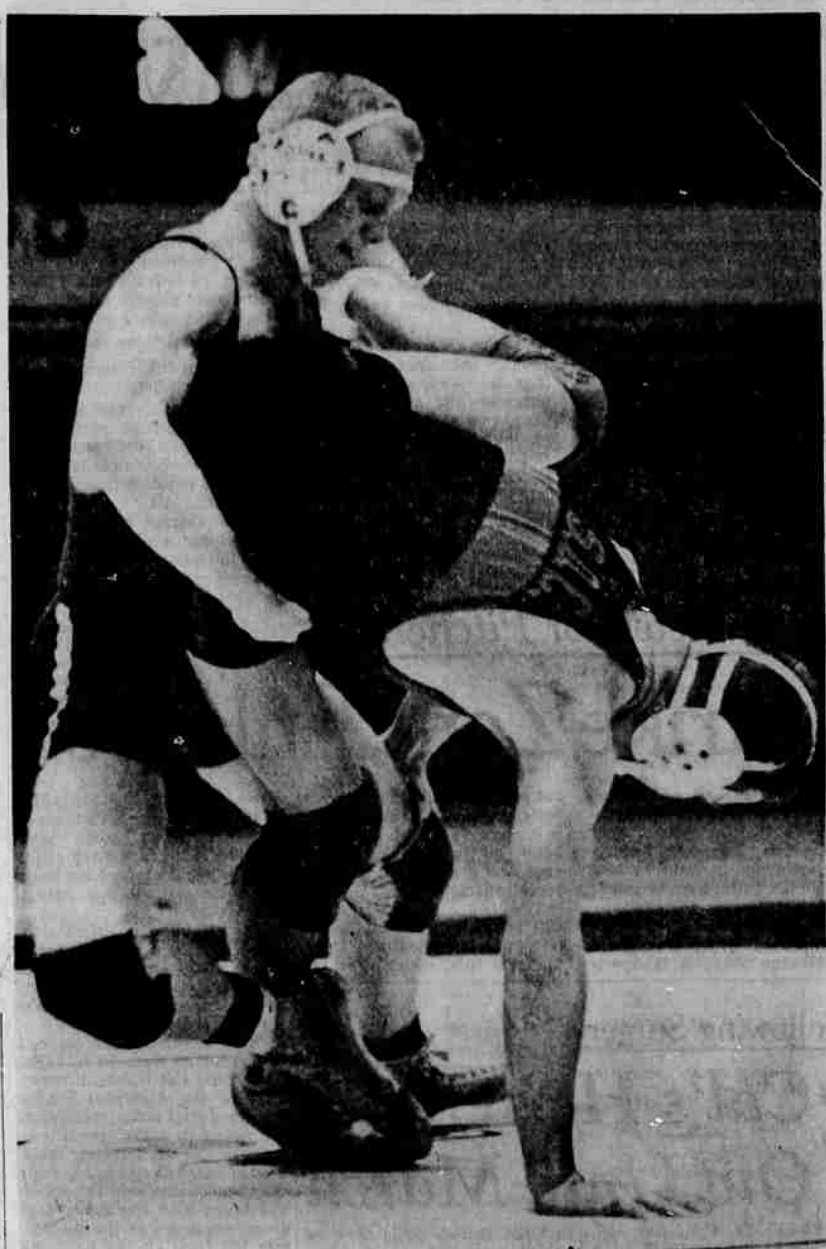
The University of Oregon freshmen wrestlers ran their perfect season record to five victories Saturday at McArthur Court by defeating Cascade College 28-10.

With Use of Stall

Southern Cal Five Stops USF, 60-51

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Southern California used a stall in the final two minutes to insure its 60-51 non-conference basketball victory over the University of San Francisco Saturday.

The Trojans led at halftime 31-24, but with less than five minutes to play the resurgent San Franciscans moved to within three points at 50-47. Then Southern Cal's stall killed the Dons' chances.

Pete Hillman and Gordon Martin each scored 16 points to lead the Trojans. High point man in the game was USF's Oliver Johnson, with 17.

The Dons outshot Southern Cal from the floor, but the Trojans held a 22-9 advantage from the free throw line.

Friday night the Trojans beat crosstown rival Loyola 62-43.

Woes Remain In Gymnastics

WASHINGTON (AP)—The government is aware that problems still exist in gymnastics and other sports despite progress made toward settling a feud between the nation's two big athletic unions, a spokesman said Saturday.

Nick Rodis, the State Department's athletics program officer, said he thinks such problems can be solved now that a model has been set up in the agreement between the Amateur Athletic Union (AAU) and the United States Track and Field Federation.

The track federation was founded by the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) whose disagreements with the AAU threatened for a time to impair certification of U. S. athletes for the 1964 Olympic Games.

Rodis made his comment when asked about a statement in Tucson, Ariz., Friday by Frank Bare, executive director of the United States Gymnastics Federation, who said his group is still at war with the AAU.

He was particularly critical of sites selected by the AAU for gymnastics tryouts, and said terms involved in the AAU and track and field settlement would be only partially acceptable to the gymnastics federation.

Rodis emphasized that Gen. Douglas MacArthur is arbitrating the AAU-NCAA differences and that the government is "not in this thing anymore."

"He's going to do the job," Rodis said.

Palmer Three Strokes Behind

January Grabs Tourney Lead

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Lanky Don January, a long hitting Texan who now calls Southern California his home, fired a three-under-par 68 Saturday to scramble out of a par-breaking traffic jam for the third-round lead in the \$50,000 San Francisco International golf tournament with a 54-hole score of 208.

The 33-year-old January didn't go over par but needed long putts on four of the final five holes to preserve a one-stroke lead going into the final round.

Pressing at 209 were Canadian George Knudson who placed

second here last year, the veteran Jack Burke Jr., and Charlie Sifford, the Negro star from Los Angeles.

All told, 19 golfers were below par for the 54 holes and all threatened the leader. Leading money winner Arnold Palmer, with a 69 Saturday, stood just three strokes off the pace at 211 going into the final 18 holes over the Harding Park Municipal Course.

With U. S. Open Champion Jack Nicklaus already eliminated from the competition when he failed to qualify for the final two rounds, Palmer was the only one of golf's "Big Three"

with a chance for the \$9,000 top money here. Gary Player of South Africa, the Masters champion, put himself out of contention with a 72 and 219 total this warm sunny day.

Second-round leader Jacky Cupit of Longview, Tex., slipped to a 74 Saturday winding up with the 211 bunch.

Phil Rodgers of San Diego, who started the third round just one stroke behind Cupit, also soared with 75 and a 213 total-even par for the 6,722-yard Harding Municipal layout.

January, a 33-year-old who gained fame in 1961 with a \$50,000 hole-in-one at the Palm Springs Classic, shot eight straight pars Saturday and then took his first birdie on the ninth hole with a 20-foot putt.

He collected another birdie with another long putt—from 12 feet—at 13 and closed out the round with a 10-foot birdie putt on the 18th.

"I really struggled on 14, 15, 16 and 17 and needed long putts for my pars," January declared.

A throng of about 10,000 watched in sunny weather but most had overlooked January, who had shot scores of 70 on his first two rounds.
