

Laws on Vote Cases Sought By Atty. Gen.

Kennedy Proposes Speedup of Trials

WASHINGTON (AP) — Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy has proposed legislation to speed up court cases involving charges of racial discrimination against prospective voters, the White House said Saturday.

The proposal was made public with the release of the attorney general's annual report to the President on the activities of the Civil Rights Division of the Justice Department.

Calling 1962 "a year of great progress in civil rights," the report said much of this was due to "the responsibility and respect for law displayed by the great majority of the citizens of the South."

The attorney general cited stepped-up efforts of his department to desegregate schools, erase alleged discrimination against Negroes seeking to register as voters and just about end segregation of interstate travel facilities.

Many of these efforts, Kennedy emphasized, have been marked by cooperation from local officials.

But much remains to be done, especially in the field of voting, where "the heavy burden of effort lies ahead," he said.

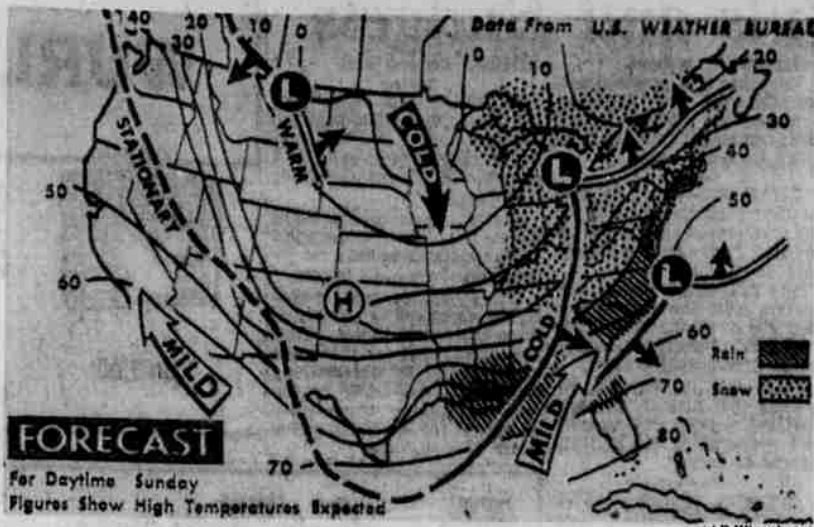
"Substantial numbers of American citizens are being deprived of their right to vote because of race and we continue to believe that additional legislation in this field is necessary," Kennedy added.

"Even where the department has gone to court to charge officials with discriminatory use of voting qualification tests, it has often run into considerable delays between the time of filing suit and the time of trial," he said. "We believe that additional legislation is necessary to insure prompt relief in such instances."

Burial Rites Pending Here For Former Dairy Partner

Funeral services for George A. Maier, 62, former partner in Echo Spring Dairy, Eugene, are pending at Simon-Lounsbury Chapel.

Maier died unexpectedly Thursday in San Diego while vacationing there with his wife, Anna. He had been in apparent good health since selling out

his interest in the dairy two years ago, according to spokesmen for Echo Spring in Eugene. Exact cause of his death was not immediately known, but believed to be of natural causes. Maier, of 2350 W. 21st Ave., Eugene, came to the Eugene Springfield area in 1948 from Butte, Mont., where he had previously been a partner in a dairy with a brother.

He became owner of the Springfield Dairy and the Echo Hollow Dairy here shortly after moving here, and in 1952 combined them to become Echo Spring Dairy.

He was a member of the Eugene Shrine Club, the Central Presbyterian Church, the American Dairy Industries Assn. and the Eugene group of the National Knife and Fork Club.

Besides his wife and brother, Maier is survived by a son, G. Robert Maier of Madison, Wis., and a daughter, Helen A. Simrin of Redwood City, Calif.

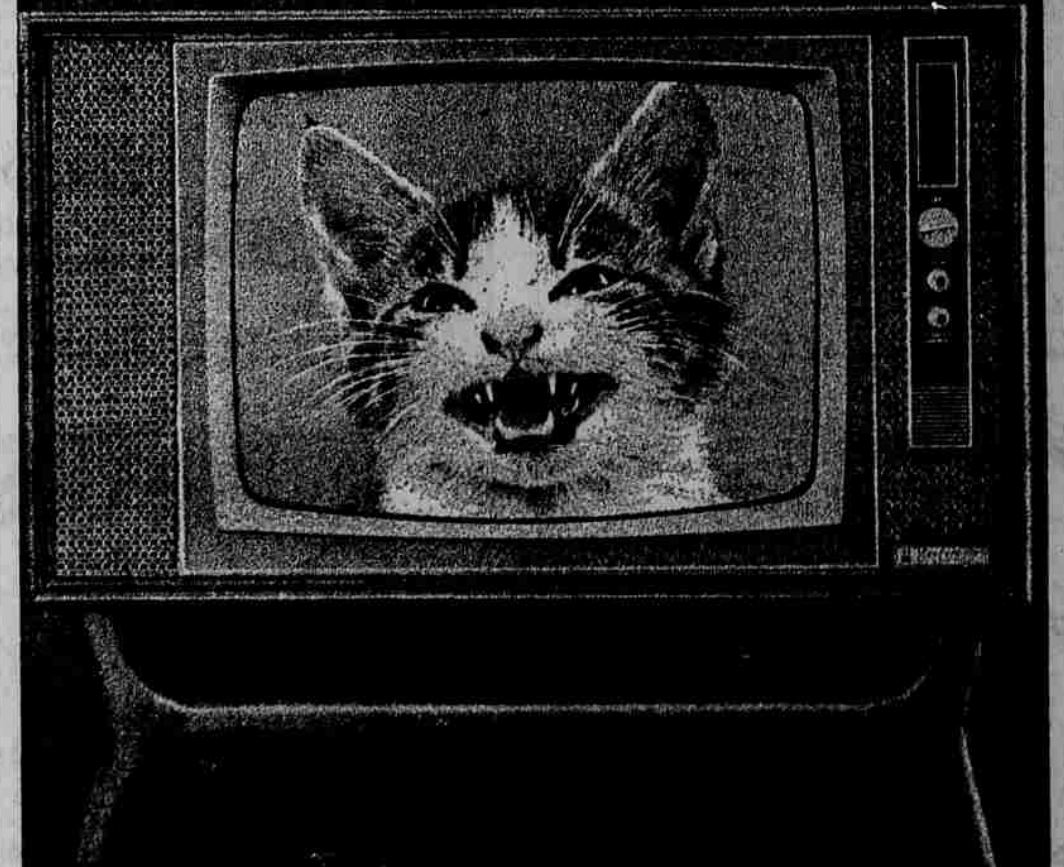
