

'Dimes' Drive By Mothers Wednesday

Women Volunteers
To Call at Homes

When men were advised not to underestimate the power of a woman, this may have brought to mind the annual Mothers' March of the March of Dimes.

Wednesday, hundreds of women volunteers — and a few men — will call at thousands of Emerald Empire homes for the annual door-to-door fund-raising campaign.

Eileen Gano, coordinator of this year's Lane County Mothers' Marches, estimated that 1,500 to 2,000 women will visit homes in Eugene and Springfield and several hundred other women will call at homes in Junction City, Creswell and Cottage Grove.

Hours for the drive Wednesday will be 6 to 8 p.m., although women in some suburban areas may call at homes during daylight hours, Mrs. Gano said.

Turn on Lights

She urged all residents of the five cities to turn on porch lights as a courtesy to aid the women to visit neighborhoods safely.

Each marcher, she said, may be identified by a blue and green "key" badge and by a green packet of marchers' information.

Persons collecting without proper identification, she said, should be reported to the police department in the city involved.

The men who may show up at a few homes in the Eugene-Springfield area are members of Theta Chi and Sigma Chi fraternities on the University of Oregon campus. The students have volunteered to act as "stand-bys" for women unable to march.

More Women Needed

More women are needed for this "stand-by" service, Mrs. Gano said, and women may volunteer by calling the March of Dimes headquarters, DI 5-2417.

As in past years, contributions made during the mothers' march will be the main source of income for the annual drive. The funds are used for research into the uses and cures of birth defects, affecting one of every 16 babies born in the United States; arthritis and rheumatic diseases, which affect nearly 11 million Americans, and polio.

'Hidden Costs' State Board Topic

School Fees to Be Studied

The question of "hidden costs" in Oregon secondary schools is expected to be taken up by the State Board of Education at its meeting in Salem Wednesday.

The board has been prompted to look into the matter by a report made in Eugene last weekend at a winter conference of the Oregon Assn. of Secondary School Principals.

On Saturday the OASSP group accepted the report of its special committee that surveyed costs paid by Oregon high school students.

The association approved a recommendation of the committee which read:

"In view of the evidence that there are in Oregon secondary schools fees charged students which are incompatible with our concept of free public education, we . . . request the State Board of Education to work toward the minimization of those fees required of all students."

State Official Gets Data

State Supt. of Public Instruction Leon Minear was furnished preliminary information about the report. He is expected to submit to the state board Wednesday a resolution requesting all local school boards to adopt a policy forbidding the imposition of student fees for any purpose until the local board has approved the fee.

It was a year ago, at the 1962 principals conference, that Minear requested the groups to make a study of costs students must bear in Oregon high schools.

The committee that conducted the OASSP study concerned itself with those fees more or less directly attributable to school or course work.

In a separate recommendation, however, it noted that the study did not go into many areas of student costs. The recommendation, approved by the general association, noted that, "There is evidence that in Oregon secondary schools the costs of social and athletic fees are increasing; therefore, we recommend that school districts work to alleviate such situations."

Junior, Senior High Schools

The committee report was broken down according to junior and senior high schools. It was broken down further according to the size of the schools.

The report lists fees according to general categories. Not all fees would be paid by any one student, since a number of the fees are charged only to

students participating in special activities or taking special courses.

An example of the material in the report is listed below. This list contains average fees for senior boys in the 155 high schools surveyed:

Textbook rental fees \$7; textbook purchase costs \$10.56; required workbooks, manuals, etc., \$2.62; hall locker rental 65 cents; gym locker rental \$1.13; towel service \$2.47; physical education clothing purchase or rental \$6.66; general accident insurance \$3.04; athletic insurance (ranges from \$2.31 for skiing to \$16 for wrestling); special

course fees including breakage fees (ranges from \$2.14 for science classes to \$7.22 for electronics shop); annual cost of paper, notebooks, supplies, etc. \$9.15; cap and gown fee \$3.72; college entrance exam costs \$10.32; studentbody card or ticket \$3.72; student annual or yearbook price \$3.72.

Textbook Items Vary

The first two items on textbooks vary depending on whether the schools rent texts to their students or require the students to purchase them outright. State law forbids schools from furnishing textbooks free

to students in ninth through 12th grades.

One part of the report records the opinions of about 50 Oregon school administrators about these hidden costs.

One question asked which of the fees should be eliminated or met from public funds.

The greatest number of administrators, 31, marked textbook rental fees. Other fees marked by a number of administrators were: general accident insurance, 15; athletic program, 13; towel fee, 12; shop and laboratory fees, 11; workbooks, 11; and athletic accident insurance, 8.

Springfield Still Seeking Sister City

The City of Springfield is beginning to feel like a municipal wallflower.

Four months ago the city made known its desire to affiliate with San Fernando, Chile, in a Sister City program. To date, the city has received no information, not even a phone call.

In an attempt to remedy the situation, Mayor B. J. Rogers Monday sent a telegram to Sen. Wayne Morse asking him to assist in arranging a Sister City affiliation with San Fernando.

"Our selection of San Fernando was referred to the U.S. Information Agency last August," the telegram said. "The lack of response is very disappointing."

San Fernando has a population of about 30,000. Springfield's population is slightly more than 20,000.

Springfield's sister city committee last August selected San Fernando as its first choice as an acceptable municipal partner. The committee's second choice was Puerto Cabello, Venezuela, a coast city with a population of about 35,000.

Man Added to Staff Of Skipworth Home

A 30-year-old specialist in group correctional work will join the staff of the Skipworth Juvenile Home in Eugene Friday.

Richard T. McLain, formerly with the Multnomah County Juvenile Department, has been hired as assistant superintendent. McLain's primary concern will be to help expand the detention home's case work and group work services for treatment. Supt. Gerald Jacobson said Monday.

Born and raised in Portland, McLain did his undergraduate work at the University of Portland and took his master's degree in sociology from the University of Notre Dame in 1961.

McLain had two years of detention experience and six months of counseling work with the Multnomah County department.

Jacobson said the addition of McLain to the staff is a step toward providing further in-detention correctional services at Skipworth.

The position of assistant superintendent was authorized last July in a reorganization of the detention home, but the job has been vacant for four months.

A Navy veteran, McLain is married and has three children. He will be paid a starting salary of \$500 per month.

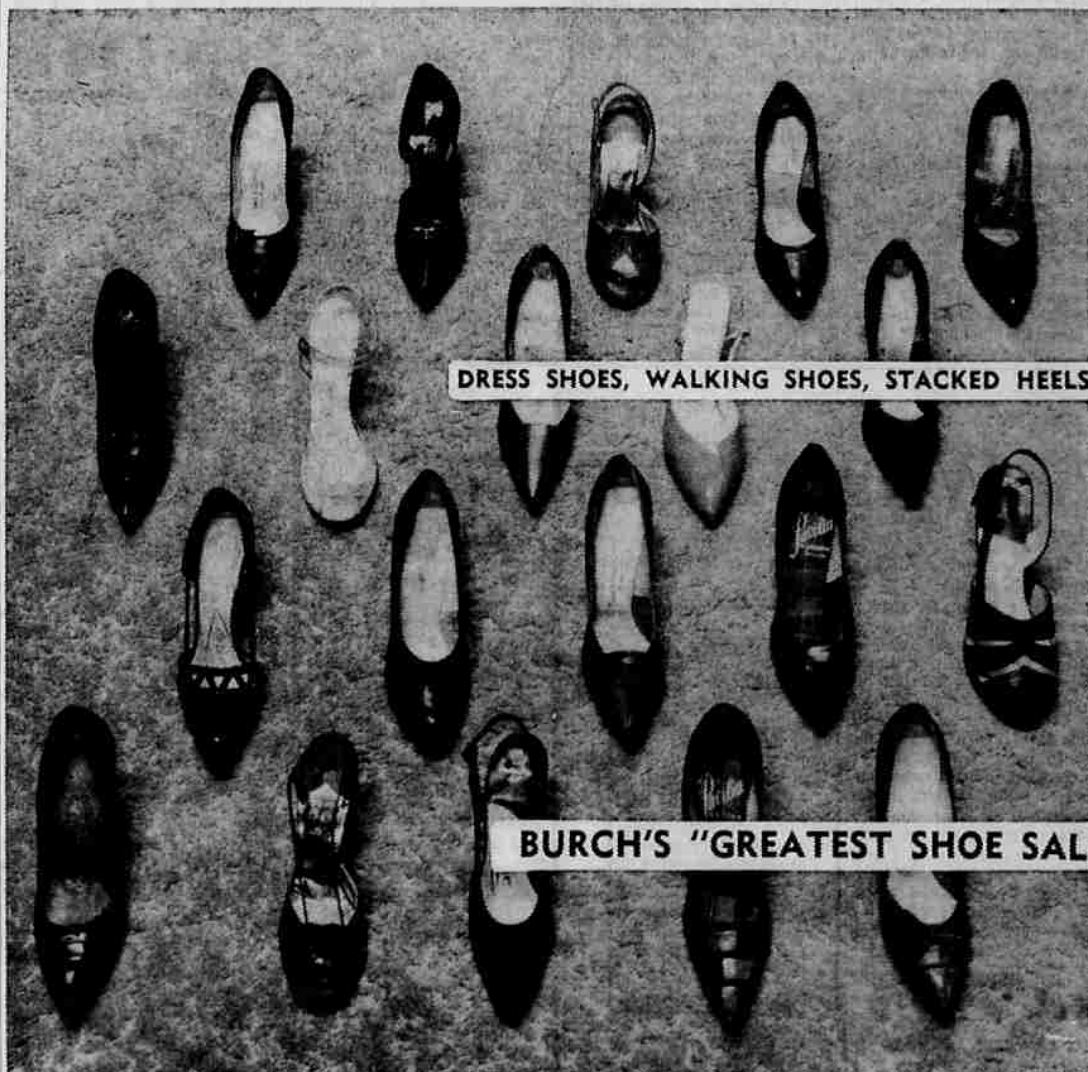
