

Six Thefts Over Weekend Net Almost \$1,200 in Loot

Six thefts in Eugene over the weekend, in which the thieves got away with almost \$1,200 in loot, are being investigated by Eugene police.

William Bodno, of the Southern Pacific Railroad, reported that four tires and wheels, valued at \$200, were stolen from a railroad flat car sometime Friday night or Saturday morning. The tires and wheels were stolen after the thieves jacked up a boat trailer on the flatcar and removed the wheels.

Clothes Stolen From Car

Three bottles of liquor and approximately \$50 in silver coins were stolen sometime Friday afternoon from the residence of Fred Arthur Techel, 2150 Elk Ave., Eugene. The burglars entered the house through an unlocked garage door.

Two Port Orford, Wash., men

reported the theft of clothes valued at \$214 from their unlocked car Saturday afternoon. The two men, Elliott Woodworth and Elton B. Miller, said they parked their vehicle in a municipal parking lot between Willamette and Olive Streets on W. Seventh Ave., at about 3 p.m. When they returned a short time later the clothes were gone.

Glenn L. Witzel, of 885 E. 37th Ave., told Eugene police that sometime Friday night or Saturday morning someone stole 22 tires of various sizes from his service station at 12 Coburg Rd.

Burglary At Market

Witzel said the tires, valued at \$428, were taken from an unlocked tire cabinet at his station.

A burglary at Hulett's Welcome Market, 2885 Hilyard, net-

ted 30 cartons of cigarettes and 10 cases of beer sometime Friday night or Saturday morning. The articles were valued at \$111.09 by the owner, Gene Hulett.

The burglars entered the building by forcing a rear door, according to police.

The theft of men's clothes and 20 photographs records was reported at an apartment at 775 E. 15th Ave. The occupants of the apartment, Leiland Hughes and Lewis Reed, told police the theft was discovered Friday. The articles were valued at \$150.

Oakridge Boosts Ambulance Rates

OAKRIDGE—An increase in ambulance rates and the addition of extra charges for certain special services, were approved by the Oakridge Community Ambulance Board Wednesday.

The new rates, effective immediately, include:

• Raising the present minimum rate of \$8 for service in the Oakridge-Westfir area, to \$10.

• An extra \$5 charge for emergency trips. Determining whether a trip is an emergency was left to the discretion of Fire Chief Bill Jessie, but would probably include trips to scenes of auto accidents and other calls not planned in advance.

• Raising the present \$3 hourly rate for stand-by time to \$3 for each 30 minutes or fraction thereof. Stand-by time is the time an ambulance is required to wait while picking up and transferring patients.

The board also voted to charge \$6 an hour after the first hour for use of the resuscitator, when its use is the sole reason for retention of the ambulance and its crew.

Also approved was a \$5 minimum charge for trips over unsurfaced or gravelled roads. The minimum charge in this case could be increased depending on the length of trip and condition of the road, directors said.

The current rate of \$1 a mile one way, will remain in effect for trips outside the Oakridge-Westfir areas.

Increasing costs of equipment and insurance were cited by directors as reasons for the rate changes. The extra charge for emergency trips was added because of the cost of laundry and also to cover the loss of blankets and other items from the ambulance.

The ambulance board, which was organized in the late 1940's, consists of representatives from various service organizations in the community. Chairman of the board is Mayor Lawrence Hills.

'Duck Preview' Brings 1,000 High Schoolers to Campus

Duck Preview, the University of Oregon's one-day program for seniors from Oregon high schools, brought almost 1,000 guests to the Eugene campus Saturday, January 26.

Pre-registration of the high school students who were interested in seeing the campus and

facilities of the University indicated that some 880 seniors and their parents and counselors would arrive for the Saturday program.

Late registrations, however, swelled this total to between 900 and 1,000.

Students and parents who arrived early during the morning registration period were taken on general tours of the campus. Those who came later started the Preview program with the luncheon held at 11 a.m. in the Erb Memorial Union. Faculty and student leaders spoke at the luncheon.

The afternoon program included meetings in schools and departments of the University. Each visitor had the opportunity of attending two departmental meetings of his choice.

Tours of special areas, including the Science Building, the School of Architecture and Allied Arts, the University Theatre, the library, and the Erb Memorial Union, were held following the departmental meetings.
