

On Test Ban

Negotiators Move Talks

NEW YORK (AP)—The nuclear test ban negotiators moved their talks into New York Tuesday.

The Americans and the British were expected to pressure the Soviets for details on what some see as the key to a possible breakthrough in the long-deadlocked talks—the Soviet offer to accept limited on-site inspections.

U.S., British and Soviet negotiators scheduled an afternoon meeting at the headquarters of the Soviet mission to the United Nations. No progress was announced following similar sessions in Washington last week.

Hoffa Unable To Obtain Union Bond

NEW YORK (AP)—Calling it "The vendetta of Bob Kennedy," James R. Hoffa has charged that the U.S. attorney general has put pressure on bonding companies to refuse to write bonds for Teamsters Union officers.

Under the Landrum-Griffin labor law, all labor leaders handling union funds must be bonded, and the bonding firms need approval by the Treasury Department.

No Comment

In Washington, spokesmen for the Justice and Labor departments declined comment on Hoffa's allegations, made Monday night in a television interview on the Walter Cronkite news show.

"We never comment on anything Mr. Hoffa says," the Labor Department spokesman said.

Hoffa said bonding companies now handling the Teamsters officials' bonds have notified him they no longer do so.

The last bond expires Feb. 8, he said, and the union has tried, without luck so far, to get other companies to write replacement bonds.

Hoffa said the situation resulted from "the pressure of the various departments of the government on the bonding companies, particularly those that have already bonded us."

Department Named

Hoffa specifically mentioned Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy when asked what government departments he referred to.

"The Justice Department," Hoffa replied. "The representatives of Bobby Kennedy particularly are the ones who are around talking to the representatives of the bonding companies."

Hoffa whose union is barred from the AFL-CIO on corruption charges—said the union had contacted every bonding company in the country which writes the type of bond needed by the union leaders and all so far have refused to write them.

Schrunk Submits Recommendations

PORTLAND (AP)—A 60-page report to the city council was submitted Monday by Mayor Terry Schrunk.

He made 34 recommendations, including suggestions for more urban renewal work, development of harbor and industrial facilities, improved off-street parking and continuance of the city's annexation program.

Western negotiators were expected to press for a detailed explanation of the Soviet offer to permit two or three on-site inspections in the Soviet Union each year. The West has regarded 8 or 10 inspections a year as necessary to insure that a test ban treaty is upheld.

Premier Khrushchev made the undetailed inspection offer in a letter to President Kennedy last month. Foy D. Kohler, U.S. ambassador to the Soviet Union, is due in Washington Wednesday with a new Kremlin message for Kennedy.

Washington authorities expressed the opinion that a test ban agreement might be possible with the Soviets in the wake of Khrushchev's acceptance of the inspection principle. Some diplomats at the United Nations were cautiously hopeful.

There was no indication that the negotiators had come to grips with what may be the final barrier to a test ban treaty—Soviet insistence that France accept any test ban.

U.S. officials hope that the new round of talks will gain impetus from a halt in U.S. underground explosions.

Kennedy made clear, however, that the United States will not join in another unpoliced test moratorium, such as the one the Soviets broke in 1961.

Science, Math Institute Set

For the third consecutive year, the University of Oregon will conduct a summer institute in science and mathematics for elementary school personnel, financed by a National Science Foundation grant of \$43,500.

Thirty-five elementary teachers and supervisors will be selected to attend the eight-week institute from June 17 to Aug. 9.

Stipends of \$75 per week travel allowance and \$15 a week for each dependent will be provided from the grant.

The institute is primarily for elementary teachers, but elementary supervisors are not excluded. Applicants must have had at least three years' experience in teaching in elementary schools and a B.S. or B.A. from an accredited college.

The summer program is designed to improve the quality of science and mathematics instruction in the lower grades.

James C. Stovall, associate professor of geology, is director. He will be assisted by Wendell C. Hall, math instructor at North Eugene High School, and Fritz L. Kramer, associate professor of geography at Colorado College.

Passenger Lands Plane After Pilot Dies at Controls

CHEYENNE, Wyo. (AP)—The pilot of a small plane died at the controls Monday but one of three passengers, none a pilot, guided the plane to a safe landing.

"All I did was steer the thing and follow instructions," said Lester Peterson, 38, assistant project manager for the American Bridge Co.

"He did a real beautiful job," said Lou Domenico, a flight instructor who directed the landing from the Cheyenne control tower. "He kept his head."

Pilot Edgar R. Van Keuren, 56, Rapid City, S.D., slumped over the wheel as the single-engine plane started to land at a missile construction site 45 miles northeast of here.

"It looked like he was falling asleep," said Peterson, who was sitting in the copilot's seat. "So I shook him and he keeled over. That's when we found out we were in trouble."

Peterson took the controls and climbed to 7,000 feet while

his companions, engineers Lester Laun and John Pawlack, experimented with the radio and throttle.

The plane touched down at 132 miles an hour, about 22 miles an hour faster than normal. It bounced hard, spreading the landing gear. A second bounce blew a tire. The propeller dug into the ground and spun the plane around but it did not overturn.

All three passengers live in Cheyenne. Peterson formerly lived in Union City, N.J. Laun is from Elkhart Lake, Wis., and Pawlack is from Fair Oaks, Pa.

Electronic 'Ear' Developed

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Last Nov. 27 an electronic "ear" was surgically implanted in the skull of a 46-year-old woman who had been deaf from birth.

Today Mrs. X can hear. She can distinguish words and is learning to associate them with speech sounds she long ago was trained to make but which she could not hear.

The success of the "ear" has encouraged the electronics specialist who made it to start planning artificial "eyes," like tiny television sets, and electronic circuitry to replace polio-damaged nerves.

The specialist is James Doyle, 35, president of General Data Corp., of suburban Orange, which supplies electronics for missile and space research.

The neurosurgeon who implanted the electronic "ear" is his brother, Dr. John B. Doyle Jr. of the University of Southern California Medical School.

Doctor Doyle gave a report on the operation at a meeting of the American Medical Assn. The device in Mrs. X's skull measures 1 1/4 x 1 1/2 inches and weighs about two ounces. James Doyle said the next model would be much thinner

and could be implanted under the skin. It would not have to be recessed into the skull.

Mrs. X's "tin ear" carries only one channel of signals from a lapel microphone to her eighth, or auditory, nerve, but this enables her to tell one word from another. The next model, Doyle said, will have at least four channels, enabling patient to hear a wider variety and volume of sounds, with less distortion. Eventually he hopes to perfect models with 20 to 30 channels and thus approximate normal sound reproduction.

The cost of the next model: about \$1,000, exclusive of medical fees.

"So far Mrs. X has had no infection, no pain and no headaches," Doyle said. "She can tell speech from music, even say whether the speaker is a man or a woman. And most important of all, she is very happy."

In many cases of deafness, Doyle said, the auditory nerve

is normal. Accident or illness has damaged the ear drum or the tiny bones that conduct its vibrations to a fluid-filled organ called the cochlea. So long as the cochlea, or semicircular canal, is undamaged and the auditory nerve is normal, he said, the electronic device will work.

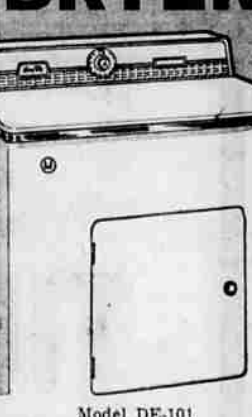
