Scholarships Viewed By UO Mothers Board

Methods of increasing the scholarship fund were explored by the Tri-State Board of University of Oregon Mothers Clubs when the group met in Eugene for business session and luncheon at the home of Mrs. Arthur S. Flemming.

"Twenty-one students, who otherwise would not have been able to attend U of O were given more than \$7,000 in aid the past year," reported Mrs. L. E. Zinkler, Creswell, scholarship chairman. "However, there are far more applicants than we can help unless we can increase the scholarship fund."

Mrs. H. C. Jochimsen of Salem, president, conducted the all-day sessions. Attending were representatives from 32 tri-state organizations including presidents of town units, district vice presidents who represent one of two counties, members-at-large from various areas of Oregon, Washington and California, U of O consultants and officers of the UO Mothers state board.

A check was presented to Golda P. Wickham (Mrs. J. Alan), UO dean of women, from board members for the Golda Wickham Angel Fund, which is used as emergency help for girls with financial problems which are temporary in nature and not covered by other loans or grants. Mrs. Wickham reported that business men as well as mothers often send in an unsolicited check for this fund.

Mrs. Jochimsen noted that more than 8,000 letters have been mailed to mothers of this year's UO students and that they have responded already with \$1,815 in membership fees and scholarship donations to be used next year.

Mrs. J. S. Kominick, Creswell, chairman of the co-op housing committee, reported on assistance and aid to the UO co-op homes, living organizations in which each girl shares in the responsibility of running the house. She said that 104 girls this year were able to keep expenses down to \$45 per month for board and room in comparison with \$86 average cost in dormitories. Profits from operating the co-op houses are turned into a building fund. It is hoped that new housing may be purchased or built to take care of the needs of students demanding co-op living at this lower cost. Oregon Mothers Clubs assist in furnishing the houses. Trading stamps are collected to buy smaller items for the houses and may be sent to Mrs. Roy Roe, president of the Eugene branch.

Spring meeting of the board will be held in Salem when final reports from the constitution committee will be heard and nominating committee will make its report.

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Val Lorwin To Address LWV Session

Eugene League of Women Voters will have a general meeting Thursday morning to hear an address by Professor Val Lorwin, economic historian at University of Oregon. Professor Lorwin's topic will be "France and European Unity."

An expert on contemporary France, Professor Lorwin will focus on problems France faces in her relationships with the various economic, military and political blocs present in the world community. His talk will bring together many of the problems the League of Women Voters is currently studying in its two national study items on the United Nations and U. S. foreign economic policy.

The League of Women Voters has supported the United Nations since the time of its inception. January units were devoted to this study item under the direction of Mrs. S. A. Pier-

son. The League's foreign economic policy item is titled: "Continued Support of U. S. Policies to Promote World Economic Development and an Evaluation of Opportunities to Expand Regional Cooperation." Most recent League action on the subject was support of the passage of the 1962 Trade Expansion Act. February units of the Eugene League will be devoted to further study of this item under the leadership of Mrs. Bayard H. McConaughy.

Thursday's general meeting will be in Wheeler Room of First Congregational Church at 9:30 a.m. The meeting is open to the public, with a special invitation extended to women interested in the League of Women Voters.
