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'Showcase' Planned

Performing Arts Committee Formed

The cultural horizon of the Emerald Empire continues to widen.

Formation of a "Committee for the Performing Arts" has just been announced. Its two-fold aim:

- To encourage, promote and act as producer of performing arts in the community through the use of local artists of a professional caliber.

- To provide an auditorium for such performances in the community.

The Committee, which has elected officers for its first season, already is at work on plans for its first presentation—"Showcase of Artists"—to be presented Saturday, April 27, at University Theatre.

The program will feature vocal and instrumental music and dancing by artists of professional stature. Time and place of tryouts for those desiring to appear will be announced in the next week.

Officers of the new Committee are: President, Mrs. Clare K. Hamlin; first vice president, Mrs. Frank E. Anderson; second vice president, Mrs. C. Max Wright; and secretary, Mrs. Carey Strome of Junction City; and treasurer, Mrs. Marvin Krenk.

Appointed by the president as reporter and historian are Mrs. Edwin E. Cone and Mrs. L. E. Fischer; and as telephone chairman, Mrs. Kester Svendsen.

"Our aim is to work together for the betterment of all the performing arts," Mrs. Hamlin said this week. "Funds from any performances sponsored by the Committee will go toward Eugene's city auditorium fund."

The Committee is the outgrowth of a tentative committee organized more than a year ago with similar aims. The group, at that time, presented "An Evening to Remember," a program of music and ballet, to an invitational audience at Very Little Theatre.

Renewed interest in the project has come with the formation in Washington, D.C., of the National Committee for the Performing Arts with Mrs. John F. Kennedy and Mrs. Dwight D. Eisenhower serving as co-sponsors. The local group is tied in with the aims of the national group which seeks a center for the performing arts in the nation's capital while encouraging the development of similar centers, on a small scale, to meet local needs.
