Henningsgaard Breaks State Record

COTTAGE GROVE — North Eugene successfully defended its Lane A-1 Relays title Friday afternoon at Currin field.

But it was the host's Mark Henningsgaard—with a record shattering leap of a measured 13-6³/₄ in the pole vault—who came up with the meet's out-

standing individual performance.

It was the highest an Oregon high school student has ever gone—topping the old mark of 13-5¹/₄ set by Oakridge's Daryl Stanley in 1958.

He almost had to stop at 13-4—the standards wouldn't go any higher. But the problem was

solved by standing them on two bales of hay.

The 17-year-old Cottage Grove junior, who had gone 13-3 earlier in the week, missed on his first two tries at 13-4 and 13-6³/₄—both times clearing the bar easily on his last attempt. He made three attempts at 13-10. Each time he came close,

brushing the bar off with his feet as he was coming down on his last two jumps.

"Originally I had set 14 feet as my target—now it's as high as I can go," said Henningsgaard who is a starting quarterback and guard on the Lion's varsity football and basketball teams.

And he made his 15 jumps starting at an opening 11 feet with an undersized—for him—14 foot fiberglass pole.

"I've ordered a 15 footer, and I hope it gets here in time for the Hayward Relays next Saturday," he said.

Five vaulters cleared 12 feet. All were using the whip-like pole.

The Highlanders, defending state A-1 track champions, captured seven of the thirteen first places, to pile up their winning total of 91¹/₂ points.

Cottage Grove, splitting the four records set with the champions, finished in the runnerup spot with 51.

Willamette followed with 41, Springfield 37, South Eugene 36 and Thurston 35.

Other outstanding individual performances were turned in by

• Cam Molter, second in the district meet last year as a South Eugene sophomore, cleared 8 feet in the high jump. "I cleared the same height once in practice last spring, but this time I went over without brushing the standard," he grinned.

• North Eugene's Ed Reed, who has the best effort in the state so far at 55-4¹/₂, pushed the shot 54-9¹/₂ to nose out defending state champion Alan Richards by two inches in their personal dual.

• Richard's took second in the discus and javelin with efforts of 183-¹/₂ and 143-6 and threw the shot 54-7¹/₂ to lead the Grovers to a shotput relay record.

• And it was Thurston's Jim Sagle who came up with the meet's most surprising performance, capturing first place in both the javelin and discus at 185-8¹/₂ and 152-9.

North Eugene's 440 relay unit turned in a 44.9 clocking to tie the old meet standard which had been set by Cottage Grove last year, and with both Gary Power and Gary Bendix jumping 5-9, upped the high jump relay mark to 17-0.

The Highlander's junior distance ace Leon Henderson was clocked in 4:33.5 for the final four laps of the distance medley as North Eugene won the event in 10:55.6.

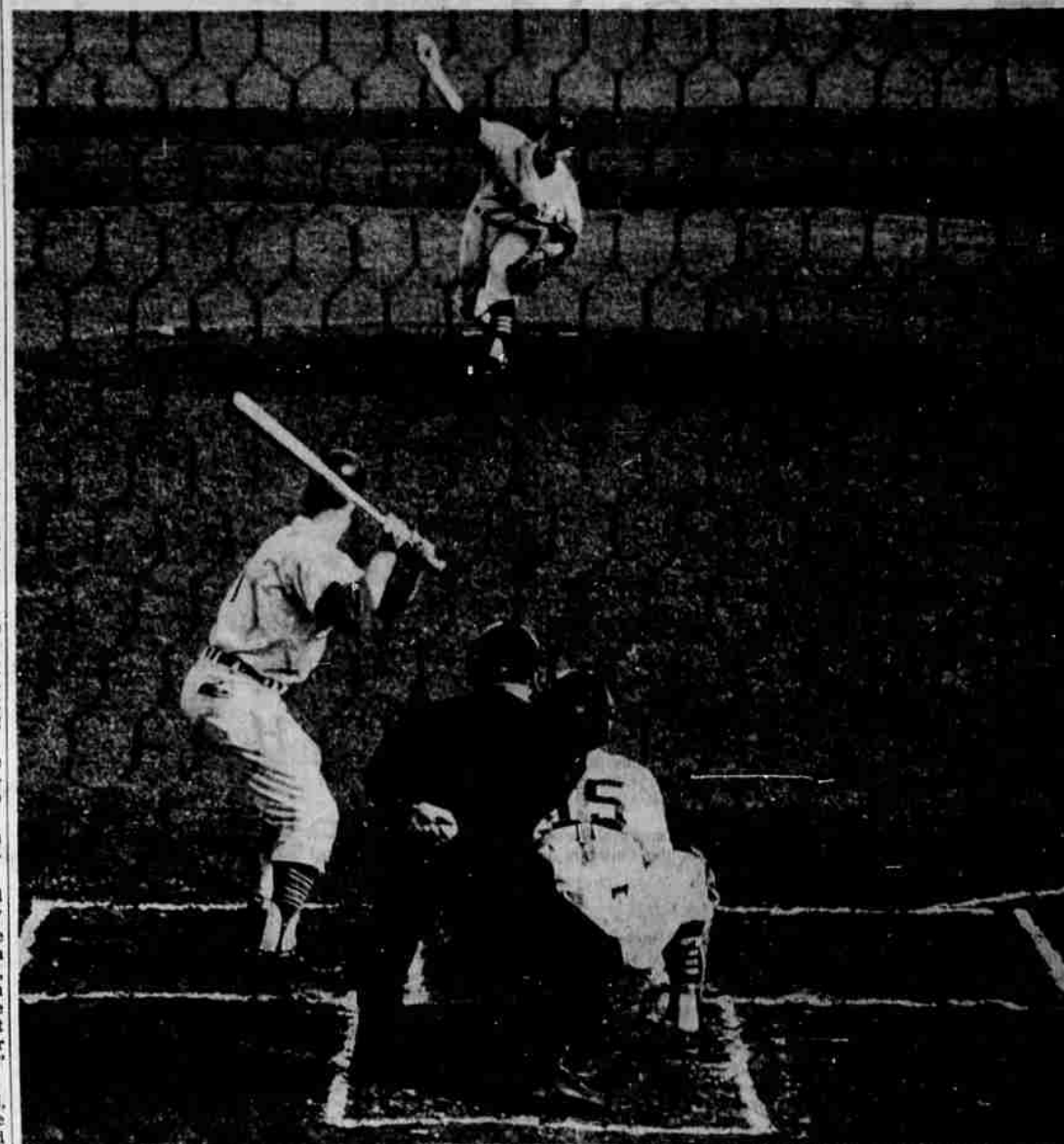
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Three Stars Lost By United States' Pan-Am Squad

NEW YORK (AP)—Three top stars of the American team have been lost for the Pan-American Games in Sao Paulo, Brazil, a U.S. Olympic official said Friday.

The three are Frank Froehling, second-ranking tennis player from Coral Gables, Fla., discus thrower Rink Babka, a silver medalist in the 1960 Olympics at Rome and freestyle swimmer Mike Austin of Yale.

Both Froehling and Austin will be unable to make the trip because of scholastic problems at college, said Arthur Lentz, assistant executive director of the U.S. Olympic Committee. Babka just took a new job and won't be able to take the necessary time off, said Lentz.

Oregon Freshman Ancer Hagerty was also eliminated in the fourth round, falling in the light heavyweight class to the Olympic Club's Pat Lovell on points.

Ex-Oregon grappler Joe McFarland withdrew from his fourth-round match and former South Eugene wrestler Bruce Glenn was eliminated from the 171 pound division by the New York Athletic Club's Ed Dewitt in the third go-round.

Ron Finley of Oregon State, the outstanding wrestler in Wednesday's Greco-Roman competition was eliminated in the fourth round of 138¹/₂-pound freestyle competition by Kono Haruo of Japan.

Ducks Still Undefeated

Snow Hurls 5-0 Win

Righthander Robbie Snow is showing late-season form with the college baseball season still young.

Eighteen consecutive scoreless innings, 25 strikeouts and not a single walk in two straight victories for the 63 junior from Junction City.

He hurled Oregon to a 5-0 non-league win over visiting Pacific Friday—with a three-hit performance in which he struck out 15 and retired the last 19 batters in a row.

His other win was a five-hit, 2-0 triumph over California in the season opener.

Two balls were hit out of the infield Friday, one a fly ball

and the other a clean single. A bunt and infield single were the other Pacific hits. He threw only 23 balls all day.

Oregon, which ran its unbeaten string to eight with the triumph, was to tackle Willamette Saturday in a doubleheader at Howe Field, weather permitting.

Not only did Snow retire the last 19 batters he faced, but he personally accounted for the final 14 himself—10 strikeouts and four grounders to the mound.

While Snow was halting the visiting Badgers, the Ducks were getting a pair of doubles and a single in five trips from 5-8 Don Banderas.

A double by Banderas and another by Cal Dean, a walk and two errors provided the Ducks with three runs in the first inning.

Banderas, a sophomore from Auburn, Calif., doubled and scored on Fred Pettengill's single in the fourth. Sandy Nosler singled and scored on Ken Jensen's single in the fifth.

Snow faced only 29 batters, one of the three batters who singled being erased by a double play.

It was the seventh time this season the starting Duck pitcher has gone the route. Only in a win over Willamette were the pitching chores divided—as planned.

With 48.2 Quarter, 9:15.2 Two Mile

Payne, Moore Set Freshman Records

CORVALLIS (Special)—Two Eugene freshmen set University of Oregon yearling track records Friday despite cold, windy weather and a soggy track in an all-comers meet at Bell Field.

Gordy Payne, last year's state A-1 440 champ from South Eugene, ran the quarter in 48.2 and unheralded Ken Moore of North Eugene led all the way in running a 9:15.2 two mile.

Payne, a soft-spoken lad with the chest of a horse, turned in an incredible performance for a freshman making his first competitive effort of the spring.

First he ran a leg of a 440 relay. Then Payne simply overpowered 1960 Canadian Olympic team member Sig Ohlemann to beat him by 12 yards in his

48.2 quarter. After a brief rest, Payne won the 220 in 22.2. He finished up the day by overcoming a 10-yard deficit on the final leg of the mile relay with a 48.1 440.

Moore, not even the best middle distance runner at North Eugene last year, showed excellent pace judgment as he ran each of his first six quarters in 69 or 70 seconds, just as he had said before the race he hoped to do.

The slender Moore, who took the lead during the first lap and never was behind, might have gone faster but was more than 100 yards ahead at the finish.

Ohlemann, training for the Pan American Games later this

month, was second to Payne in the 440 in 49.5 and won his heat of the 330-yard intermediate hurdles in 40.3.

The all-comers meet attracted most of the freshmen from both Oregon and Oregon State as well as a few former collegians and some high school runners.

The Oregon freshmen mile relay team of Ken Bauman, Jim Soland, Scott Knox and Payne was timed in 3:20.8, also believed to be a fresh record.
