

'Y' Speaker Hails Philippine Development

E. Stanton Turner is a man who speaks of the Far East in general and the Philippines in particular with the easy familiarity most of us can show only when discussing our home town.

This is not a bit surprising, in view of the fact that Turner, now 77, has spent most of his adult life living and working with the people of the Philippines.

Physically a big man, Turner has retained the erect posture, penetrating gaze and firm speaking voice of the natural leader. He speaks slowly and carefully, weighing each sentence and polishing every phrase before it is uttered. His thinning hair is sandy rather than gray, with touches of its original black coloring.

During his 37 years in the Philippines, first as director of the YMCA movement there and later as chief fund-raiser for money to rebuild Y structures after the war, Turner developed a genuine admiration for the people of the island nation.

"They were the first people to carry out a revolution against a colonial power," Turner said during an interview Monday. "Their urge for freedom goes back hundreds of years."

And today, Turner declared,

the Republic of the Philippines is the "advance guard of the frontiers of freedom and democracy in Asia."

Turner is in Eugene to speak at a Central Lane YM-YWCA banquet Tuesday night in behalf of a world-wide "Buildings for Brotherhood" program of Y expansion. He does not hesitate to give the Y credit for at least part of the strength of democracy in the Philippines.

"At one time," he said, "some

60 per cent of the commonwealth legislature of the islands had either lived in a YMCA or had been Y members. And the president of the Philippines in 1952 attributed much of the strength of his cabinet to the fact that many had been in the Y program."

After his "retirement" in 1952, Turner returned to the Far East on a survey mission for the Ford Foundation, and has been back eight times since then.

He was impressed with the industrial growth of Japan, but he expressed a measure of disappointment in the disparity of U.S. aid to that country and to the Philippines.

"Japan gets more U.S. assistance every year," he said, "than has been given in total to the Philippines. And the Philippines were our strongest ally in the Pacific when we were fighting the Japanese."

This country provided only one-eighth of 1 per cent of the cost of rebuilding the Philippines after the Japanese occupation, Turner said, but the nation nevertheless made "marked progress" in the process of industrialization.

"Over 700 new factories have been built in Manila alone since the war," Turner said. "And the future is promising."

The Tuesday night banquet is scheduled for 6:30 p.m. and is priced at \$2 per plate.

UO Enrollment Up 7 Per Cent

University of Oregon enrollment this spring is about 7 per cent above spring term a year ago.

At the close of the regular registration period Saturday the number registered was 8,367. This compares with 7,848 in spring term 1962.
