

Laotian Danger Cited by Rusk

PARIS (AP) — U.S. Secretary of State Dean Rusk accused pro-Communist forces in Laos Monday of obstructive tactics and warned that tension is rising in the Asian kingdom.

As fighting erupted between neutralist and pro-Communist Pathet Lao troops, Rusk called on the Southeast Asia Treaty Organization to be vigilant.

Rusk told a meeting of SEATO ministers that "a tragic and deplorable series of developments has increased tensions in the Plain des Jarres" of east-central Laos. It is there that the Pathet Lao has forced a withdrawal of neutralist forces under Gen. Kong Le.

Two Jailed; Pleas Entered By 2 Others

Two men entered guilty pleas and two others were given penitentiary sentences in Lane County Circuit Court Monday.

One of the guilty pleas came on a change of plea by Dwain Knight Coffey, 49, of Veneta, who was charged in February with perjury himself in testimony before the grand jury.

Coffey had been called to testify on Jan. 15 while the grand jury was investigating the disappearance of two horses owned by his wife. He pleaded guilty Monday to a charge that he testified falsely he was not involved in the disappearance of the horses.

A pre-sentence investigation was ordered.

The other guilty plea was entered by Donald Harold Davis, 19, of 1476 Brooklyn St., Eugene, who was accused of contributing to the delinquency of a minor. Davis admitted having intercourse with a 15-year-old girl, and a pre-sentence investigation was ordered.

Both penitentiary sentences were meted to men who had admitted violating the terms of their probation. Robert James Moore, 49, of Oakland, Calif., admitted absconding from supervision soon after he was placed on probation in March, 1960. He was given a two-year prison sentence by Judge William Fort.

And Jerry Dennis Strickland, 21, formerly of Cottage Grove, was sentenced to five years in the penitentiary, to run concurrently with a term he is now serving for a Reedsport burglary. Strickland was on probation at the time of the Reedsport incident.

Work on School Halted by Pickets

COTTAGE GROVE — Pickets halted work briefly on the \$1,250,000 Cottage Grove Junior High School project early Monday morning. Workmen were back on the job by mid-morning when pickets were removed.

A spokesman for the Todd Building Co., Roseburg, general contractor, said the pickets were put up by the Eugene Building Trades Council because one of the sub-contractors was non-union.

Gordon Todd, general superintendent of the firm, said that the sub-contractor, Ramsey-Waite Co., Eugene, had been asked not to begin work until an agreement was reached with the Building Trades Council.

"We want to get the parties to settle this matter off the job, so we don't have to stop work," Todd said.

The Ramsey-Waite firm is to install the sprinkling and irrigation system.

Negro Tries To Slash Police Dog

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP) — Negro leaders have urged renewed desegregation efforts in this Deep South city where police dogs crushed violence during demonstrations Sunday.

At least 29 Negroes were arrested as police halted a prayer march led by the Rev. A. D. King, brother of integration leader Martin Luther King Jr.

Violence broke out when a knife-wielding Negro tried to slash a police dog.

The dog downed the man and a surging crowd of more than 200 Negroes moved to the man's rescue.

About 50 policemen and at least six other dogs jumped into the fray. The crowd broke and ran, with the dogs and patrolmen at its heels.

Police Commissioner Eugene "Bull" Connor shouted to newsmen: "Look at that dog go! That's what we train them for—to enforce the law."

The fracas was over within seconds. Six policemen held down the Negro who attacked the dog. He was among those arrested.

Twenty-three marchers led by King were arrested on charges of violating a city code which prohibits parading without a permit.

At least four others were arrested during the riot, mostly on charges of failure to move on the orders of a police officer.

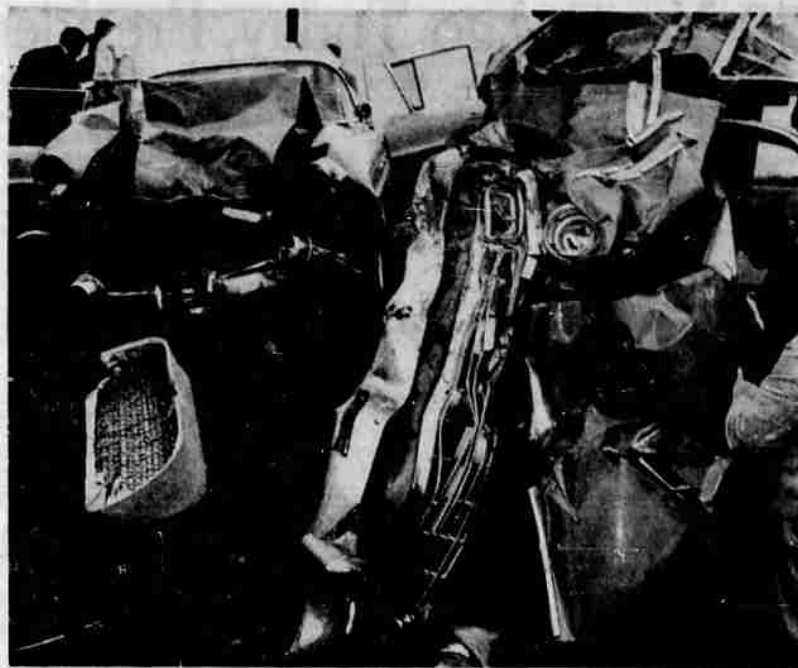
Negroes were called for a mass meeting at a nearby church less than 30 minutes after the incident.

"It may be you they put the dogs on next time," a minister shouted over a loudspeaker.

Ninety-six Negroes have been arrested since the demonstrations began last Wednesday—the day after Birmingham elected former Lt. Gov. Albert Boutwell as mayor to end the political regime of Connor, a nationally known segregationist.

Thirty-two were arrested Saturday during a similar march. The Sunday marchers were halted within three blocks of their destination Police Capt. George Wall gave them one minute to disperse.

The Negroes knelt to pray. Wall waited for more than three minutes until the prayer was finished, then ordered them to the paddy wagons.



12 Hurt

There were a total of 14 persons—from Elmira and Brownsville—in these two cars when they collided on W. 11th Avenue near Greenhill Drive Sunday. The 1:13 p.m. accident injured 12 of the 14 with 9 of them hospitalized. None is in serious condition. The accident happened, state police said, when one car apparently turned in front of the other.

Nine Hospitalized Two-Car Collision Injures 12 Persons

A two-car collision west of Eugene Sunday injured 12 of the 14 occupants—with 9 of them hospitalized.

All the injured were either admitted or treated and released at Sacred Heart Hospital in Eugene.

From Elmira, the injured are: Mrs. Elmore (Pauline) Adams, 26, of Rt. 2 Box 719, treated and released; Jeffrey B. Adams, 7, in fair condition with a head injury; Sheila Adams, 5, in fair condition with lacerations; Clayton Heisler, 3, general delivery, in fair condition with head injury; Dana Heisler, 9, in fair condition with a head injury; Debra Heisler, 6, in fair condition with a head injury; and Joanne Violet Heisler, 29, in fairly good condition with lacerations and bruises.

Occupants of the second car, all from Brownsville, and injured, are: James Vernon Shepherd, 57, in fairly good condition with a broken right leg; Ray Shepherd, 18, in good condition with lacerations and a possible hip fracture; Gary Shepherd, 11, in fair condition with a head injury; and James William Shepherd, 16, and Marie Shepherd, 8, both treated and released.

Camella Dawn Adams, three months, and Robert Shepherd, 14, were not injured.

State police said a car driven by Mrs. Adams, with the Adamses and the Heislars as occupants, was traveling east on W. 11th Avenue.

The second car, operated by James Vernon Shepherd, was west bound on W. 11th and was turning left onto Greenhill Dr. at about 1:13 p.m. Sunday.

The Shepherd vehicle apparently pulled into the path of the Adams car, according to police, and Mrs. Adams could not stop in time.

Jeanace M. Nielsen, 51, of 118 Thomason St., Eugene, was reported in good condition in Eugene Hospital and Clinic with bruises Monday.

She was injured at about 5:20 p.m. Sunday when the car she was driving collided at Rustic Place and Sorrel Way with a car driven by Gary B. Bartel, 20, of 2832 Tomahawk Lane. Bartel was not injured.

Two persons were injured Monday morning when a tractor and full-trailer rig and a car

collided on Highway 58 about a mile east of the Pacific Freeway junction.

Being treated at McKenzie-Willamette Hospital in Springfield was Helen Stovall, 41, of 1834 Fifth St., Springfield, driver of the car. Being treated at Sacred Heart Hospital was Charles E. Ranvier, 40, Fremont, Calif., a passenger in the truck.

Neither was believed seriously injured, but extent of their injuries was unknown at press time. The truck driver, William Daniel, 41, Hayward, Calif., was not injured.

ADDIS ABABA, Ethiopia (AP) — The government will propose establishment of an African university to be administered jointly by all African states, officials sources said. The plans are to be submitted to a meeting of African nations here next month.

Solon Raps State Board For 'Preference Treatment'

ASHLAND (AP) — Some legislators said Saturday they are getting tired of the way Oregon State University and the University of Oregon get better treatment than the smaller state colleges.

"Can we afford more buildings at the University of Oregon for out-of-state students?" asked Sen. Ward Cook, D-Portland, who was one of eight members of the Joint Ways and Means subcommittee on higher education on a tour of Southern Oregon College.

Southern Oregon College officials said only 6.4 per cent of the students at Southern Oregon are from out of state, compared to 25 per cent at the University of Oregon.

The committee members said the State Board of Higher Education is to blame for the preferential treatment given the universities.

The committee went on to tour Oregon Technical Institute at Klamath Falls and Central Oregon College at Bend before going back to Salem.

Trade Treaty
JAKARTA, Indonesia (AP) — Indonesia and Mexico have signed a trade treaty under which Indonesia will ship rubber, tapioca, tea and spices in exchange for Mexican textiles and yarn.

Trainer Mauled
BUDAPEST, Hungary (AP) — A circus panther attacked its girl trainer during a performance here and mauled her arm, the newspaper Esti Hirlap reported. It said other attendants subdued the animal with sprays of water and the trainer, Eva Szoke, completed her performance with a bandage on her arm and the panther in the act.

Rites Conducted For Donald Neal

Funeral services were held Friday in Eugene for Donald Beecher Neal, 39, who died of a heart attack April 2. Neal, who resided at 1040 Ferry St., was a graduate of the University of Oregon.

After completing his work for a masters degree at the University of Nevada, he taught junior high school in Bellingham, Wash.; Reno, Nev., and Florence, Ore., until about a year before his death.

He was a member of the Elks Lodge in Florence, and the Moose Lodge in Springfield. He was born June 9, 1923 in Bellingham and graduated from high school there in 1940.
