

Snow Hurls 3-2 Triumph

Pettengill's Home Runs Get Oregon Past Idaho

Fred Pettengill doesn't believe in doing things half way and that includes breaking out of batting slumps.

Held to one hit in his last 13 at-bats prior to Monday, the Oregon third baseman slammed out two home runs and a single in four trips to the plate, drove in three runs and scored two as the Webfoots edged Idaho 3-2 at Howe Field.

His one-man offensive show was all the backing righthander Robbie Snow needed to put the Webfoots back in undisputed possession of first place in the Northern Division. One-half game up on Oregon State, Snow gave up seven of nine hits in the middle three innings, was superb at the start and finish.

Pettengill, the chatter guy in Oregon's infield, was the hero, though.

His two-run, 380-foot homer over the right-center field fence on the second inning jumped Oregon off to a 2-0 lead. Then, after Idaho's Chuck White had tied it in the top of the sixth with a two-run shot over the left-field fence, Pettengill slashed one of southpaw Ron Bogue's offerings 380 feet to the parking lot beyond left field to make it 3-2.

The bespectacled Pettengill was also the middle man in a fourth-inning relay from Webfoot leftfielder Don Banderas to catcher Ken Jensen which cut down Idaho's Jeff McQueeney trying to score from second base.

Snow had breezed along, pitching no-hit ball through three innings, until White led off the fourth with a grounder deep in the hole which Webfoot shortstop Bob Porter couldn't handle. White was quickly wiped out when Mike Stowe grounded into

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HIGHCLIMBER Points for Winner In NCAA May Be Smallest Since '55

★ When the National Collegiate Athletic Assn. (NCAA) track championships are staged at the University of New Mexico, Albuquerque, N.M., June 13-15 the winning total may be the smallest and the double-figure point production the greatest since USC won in 1955 with 42 points. . . . UCLA was a second with 34, followed by Kansas 30, Oregon 29, Northwestern 20, Manhattan and Villanova 18 each. . . .

One reason for this possibility is that four top-heavy favorites are from different schools—Adolph Plummer of New Mexico in the 440, Brian Sternberg of Washington in the pole vault, Al Weill of Stanford in the discus and Henry Carr of Arizona State in the 220. . . . Even in the unpredictable javelin the top five who are within less than 17 feet of each other from different schools—Larry Stuart of USC, Ed Red of Rice, Frank Covelli of Arizona State, Garry Stenlund of OSU and John Burns of Oregon. . . .

Four NCAA defending champions who normally would be eligible will not return—Oregon's Harry Jerome in the 220, because of an injury; Jim Dupree of Southern Illinois in the 880, Jan Sikorsky of USC in the javelin, and Anthony Watson of Oklahoma in the broad jump, the latter three scholastically ineligible. . . .

In addition, Robert Hayes of Florida A & M, who would have been a strong contender in the 100-yard dash, is running unattached, and Billy Joe, third-place shot-putter from Villanova, is ineligible. . . . Paul Warfield of Ohio State, who beat Mel Renfro for second place in the broad jump last season, was reported to have been ineligible. But Warfield is presently listed in the NCAA statistics with a 24-10 3/4 jump for the Buckeyes this season. . . .

Another school not figured to challenge Oregon for the NCAA title is Occidental, where John McGrath rates a close second to Oregon's Dave Steen in the shot and to Weill in the discus.

★ Last season Oregon's Bill Bowerman was handed a left-handed slap by the Seattle press when Harry Jerome and Jerry Tarr competed in the 100 and high hurdles, respectively, and Oregon's four-mile relay team of Dyrrol Burleson, Keith Forman, Archie San Romani and Vic Reeve set a world's record in the Far West Relays at Fresno, Calif., May 12, while the Webfoots were whipping Washington 98-46 in Seattle in a dual meet. . . .

Bowerman had written to Washington coach Stan Hiserman for permission to spread his talent and when he received no word from the Husky coach Bill decided to enter six of his Webfoots in the Fresno meet. . . .

Saturday in Pullman Bowerman decided to send Ray Van Asten, half-mile ace, and Paul Struber, one of two good high jumpers, to the Mt. San Antonio College Relays. . . . Again Bowerman asked for permission to do that and WSU coach Jack Mooberry consented. . . . Jerry Uhrhammer, our sports news editor who covered the Oregon-WSU meet in Pullman Saturday, said there was some "grousing" by at least one fan because Forman competed only in the mile relay. . . . Forman is top-ranked miler and third-ranked two-miler in the nation. . . .

Dyrrol Burleson, who won the invitational mile at the Drake Relays Saturday, was surprised to see Van Asten running in the Mt. SAC Relays while Burly was in Des Moines. . . . I, too, was surprised that the "Wide World of Sports" carried the relays from Philadelphia, De Moines and Walnut, Calif., Saturday. . . . Just lucky to have turned on the right station. . . .

And Stuber, when he talked to our sports department Saturday, was more excited about Terry Lewellyn's 6-10 3/4 high jump at Pullman than he was making alibis for his sub-par performance at Walnut.

★ The Oregon Indoor Invitational track meet at Portland's Memorial Coliseum in January, sponsored by the Portland Oregon Alumni Assn., donated to the University of Oregon development fund something over \$2,600 as profits from the meet. . . . The Portlanders kept about \$1,000 in the coffers for a "rainy day." . . .

Oregon's only heavy entries in a relay meet this spring will be the annual California Relays at Modesto May 25, the same day the Big Six Conference championships are staged at the University of California in Berkeley.

Is C. K. Yang's new world's record in the decathlon "asterisked," like Roger Maris' home-run record?

Yang's use of a glass pole brings up a point. When the decathlon standards were established, 1,000 points was supposed to have been "perfection" for each of the ten events. Many decathlon men thought the pole-vault standards before the glass pole were too difficult, requiring a vault of 14 feet, 6 1/4 inches to score 1,000 points. . . . In the national championships here in 1960 Yang vaulted 13 feet, 10 1/2 inches and gained 873 points as compared to the 1,515 points scored with a 15-10 1/2 mark at Walnut, Calif. Sunday. . . . There is no doubt that Yang, nearly three years later, has improved, but, by comparison, the point differential is 442 points and, by substituting Yang's 1960 decathlon performance in the pole vault, his total last weekend would have been 8,679 points or three shy of Rafer Johnson's record established here on Hayward Field. . . .

Food for thought?

★ Fans of Oregon's national collegiate championship track team may be able to follow the Webfoots to Albuquerque by air charter if Norv Ritchey of the University of Oregon can interest some 30 fans and the air lines can provide the equipment. . . .

The squad is scheduled to leave Tuesday, June 11, for the three-day title meet, returning Sunday. . . . The six-day trip would cost each fan \$140 for flight to and from New Mexico, including ground transportation and hotel accommodations. . . . Meals would be extra.

a double play, but McQueeney socked a double to the left-center field fence.

Mike Mayne then poked a single into short left field but Banderas charged the ball, fired to Pettengill and he nabbed the lead-footed McQueeney at the plate.

The Vandals never got another man to third base except when, White followed Herb Denning's lead off single in the sixth with his four-bagger. Snow getting the side out in the ninth on three pitches.

Oregon had men on base against Bogue and reliever John Dreps in every inning except the third but only in the second could put hits together back-to-back.

Banderas got all the way around to third in the first inning on a walk, stolen base and an error, but was thrown out trying to steal home.

The win left Oregon unbeaten after three N.D. games and improved the Webfoots' season record to 17-2. Snow's win was his fourth without a loss. The two teams were to play again today.

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Smith Wins Golf Playoff

AUGUSTA, Ga. (AP) — After winning her first major golf tournament in 14 years as a professional, blue-eyed Marilyn Smith says she is ready to get down to business and make the game pay off.

"This is the fastest start I've ever had," she said after winning the Women's Titleholders Championship in a playoff Monday. "I feel that this year I'm going to see if I can make it pay off."

Trailing by three strokes after 13 holes, the Tequesta, Fla., pro made a remarkable comeback on the difficult back side of the Augusta Country Club course. She sank an 8-foot putt on the 18th green to defeat a defending champion Mickey Wright by one stroke.

They were tied with 292 total after 72 holes of regulation play.

Miss Smith won \$1,300 for her first place and Miss Wright, of Dallas, received \$1,000.

"I hit the ball better than I ever did in my life," said the attractive Floridian. "Concentration has been my biggest battle. . . . I've never been able to concentrate before, but now I think I can."

Miss Wright, gracious in defeat, lost a bid for her third consecutive titleholders crown. Patty Berg remains the only winner to put together three consecutive victories—in 1937, 1938-39.

In the final hole, the second shot was the deciding factor. Miss Smith hit a 4 wood to the left side of the green while Miss Wright's iron shot hooked off the green to left.

Miss Smith two-putted for her par while Miss Wright chipped and two-putted for a bogey 5. Her first putt rolled off the lip of the cup.
