

Red Leaders Visit Dacha

MOSCOW (AP) — Cuban premier Fidel Castro and Premier Nikita Khrushchev took a break in their private talks in the Kremlin Tuesday and joined the Soviet leader's family for a day in the country.

With them were President Leonid Brezhnev and Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko and their wives, the news agency Tass said. The agency gave no details of what appeared to be chiefly a social event, and said "Khrushchev and Castro struck up a lively conversation."

Other Cuban and Soviet officials joined the party at the country house, Tass said, following the two leaders' apparently satisfying private talks Monday on military and economic aid for the Caribbean Communist state.

Castro was reported highly satisfied with his talks with Khrushchev so far on Russian military and economic assistance. Tass reported only the visit to the Dacha in the Moscow woods 30 miles from the city lasted "several hours."

Other than the brief official report, the Russians clamped a tight curtain of secrecy around Castro's movements on security grounds as is the custom with ranking Communist visitors.

Cuban sources in Moscow reported their delegation "very satisfied" by their initial official contact with Soviet leaders. It was understood the first meeting Monday included a general survey of relations between Cuba and Russia, with the focus on military and financial assistance for the Caribbean island.

It was believed ideological questions also were covered. Reports said Castro still was considering details of his trip. It was believed likely the bearded revolutionary would stay in Moscow for a week, but no definite program was announced. Castro was understood to have two projects in mind. One was a 10-day trip to Volgograd, Kiev and Leningrad, and the other was a 15-day tour which could include Siberia.

Cuban sources said that in any case, Castro probably will return home directly to Havana, bypassing Algeria. Castro had been expected to visit Algeria about the middle of May. But it was understood he is anxious to avoid offending Mao Tse-tung, Chinese Communist party leader, by visiting another foreign country but not going directly to Peking.

The consensus among diplomats here is that Castro personally is inclined toward Red China's "hard" ideological line as opposed to Russia's proclaimed policy of peaceful coexistence with the West.

Trust Territory officials were still awaiting word from Tinian and Rota Islands, also to the north.

French Plan Nuclear Subs

PARIS (AP) — Defense Minister Pierre Messmer reported Monday that France expects to have its own hydrogen bombs, atomic-powered submarines and Polaris-type missiles by 1970.

Writing in the National Defense Review, Messmer outlined the French defense policy for the coming years.

He said that French missiles with a range of 1,875 miles will start coming off production lines in the 1968-70 period and that the hydrogen bomb would be ready about the same time.

He noted that the Pierrelatte complex in southern France would start producing high grade enriched uranium early in 1967.

Messmer wrote that the nuclear submarine had been picked as the launching platform for these missiles. The first atomic submarine is expected to become operational in 1969, and three others will follow. Each will be equipped to carry 16 missiles.

Until the missile-carrying submarines are ready, France will depend on Mystere IV jet aircraft as the delivery system for its atomic weapons.

Messmer said the French bombs available now have three times the power of the device dropped by the United States on Hiroshima.

Eugene Men Attend Confab

A regional conference on street and highway planning, held at Spokane, Wash., was attended Monday by two Eugene representatives.

They are Don Allen, director of public works for the city, and D. N. Johnson, of the Bureau of Municipal Research and Service at the University of Oregon. Johnson was project director for a comprehensive traffic study for the Eugene-Springfield metropolitan area.

City Manager Hugh McKinley of Eugene said the conference was called by state and federal highway agencies. Cities with populations of 50,000 and more were also invited to send representatives.

The purpose of the one-day meeting, McKinley said, was to discuss new federal Bureau of Public Roads policies regarding long-range planning of traffic projects.

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Non-Red Aggression Fear Expressed by Pakistan, Iran

KARACHI, Pakistan (AP) — Pakistan and Iran called on the Central Treaty Organization — CENTO — Tuesday to face up to possible non-Communist aggression as well as threats from Communist countries.

Sources at a closed-door session of the annual meeting of CENTO foreign ministers said Pakistan Foreign Minister Zulfikar Ali Bhutto had India's military buildup in mind. He spoke after U.S. Secretary of State Dean Rusk defended Western arms aid to India at the public opening session.

Rusk was reported worried about trouble from the soon-to-be enlarged United Arab Republic. One of the three members of the new union will be Iraq, Iran's neighbor to the west.

Rusk's remarks obviously were directed at Pakistan, which has threatened to re-examine its alliances with the West because of the U.S.-British aid to India. Pakistanis contend the Western weapons may be turned against them in disputed Kashmir.

Rusk told the other four foreign ministers of the alliance that Chinese aggression against India showed the continued danger of communism. He said American policy is to come to the aid of any victim of Communist aggression since peace is indivisible.

"If Communist aggression succeeds anywhere it gains in appetite and weakens the free world morally and physically," he said.

Britain, Pakistan, Iran and Turkey are CENTO members. The United States is a fully participating observer.

Although the subject was soft-pedaled in the public speeches, British and American diplomats held private meetings with Pakistani leaders on the Kashmir dispute between India and Pakistan.

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Saudi Arabia, UAR to Pull Out of Yemen

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP) — Secretary-General U Thant announced Tuesday that the United Arab Republic and Saudi Arabia had agreed to pull out of the royalist-republican war in Yemen.

He said a U. N. observer team will see that the agreement is carried out.

Thant disclosed details of the agreement in a report to the U. N. Security Council. He told the 11-nation body he was dispatching Maj. Gen. Carl von Horn of Sweden, head of the U. N. truce supervision organization in Palestine, to the capitals of the two countries at once to arrange for the arrival of U. N. observers.

The agreement was expected to bring to an end the conflict between Yemen royalists and republicans that began last September with the ousting of the royal government.

The pact called for withdrawal of about 20,000 UAR troops from the Red Sea Republic as soon as possible.

Saudi Arabia has agreed to end all aid to ousted King Mohammed al-Badr and to prohibit use of Saudi Arabian territory by royalist leaders to carry on the conflict in Yemen.

A demilitarized zone of 12 miles will be established on each side of the Yemen-Saudi Arabia border to check on the observance of the agreement.

Thant told the Security Council he planned to send a team of not more than 50 military observers to the area, together with aircraft and ground transportation.

He said he believed the mission could be ended within three or four months.

TOKYO (AP) — Communist China announced Monday it will release 459 more Indian soldiers captured during the border fighting last fall.

Against Arab Aggression

2 Senators Urge Defense of Israel

WASHINGTON (AP) — Two Republican senators called Tuesday for U. S. intervention to stave off any Arab aggression against Israel in the explosive Middle East.

Sen. Jacob W. Javits, R-N.Y., proposed that the United States attempt to get Great Britain, France and other Western nations to join it in a collective defense agreement with Israel.

Sen. Hugh Scott, R-Pa., said this country should offer its good offices for direct peace negotiations between Israel and its Arab neighbors. Egypt's Gamal Abdel Nasser is attempting to weld the Arab nations into a United Arab Republic.

"The Soviet Union's support of Nasser goes far beyond even the huge masses of guns, tanks, planes, submarines and ships that it has poured into Egypt to re-equip Nasser's armies," he said.

"Because the Kremlin knows Israel is committed to the free world by conviction as well as every other tie, it regards Israel as legitimate prey, and it will — as it has already — use every opportunity to stir up the Arabs and support their attacks on Israel."

Scott called in an address to the Adas Israel Congregation Monday night for an end to the Kennedy administration's "even-handed" policy in dealing with Middle East nations. He said this should be supplanted by direct support of Israel.

He said Nasser is continuing to get U. S. economic aid despite actions which violate congressional directives that help should not be given to countries which blockade international waterways, discriminate against U. S. citizens or divert their own economic resources to projects which support the Communist bloc.

"Nasser has been doing all of that and U. S. aid is still pouring into the UAR," he said.

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
