

Tension Eases On Latin Island

PORT AU PRINCE, Haiti — Haiti has agreed to the Dominican Republic's demand that 22 political refugees in asylum in the Dominican Embassy here be allowed to leave the country in safety, diplomatic sources said Wednesday.

The decision by Haitian President Francois Duvalier's government appeared to ease further the crisis between Haiti and its neighbor republic on the Caribbean island of Hispaniola.

It was communicated to Latin American diplomats as a six-man team from the Organization of American States investigated Dominican charges that Haiti violated the embassy last Saturday while searching for opponents of the Duvalier regime.

The incident led Dominican President Juan Bosch to threaten the use of armed force unless Haiti withdrew a policeman from the embassy grounds and guaranteed the safety of Dominican diplomats and the Haitian political refugees sheltered in the embassy.

Envoy Briefs JFK on Talks In Moscow

WASHINGTON (AP) — Soviet Premier Khrushchev has sent personal good wishes to President Kennedy and assurances that the Soviet envoy in Laos has been told to work with British and American ambassadors to try to settle the Laotian crisis.

This was the oral message Undersecretary of State W. Averell Harriman said he conveyed Tuesday night to the President. It was the reply to a written message Kennedy had sent Khrushchev.

Harriman, who returned from Moscow Monday night, briefed the President on his 3½ hour talk with Khrushchev.

After his report, the tart-tongued Harriman talked with newsmen in the White House lobby.

Was he "hopeful" about a Laotian settlement, a newsmen asked.

"Everybody always asks me that," said Harriman. "That (hopeful) isn't a word that's in my vocabulary."

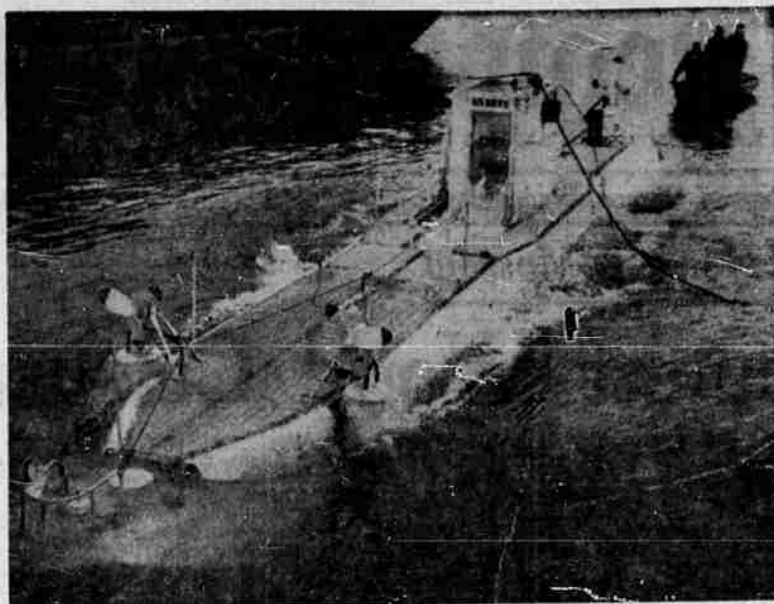
But, he added, the civil war in Laos has been transferred from the battlefield to the political arena and it will "be there for some time to come, I think."

Why didn't Khrushchev send a written reply to Kennedy's message?

"The beard was about to arrive," said Harriman, in reference to Cuban Prime Minister Fidel Castro, and the Soviet premier was very busy.

Woman Flier Lands at Honolulu Airport

HONOLULU (AP) — Betty Miller, 37, who made history Tuesday by flying her small plane from California to Hawaii alone, said she had only one hour's fuel left when she landed.

"I should have had three hours left, but I wasn't worried," said the Santa Monica, Calif., housewife.

Looking fresh, Mrs. Miller

opened the cockpit door of her twin-engine Piper Apache and yelled to welcome: "How's the ground feel?"

Her Hawaii trip was the first leg of her planned solo flight to Brisbane, Australia, a 7,100-mile ocean-spanning trip that will include stops at Canton Island and Fiji. She is flying a reverse course taken by Amelia Earhart in 1937 when she and her navigator Fred Noonan disap-

peared without trace while attempting to fly the Pacific.

"I would just love to have a drink," the aviatrix said.

She complained that someone in Oakland goofed before her departure and filled her

thermos with boiling water.

Mrs. Miller said she will rest in Honolulu for "a day or two" before continuing to Canton Island. She had been expected to continue the flight after refueling in Honolulu.

Indonesians Take Over 'West Irian'

KOTABARU, West Irian (AP) — Indonesia took over West New Guinea, the last remnant of Holland's East Indian empire, Wednesday and renamed it West Irian.

The United Nations transferred control of the western half of the world's second largest island at ceremonies in Hollandia, Gen. Douglas MacArthur's wartime headquarters.

The peaceful transfer ended 13 years of struggle by Indonesia for the 159,000 square miles of jungles and mountains and 700,000 Papuan people, most of them still in the Stone Age.

Australia governs Eastern New Guinea.

In keeping with Sukarno's policy of erasing traces of Indonesia's former Dutch masters, West New Guinea was renamed West Irian (Hot Land). Hollandia, the capital, became Kotabaru (New Town).

Foreign Minister Subandrio led the delegation of Indonesian officials at the ceremony. The Dutch government did not take part. The Dutch flag was lowered for the last time Dec. 31, three months after the United Nations started administering the territory.

Senators Express Middle East Fears

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senate Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen of Illinois Wednesday called the Middle East situation "explosive and dangerous" and said it holds the threat of a third world war.

Dirksen thus added his voice to bipartisan expressions of fear of possible Arab aggression against Israel.

"If we expect to maintain peace and to prevent a war erupting in the Middle East, as is always a threat, we are going to have to monitor the situation very carefully," Dirksen said in an interview.

"You cannot permit the situation to drift too long, because drift is always dangerous," he added.

Sen. Jacob K. Javits, R-N.Y., who spearheaded a flood of Senate speeches Tuesday demanding U.S. intervention, predicted there will be increased pressure "for a change in our policy of drift."

Javits proposed, among other things, that the United States attempt to get Britain, France, and other Western nations to join it in a collective defense agreement with Israel. He warned that "time is running out on peace in the Middle East."

His speech set off bipartisan appeals for this and other U.S. action, including a call by Sen. Hubert Humphrey of Minnesota, an assistant Democratic leader, for an embargo on arms shipments to the Middle East and stronger U.N. peace-keeping operations.

The speeches were arranged in informal consultation to give emphasis to pressure on the administration.

Javits and other speakers accused the Soviet Union of pouring

ing guns, tanks, planes and ships into Egypt to reequip President Gamal Abdel Nasser's armies and of using every opportunity to stir up the Arabs because of Israel's commitment to the West.

Humphrey declared that the increased buildup of arms in the Middle East is "a loaded pistol pointed at the heart of all humanity" and represents "a lighted fuse which could ignite nuclear war."

Humphrey proposed an embargo on arms shipments to the area coupled with a regional arms control agreement, a larger U.N. peacekeeping force, and the assignment of U.N. observers throughout the Middle East.

Sen. Clifford Case, R-N.J., pictured U.S. policy as one of "wishful waiting" in the hope the problem would go away.

The United States, Case declared, should make clear "the threat to Israel's security will be met in full measure by U.S. assistance."

Sen. John Pastore, D-R.I., warned that an armed clash between Israel and Arab states "would involve us" and might set off a world war.

Sen. Ernest Gruening, D-Alaska, protested pouring U.S. money into Egypt to establish the United Arab Republic as a "100 per cent police state" when Israel is a loyal ally.
