SALEM (Special)—Although the House committee's approval doesn't by a long shot mean easy sledding for Oregon's revised constitution, there was considerable elation about it here Tuesday.

The proposed constitution was passed 8-1 Tuesday morning and sent to the House floor for action, possibly as early as Monday.

Among those feeling good about the committee action were several Eugene League of Women Voters members, including Mrs. Jonathan Benjamin.

Public Notice Win Scored By Radio, TV

Broadcasting OK'd For Legal Notices

SALEM—The Oregon broadcasting industry scored a major victory Tuesday with passage of a bill that would permit radio and television stations to broadcast legal notices.

The Senate bill—which deals with the formation of port districts—now goes to the House.

The measure contains an amendment which makes it permissive to give public notice "on one or more radio or television stations serving the area."

The broadcast notice would be in addition to regular publication in a newspaper of general circulation.

Sen. Glen Stadler, D-Eugene, a radio station executive, said it was the first Oregon legislation to enable broadcasting of public notices.

He said he already has asked the Legislative Counsel Committee to make an interim study and prepare a bill for the 1965 session to add the "permissive" clause to all state laws where public notice is required.

Historically, such notices are published in newspapers.

Karl J. Nestvold, Eugene, manager of the Oregon Assn. of Broadcasters, said "Washington state has used broadcast notices for several years, and has a provision that the state can use newspapers, radio or television to publicize constitutional amendments."

Neither Nestvold nor Stadler knew of any other state which authorizes broadcasting of legal notices.

Stadler said election and similar notices can "very beneficially" be broadcast, and suggested many people do not take the time to read "the small type" in newspaper legal advertisements.

He said "at first we want to make broadcasting permissive, and after several years may attempt to make it mandatory."

Stadler said the idea was first suggested at an Oregon Assn. of Broadcasters meeting last November.

"We tried to add the permissive feature to several bills... but had to wait for a bill that could include the feature without conflicting with other statutes," he said.

Probation Term

Senate Education Committee Winds Up Work on School Bill

SALEM—The Senate Education Committee Tuesday stripped special programs from the basic school support fund, changed the school census age and rejected a plan to place the basic school fund on a biennial appropriation basis.

Liability Bill Questioned

SALEM (Special)—A measure which would have relieved a tree farmer or other landowner from liability to persons using the land for recreation hit a legal snarl Tuesday.

House Bill 1696 would have meant that a timber company with an improved recreation area would be protected from lawsuits or other litigation brought by someone injured in the park.

Rep. W. O. Kelsay, D-Roseburg, told the House Tuesday the bill would "protect landowners and encourage them to offer their lands for recreational uses."

But Rep. Edward Branchfield, R-Medford, posed several legal questions and was successful in sending the bill to the Judicial Committee so that lawyers could check it out.

Many firms such as Weyerhaeuser, Georgia-Pacific and others have tree farm parks where the public is invited.

The bill was forwarded to the Ways and Means Committee with the recommendation that the amount of basic school support be increased.

Ways and Means will determine the amount of any increase.

The Senate Education Committee made six policy decisions regarding the state's basic school support program:

- Maintain the present continuing appropriation.
- Maintain the present equalization features.
- Change the census base from 4 to 20 years of age to 5 to 17 years.

Springfield Man Given Jail Term

Everett Richard Collins, 44, of 404 B St., Springfield, was sentenced Friday to a 10-month term in the city-county jail following revocation in Lane County District Court of his probation term.

Collins was placed on probation in December, 1961, for contributing to the dependency of his five children. It was determined in a hearing Friday that Collins had failed to make support payments and had been living with his family while his ex-wife was receiving welfare aid for the children.

Collins admitted violating terms of the probation by continuing to use intoxicants. The sentence was imposed by Judge Frank Alderson.



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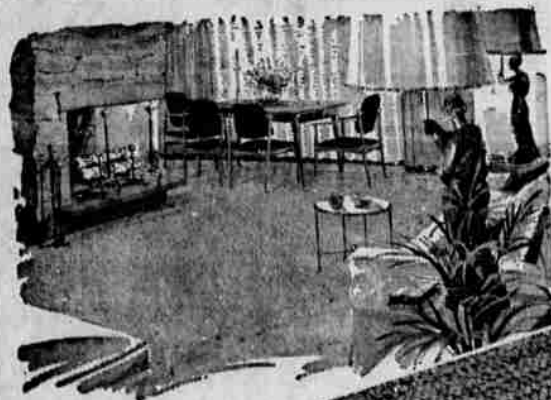
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
