The first Black publishers, John B. Russwurm and Samuel Cornish, knew that African Americans needed a newspaper where we could tell our own stories in our own voices. "We Wish To Plead Our Own Cause," they wrote in the first issue of *Freedom's Journal* in 1827. "Too Long Have Others Spoken For Us."

Almost 150 years later when *The Skanner* started pub-

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lishing, Black folks and minority communities in the Pacific Northwest still lacked representation in media. That's why for many years our masthead affirmed, "No Other Can Speak For Us."
