tial check, but a warrant from Pierce County did not return up during warrant check before release. Most of the money raised hadn't been returned from the fundraiser by Friday, Spencer said, and organizers will keep working to bail women out as funds are released.

“The county runs warrant checks for inmates at the time they are incarcerated and at the time they are released

He also said once bail is placed on an inmate's books, that money either belongs to the inmate or goes to the courts. In this case, bail went to the latter, which is why the money Spencer posted was not refunded. *The Skanner* will update this story as more information becomes available.

It's common for transactions from crowdfunding sites to take two to five days to appear in the designated bank accounts, as the support guide for Fundly notes.

community and its leaders, from past to present.

“We've been dabbling in digitizing more of our collection and making more resources available online,” Vailley Oehlke, director of libraries for Multnomah County, told *The Skanner*.

“But then we wanted to do something that was broader and more connected to the community,” she added. “We've been talking a lot about how to celebrate the history of the African Americans in Portland — and more broadly across the state — and this seemed like a really great way to do that.”

In partnership with Know Your City, the Oregon Historical Society and Vanport Mosaic, the Multnomah County Library also received enormous support from the City of Portland Archives, which contributed 175 digital images and documents from its archival collections.

“People have an immediate connection to photographs,” said Mary Hansen, reference archivist at the City of Portland Archive & Records Center. “Our goal for the materials selected for the ‘Our Story’ project is to highlight resources available in the city archives that people might not know exist.”

Those materials include images of numerous community events, neighborhood

clean-ups, protest rallies, elected officials, newsletters and city governmental records, as well as audio clips and music.

“As an archive, we don't write the history,” continued Hansen. “We provide the raw materials for people to write their own stories.”

The City of Portland Archive has also made available a downloadable guide to the city's historical records as they relate to the Black experience.

Released in sections, the first phase of the diverse collection will be released this month and will focus on community building. The library is expecting to grow the collection to 500 items by next June.
