Morisseau's 'Skeleton Crew' Opens Sept. 8 at Artists Rep

Artists Repertory Theatre kicks off its 2018-19 season with "Skeleton Crew" by Dominique Morisseau, directed by William (Bill) Earl Ray. Skeleton Crew is the third play in Morisseau's The Detroit Project (A 3-Play Cycle) following Detroit '67 and Paradise Blue. For Skeleton Crew, Morisseau received a 2016 Obie Award and the play was selected for the 2014 Kilroy List. "Skeleton Crew" previewed last week and has its official opening Saturday; it runs through Sept. 30 on the Morrison Stage.

It's 2008, and one of the last auto plants in Detroit is dying on the vine. The factory workers that remain are living paycheck-to-paycheck but amidst the backbreaking work and brutally long shifts, they have somehow shaped themselves into a makeshift family. Faye (played by Shelley B. Shelley, pictured here), a factory lifer, is the glue that holds everything together. North Portland Transportation Partnership Hosts Kickoff Event

The North Portland Transportation Partnership (NPTP) will host a kickoff event Sept. 19 featuring Oregon House Speaker Tina Kotek and Portland City Commissioner Chloe Eudaly, who will head the Portland Bureau of Transportation as of September 4th.

Oregon Department of Transportation and Portland Bureau of Transportation staff will be on hand to present information about transportation projects happening in North Portland. The event is open to the public and free to attend.

NPTP is taking a fresh look at the issues affecting North Portlanders who ride, bike, drive, roll and walk in and around our neighborhoods. The partnership seeks to take a collaborative approach to transportation issues and to create a shared venue for residents, businesses, government organizations and others to discuss and influence transportation projects that affect us all.

At the kickoff event, NPTP will connect community advocates, residents and transportation officials who share mobility concerns that affect North Portland. Attendees will have a chance to ask questions and

engage in informal interactive conversations about transportation issues.

Oregon Historical Society Hosts 'Frames Per Second: Selections from OHS 16mm News Film Collection, 1969-1981'

Oregon Historical Society's exhibit, "Frames Per Second: Selections from the OHS 16mm News Film Collection, 1969-1981," which opened in July, will remain on display until Jan. 13 at OHS, 1200 SW Park Ave.

The prints in this exhibit are scans from the KOIN and KPTV 16mm news film collections held at the Oregon Historical Society (OHS) Research Library. Every three frames of 16mm film represents 1/8 of a second — or just faster than the blink of an eye.

In 2014, OHS film archivists pulled approximately two hours of this footage for the Oregon Experience program "Lift Ev'ry Voice" — a co-production between OHS and Oregon Public Broadcasting. In a film archive, a "pull" refers to a single footage request, usually around a specific topic, that first requires research in to what might exist in the collection. The available stories are then physically located, pulled, and spliced (taped) together onto larger reels around that one subject. For this pull, relating broadly to civil rights and the African American experience in Portland, only a small portion of the footage made the final edit of the documentary.

Identifying news stories within the OHS news collections requires familiarity with the resources created by the news organizations themselves. In Portland, stations included KOIN, KPTV, KGW, and KATU — all of which have at least some film in the OHS collection. Subject matter varied and included topics such as the Rose Festival, Blazer games, and urban development. Not all of the stations maintained easily searchable indexes to aid in pulling the film. At KOIN, the news stories were organized by subject and year. KPTV stories, however, are listed by date only. It is possible to search a variety of KOIN subjects with the main requirement being that it was noted as being "newsworthy" at the time. Some of the search terms for this pull included: Albina; Union Ave riots; "Don't Choke 'Em. Smoke 'Em"; E. Shelton Hill; Black United Front; Kent Ford; and Black Panther's Dental Clinic. For this project, archivists pulled enough stories to fill seven reels in total, each approximately 20 min-
