Hardesty, Smith to Debate at City Club Friday Forum

City Club of Portland and AARP-Oregon are sponsors of a debate between Jo Ann Hardesty and Loretta Smith as they make their case for why they are the best person to serve on Portland's city council in position number 3. Hardesty is most known for her 1995-2001 term as Oregon state representative (as Jo Ann Bowman), her weekly Thursday morning radio segment on KBOO and her former role as NAACP Portland President. Smith is a two-term Multnomah County Commissioner who worked for 22 years for Senator Ron Wyden.

The debate will be moderated by Dr. Melody Rose, the 15th president of the recently-closed Marylhurst University and a nationally recognized scholar of women and politics. She has served as chancellor of the Oregon University System and in many different roles at Portland State University, culminating in her service as Vice Provost for Academic Programs & Instruction and Dean of Undergraduate Studies. She is also the founder and first director of the Center for Women, Politics & Policy. Rose served as president of the City Club of Portland in 2011-2012.

The popular on-demand film streaming service Kanopy is now available for free to Multnomah County Library card holders. Library card holders can access Kanopy and sign up to start streaming films on instantly by visiting multcolib.kanopy.com. Patrons can stream films from any computer, television, or mobile device by downloading the Kanopy app for iOS, Android, AppleTV, Chromecast or Roku.

The Seattle Office of Labor Standards Announces 2019 Minimum Wage Increases for All Employers

The Seattle Office of Labor Standards (OLS) announces that the 2019 minimum wage for all large employers (employing more than 500 workers worldwide) will be \$16 per hour. In past years, there was a two-tier system under which large employers that contributed toward individual medical benefits paid a lower minimum wage than those that did not. This two-tier system ends in 2019.

Also, beginning on January 1, 2019, small employers (with 500 or fewer employees) must pay at least \$15.00 per hour. Small employers can meet this requirement by paying no less than \$12.00 per hour in wages and contributing at least \$3.00 per hour toward an employee's medical benefits and/or reported tips.

Under Seattle's Minimum Wage Ordinance, the minimum wage paid by large employers increases on an annual basis to reflect the rate of inflation measured by the Seattle-Tacoma-Bremerton Area Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (the CPI-W) for the 12-month period ending in August 2018. By law, small employers must also pay its workers a higher minimum wage.

OLS will update the required Labor Standards poster to reflect the minimum wage increases on or before December 1, 2018. Employers are required to display this poster, in a noticeable area in the workplace, in English and the primary language(s) of the employees at the workplace.
