Program Recruits Students of Color for City Planning

Next month, Portland high school students will learn how their city's buildings have social and environmental impact on their communities

our Street, Your Voice" is a 10session afterschool program launched by Hacker Architects and The Center, a coalition-led hub for youth education in North Portland.

People of color and women are the most under-represented in the architectural community, with less than two percent of licensed architects in the U.S. being African American, according to The Center.

"It's a very targeted program," said Swank, who is also the program's instructor. "It's trying to capture young people that may not have exposure to what an architect or city planner even does - and understand that these are the people that are impacting the communities around
