

THE CHEMEKETA HOTEL.—The Mercury, Feb. 20, says that a "full settlement of all the liabilities of this Hotel Co. have now been made. All claims have been paid in full, except the claims of Mr. Walters for damages on the furniture contract, which was lately compromised and is now settled. The Chemeketa has been deeded to Messrs. Ladd & Bush, the Bankers. The house is now being newly painted inside, and will be refurnished in good style, and again opened."

EXAGGERATED.—Last week we published an item, clipped from a Walla Walla paper, to the effect that the weather about Colville had been very severe, and that a stock-raiser, named Harper, had lost five thousand head. Mr. Openheimer, a merchant of Colville, informs the Herald that the above report is considerably exaggerated, and that the loss of stock in and around Colville has been very light; and also, that Harper has not lost a single head from inclement weather.

NARROW ESCAPE.—On Thursday evening, last week, while attempting to cross the Willamette river, above Salem, in a small boat, a man and his little son, the latter about five years of age, nearly lost their lives by the capsizing of the boat. The boy clung to the boat while the man swam to the shore to secure another with which to rescue the child from his perilous position. The boy was after great difficulty, saved from drowning.

GRAND RONDE RESERVATION.—The Dallas Republican, Feb. 19th, has the following:

Mr. George Tillotson, who has been building a saw mill and grist mill on the Grand Round Reservation, returned yesterday. He informs us that both mills are finished in good style. The grist mill can grind about three hundred bushels of wheat a day, and the saw mill has a capacity of 7,000 feet. Last Monday the Indians held an election, chose a Sheriff, Justices of the Peace and other officers, in lieu of their Chiefs. They have adopted the marriage ceremony of the whites, and are fast yielding up their customs to those of civilization. They express regret at the removal of Mencham, as they look upon him as the true friend of the Indian.

DOUGLAS COUNTY.—The Roseburg Plaindealer, Feb. 16th, has the following:

On last Saturday evening about dusk, Mr. J. D. Bowen started up the hill towards his residence, and when he reached the Catholic Church lot, he was startled at a man springing towards him from behind the fence. He turned to him, when he received a terrible blow from a heavy club on the side of the face which glancing inflicted a severe wound on his hand. He fell stunned for a moment, when the villain attempted to rifle his pockets, but on his calling for help left suddenly. Had the blow struck Mr. B. squarely on the head, as was evidently intended, it would doubtless have killed him.

The difficulty of crossing the Robert's hill, nine miles south of this place, has induced the Engineers to run a trial line on the west side of the river to test the practicability of reaching Cow Creek on that side. They are also running a line north from the crossing, through the Looking Glass, to connect at Wilbur.

An old settler of this county, of the name of Bay, who was living on Smith river, was brought to town last week and upon examination was pronounced insane. He was so wild that it was found necessary to put handcuffs upon him before he could be taken by stage to the asylum.

A farmer's club has been organized at Seattle.

ARTICHOKES.—Mr. R. C. Geer, of this county, brought this office during the week a large tuber of this vegetable, raised from seed procured by him in Ohio last year. It is a fine specimen, measuring nine inches in length by six in width. Mr. Geer says the artichoke thrives well on our soil, and that he can raise from one thousand to fifteen hundred bushels to the acre. As artichokes are greatly relished by cattle and hogs, would it not be well for other farmers to cultivate an acre or so of them?
