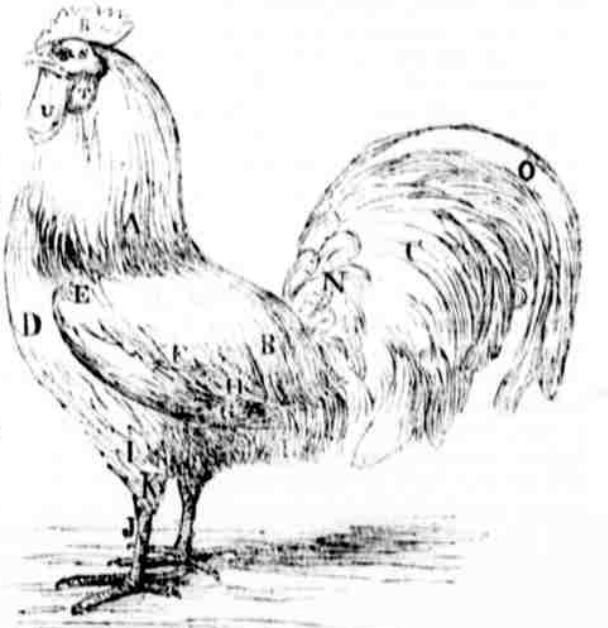

TUTTLE, Portland, Oregon: Dear Sir—In reply to your favor of September 14th, we will say, in regard to our Grain Drill taking the lead in the field, that it has always done so, whenever it has come in competition with any other Drill, the Buckeye not excepted. Where we have the advantage over the Buckeye is in our two-piece feed roller, with cog opposite each space, making sixteen discharges to every revolution of the shaft, and is strictly a force feed. Upon examination of the Buckeye feed you will see that it is nothing more than a fluted roller, or rubbing feed, with the opening of the cup cut down so low that the agitation lets the grain fall out, instead of being forced out, and therefore cannot possibly distribute the grain as evenly as our feed will do; and upon these grounds we have always whipped them out whenever we met them in the field. As for the broadcast arrangement, we have no attachment, but we turn the Drill into a good broadcast sower as any of them have; which is done by placing the hose in line for cultivators, taking out the rubber tubes and turning the sheet iron pins or conductors forward to the holes in the forward tube roll, when you have as good a broadcast sower as the best of them.
