

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

NEW YORK, April 3.—The funeral obsequies of the late General Robert Anderson this morning, were very imposing in character. The military were in line at 10 o'clock, and in half an hour after the procession was en route, the cortege being formed as follows: Police escort, under command of Gen. H. G. Ward; 71st, 9th, and 17th regiments, two batteries of the First Artillery, which were in Fort Sumter with Anderson. Next came the corpse under Fort Sumter's flag, in an artillery caisson, after which followed the pall bearers and many miscellaneous organizations. The procession passed through Pitt street to Twenty-third street, thence to the Thirty-fourth street ferry, where the body was placed on board a steamer for West Point. The streets through which the procession passed were densely crowded. Flags flying on the route were dropped at half mast.

The funeral of Prof. Morse takes place Friday morning at 11 o'clock in Madison avenue Presbyterian church. The remains will be interred in Greenwood Cemetery.

Rev. Dr. Crumham, formerly of Bowdoin College, died in this city yesterday.

President Grant is in this city, to see his wife and daughter off for Europe.

The parade of colored citizens in celebration of the anniversary of the ratification of the Fifteenth Amendment took place to-day. The procession numbered about 4,000.

MADRID, April 3.—The authorities of the towns of the province of Badajoz and other places have coalesced in the introduction of measures for the restoration of Gibraltar to Spain.

PARIS, April 3.—A dispatch says that a great Bonapartist reaction is now in progress throughout France. There has been an unusually large influx of Bonapartist leaders within a short time. The reaction has been greatly aided by the results of the libel suit against Figaro yesterday, which showed that the ex-emperor was not responsible for many of the military disasters in France.

SALT LAKE, April 3.—The Legislature of the proposed State of Deseret, met to-day. Rufus Snow was elected President of the Senate and T. D. Richards Speaker of the House. It was resolved to meet to-morrow and elect two U. S. Senators.

WASHINGTON, April 3.—A special says information has been received which leaves no doubt that the Spanish Government will pardon Dr. Howard, and relieve him on request of the American Government.

Mrs. Grant, wife of the President, and her daughter Nettie, and ex-Secretary Borie and family, sailed to-day on the Cunard steamer Algeria for Europe. The President and General Porter accompanied them here from Washington.

NEW YORK, April 5.—Mayor Hall, it is said, will be a witness in his own behalf when the case again comes to trial.

About \$30,000 worth of obscene books and pictures, and material for their manufacture, were seized in Brooklyn yesterday.

A Brownsville, Texas, dispatch says Texan rangers are preparing to retaliate and rescue their cattle from Mexico, on the Rio Grande.

An immense throng gathered at an early hour this morning at Madison street Presbyterian church to be present at the funeral services of Prof. Morse. A great many were unable to find standing room. Among the delegations present were Governor Hoffman and staff, a committee from the Legislature, Directors of the Western Union of New York and New Foundland Telegraph Companies, representatives from the Academy of Design, Evangelical Alliance, New York Common Council, and various other delegations of lesser note. Shortly after, the funeral procession entered the church, the coffin being borne on the shoulders of four men and followed by mourning relatives of deceased. After chanting of solemn music, Rev. Dr. Adams proceeded to deliver a funeral oration from the text, "Man cometh up as a flower." The pall-bearers were William Orton, Livingston Morse, General Dix, Prof. Cornell, Cyrus W. Field and Peter Cooper. Lines of people thronged the route along Broadway. During the day public offices and buildings displayed flags at half-mast, and the telegraph offices were dressed in mourning.

A dispatch from Yeddo of March 26th announces that an attempt has been made by a party of twelve persons to assassinate the Mikado of Japan. The efforts of the would-be murderers proved unsuccessful. The guard of the Mikado captured two of the party—the other ten escaped. This attempted assassination caused great uneasiness on the part of the Government. Orders have been issued forbidding foreigners to go beyond the city limits of Yeddo.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 6.—The California Acclimatization Society received cases of yearling black bass from the Niagara river, which have arrived in good condition, and will be placed in ponds prepared for them in different parts of the State.

THE yield of wheat for the coming harvest in this State is variously estimated at from thirty millions to thirty-five millions of bushels.

THE POPE.

An Italian paper publishes a description of the Pope's daily life at the Vatican. When it is not a day for audiences, he usually first confers with Cardinal Antonelli on political questions, and then with the Cardinal Vicar Patrizi on Church matters. The Pope very willingly gives audiences. After the audience, Pius goes into the garden and walks about till two o'clock, with two guards in front, one of his stewards by his side, and two privy chamberlains, dressed in medieval Spanish costume, behind him. After mass he reads his letters, a great number of which come daily from foreign emperors, kings, and other high personages. He also receives several letters from Victor Emmanuel; these he reads first, and he often smiles at their contents. Sometimes he answers the letters himself, either in Latin or in French. His handwriting is small and clear, and resembles that of a woman. When he has done with his correspondence he has the newspapers read to him, especially the Catholic Chronicle and the comic paper Funfulla, and his countenance expresses great glee when a hit is made at the Government or the municipal council. The Pope also has the caricatures of the day brought to him, and he likes to make comments on them. Of the Italian politicians he speaks mostly with contempt, except Ricasoli, whom he believes to be a man of decided character and a good Catholic. He always mentions Minghetti ironically as "the worthy Minghetti." He accuses the Italian statesmen of self-delusion, and says they have done wrong "to come to Rome to vex an old man," adding that they might have waited for his successor. For Victor Emmanuel he has a high esteem, and he will not allow any of his courtiers to speak ill of him; but he believes that Victor Emmanuel will not stay in the Quirinal much longer. At ten p. m. the Pope dismisses his courtiers for the night.

A RAILROAD TICKET GOOD EITHER WAY.—In the Superior Court in Boston, recently, a case of interest to the traveling public was decided. In 1868, Mr. J. A. Coleman, of Boston, attempted to ride from New York to New Haven on a coupon ticket, which was rejected by the conductor on the ground that altho' it was good from New Haven to New York, it did not pass the holder in the opposite direction. Mr. Coleman insisted that the company was compelled to receive the ticket, as it represented money paid for a passage between these points, and was put off the train by force, receiving such injury as to effect his health. He sued the New York and New Haven Railway Company, and recovered. The railroad obtained a new trial, and were beaten again. On exception to the ruling of the judge, the defendant obtained a third trial, which terminated in a verdict for Mr. Coleman for \$3,200 damages.

LIABILITIES OF RAILWAYS.—A passenger traveling on the Panama Railroad lost some luggage, which contained property to the value of \$4,000. As the company refused to pay him more than \$100, which it was alleged was the extent to which it could be liable, as in its printed receipts, all responsibility was disavowed beyond that amount, unless the value was declared and a proportionate charge laid. In spite of this, the Court ruled that these arbitrary conditions did not form an implied contract, and the plaintiff recovered the full extent of his loss. This was a righteous judgment, as it takes two to make a bargain; these one-sided conditions are not binding, unless framed in strict compliance with the laws governing common carriers.

A lady recently died at Utica leaving seven children, the youngest only a few days old. Soon after her demise the children were taken with small pox, and the father was compelled for days to care for them alone, day and night, no one being willing to give them assistance save a physician, and he was obliged to carry milk in the house for the babe.
